Sound of Silence

Jennifer went on her first retreat. Exhausted from looking after young children and her ailing mother-in-law, she counted on some rest! She hadn't counted on the silence of the retreat weekend, and uneasiness began to rise in her. She was used to constant noise. By mid-afternoon Jennifer was panicking and ready to leave. She shared her distress to the retreat director. "What are you running from, Jennifer?" he asked quietly. Jennifer blurted out, "God!" She startled herself, realizing there was no quiet for God's voice in her life. Jennifer relaxed into the silence. At the end of the retreat she listened carefully to the stories of Elijah, who heard God in a tiny breeze, and Peter, who let wind and waves distract him so that he sank in the water. Jennifer made two changes in her life. The TV was only turned on for certain programs, and she made time simply to be alone with God in weekly Eucharistic Adoration.

Living Stewardship Now

Make room for a silent time and place in your life for God to speak to your heart. Start slowly—say fifteen minutes twice a week, then increase to fifteen minutes once a day. Let nothing else intrude on this special time.



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Today's Readings

First Reading — The LORD said to Elijah: “Stand on the mountain; the LORD will be passing by” (1 Kings 19:9a, 11-13a).


Psalm — Lord, let us see your kindness, and grant us your salvation (Psalm 85).

Second Reading — To the Israelites belong the covenants, the law, and the patriarchs; and from them comes the Christ (Romans 9:1-5).

Gospel — As Jesus walked on the sea, the disciples were terrified. But at once Jesus said to them, “Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid” (Matthew 14:22-33).

The Presence of God

After the miracle of Jesus walking on water, the disciples exclaimed, “Truly, you are the Son of God” (Matthew 14:33). Most Christians will probably never experience such a dramatic miracle. Like Elijah, we await the manifestation of God in other moments. Perhaps the biggest challenge for the believer is to be constantly attuned to the possible presence of God in the everyday events of life. This is a stance that takes some people years to develop. Others seem to find the Lord easily in the simple things. As the week unfolds, let us look for the presence of God in the little things around us. Perhaps, like Elijah, we will be surprised at what we find. And, like the disciples, we can add our voice to the confession, “Truly you are the Son of God.” —© Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus: Song of Heaven

The words of the Sanctus are rooted in the scriptures. They recall the song of the seraphim in the prophet Isaiah's vision of God in majesty: “Seraphim were stationed above; each of them had six wings: with two they veiled their faces, with two they veiled their feet, and with two they hovered aloft. ‘Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts!’ they cried one to the other. ‘All the earth is filled with his glory!’ ” (Isaiah 6:2-3). They recall the Gospel accounts of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem: “Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest” (Matthew 21:9). Yet the liturgy adds something new to these ancient texts. The seraphim sang, “the earth is filled with his glory.” But the liturgy proclaims, “heaven and earth are full of your glory.” In the Eucharist, earth and heaven meet. For a moment in time, we join in the song that the angels sing for all time. The Sanctus raises us to heaven, but does not remove us from the earth. It is the song of the King who took on our human flesh so that we might share in his divine life. —Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

Lecturas de hoy

Dudas Naturales

Es común que muchos cristianos vean la Eucaristía como un signo y no como una presencia real, dudan de que Cristo esté verdaderamente presente en el pan y el vino. La duda es natural y puede ser un buen medio para llegar a la verdad. La narración de la Institución está ligada a una tradición viva que los apóstoles escucharon directamente de labios de Jesús. ¡Sí! El mismo que había caminado sobre el agua, que había perdonado pecados, sanado enfermos de todo tipo; el mismo que había dado de comer a las multitudes y que había resucitado a Lázaro. Jesús el que se había transfigurado en la cima del monte. Por si todos sus milagros fueran pocos, el mismo que fue resucitado por Dios de entre los muertos. Ese mismo les había dicho: “esto es mi cuerpo, que será entregado por ustedes”; además dijo: “este es el cáliz de mi Sangre, sangre de la alianza nueva y eterna que será derramada por vosotros y por todos los hombres para el perdón de los pecados. Hagan esto en memoria mía”. Por esa “sencilla” razón los cristianos no sólo celebramos la Eucaristía, sino que también creemos firmemente que el pan es su Cuerpo y el cáliz contiene su Sangre. —Miguel Arias, © Copyright, J. S. Balancing Science and Religion

A few weeks back our Men's Spirituality Group took on the topic of the relationship of science and religion. This relationship has shifted from collaborative to antagonistic during the past 300 years or so. The uninformed observer might conclude that science and religion stand as direct opposites and ardent opponents to each other, but this is not the case.

