When a company re-
cruits top manage-
ment the process is
detailed and thor-
ough. No company
wants less than the
best. Contrast this
with today's Gospel.
Jesus asks his disci-
ples who they say he
is. Peter exclaims,



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“You are the Christ,
the Son of the living God” (Matthew 16:16). Peter is a
good Jew, but an illiterate fisherman, not exactly high
on the social ladder. Nevertheless, Jesus saw what this
man could become. “You are Peter, and upon this rock
[in