Most scientists, from novices to the well-experienced, have come to reconcile specific issues surrounding science and religion. These professionals don't see the tenets of science and religion as opposed to one another. Rather, they see science and religion involved in an exciting dialectical dance. Most scientists have a very deep respect for our planet, our life and how all life comes to be and develops. They also have a deep respect for the unanswerable questions of life and existence that many of us confront at some point in their life.

Most theologians have deep respect for science and the tools that science has given us to pursue fundamental questions and sort out ambiguities in the world around us. Teachers of the faith will often say that it is good for us to question and doubt our faith, our religion and, at times, our God. Using Job from the Old Testament as an example, God may actually present to us situations that cause us to question and doubt. Why? We often can often come to a deeper understanding, a deeper belief, a greater disposition toward our faith and life's ambiguities through doubt.

Most of life, the real and true essence of life, the heart of life, is nebulous, ambiguous, unanswerable, a bit foggy, not clear and at times a stinking mess. Clean, sharp, tight answers are not the necessary answer. Sometimes, a risky and faithful step forward in the dark is the answer, with no expectation of predictable outcomes.

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The Prayer of the Faithful

We are quite familiar with signed petitions. Whether with a knock on our house door, leaving the local mall, walking through downtown, or the frequent forwarded e-mails that fill our inboxes, we are asked for our signature to show our allegiance to a particular cause. I have to admit that I always have been cautious about signing my name to anything, since signing one's name to a document is a powerful act. There is another kind of petition that I am not cautious about, and that is the petitions that are part of the Prayer of the Faithful.

The word *petition* comes from the Latin for “request.” The Prayer of the Faithful, which concludes the Liturgy of the Word at Mass, is composed of petitions. First, the priest celebrant invites us to pray. Then a deacon or reader—or cantor, if sung—proclaims each intercession, or petition. These petitions ask, or request, something to happen. These petitions call us to God's future, to God's hopes for us in the present. There is a future vision of what should be, that we pray will become present in the contemporary. For instance, if a country or region has recently been struck by a natural disaster, we should include a petition that prays for God's love and care of those human persons afflicted. Or, we pray for those sick who seek God's healing presence. Though these petitions or intercessions are not addressed directly to God, we know that we have to be gifted by God's Spirit and so pray, “Lord, hear our prayer.”

To each intercession, the liturgical assembly replies typically with “Lord, hear our prayer.” We are told in our official liturgical documents that in liturgies not involving special occasions, such as funerals or marriages, the Prayer of the Faithful should include an intercession in four categories. These categories are for the Church, political authorities and the world, the oppressed or those suffering difficulties, and for the local community (see *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 70). Each category involves all of us in different ways. Moreover, they are also the communities in which we find ourselves: Church, world, nation, local assembly, neighborhood and those in all of our communities who are in particu-

lar need. We are members of the Church; we are political persons who are stewards for the earth in which we live; we and others have special concerns that arise due to natural disasters, political unrest, genocide, wars, and so forth; and finally, we are members in this local community. These are the faithful's prayers for four communities.

We pray for various communities because we were baptized as priests, prophets, and kings. Part of what it means to be baptized is to pray to the high priest, Jesus Christ on behalf of the world. The Church community prays on behalf of the whole world, for all in need. This is the definition of intercession: We pray on behalf of one another and in the case of the Church community it is the world and all who are in need. This is prayer centered on others. This is why petitions are “general” and not particular. Here is an example: For all who are struggling with the challenges of illness, especially Jane, Roger, Margaret, Gene, and Andrew: May God's healing presence be felt in their lives. The prayer is general because it prays for all people struggling with illness, but then includes particular names rather than only including particular names. While the community is concerned about one person, the community's role is to pray for all and on behalf of all. Intercessory prayer extends to all peoples.

You will not notice any changes to the Prayer of the Faithful when the third edition of *The Roman Missal* is implemented (except for the titles which include Bidding Prayer and Universal Prayer). Parishes will continue to compose their own prayers, or use those written and published by the various Catholic publishers, or use the revised texts that are included in the appendix to the Missal.

The Prayer of the Faithful should be something to which we are not cautious about signing our name when we acclaim, “Lord, hear our prayer.” It is a powerful act of the Church community praying on behalf of those in need throughout the world. This prayer is asking for God to become tangible, to become present in the contemporary for the entire world. Our prayer is for the Church throughout the world, for governments and nations, for people in need and for our local communities.
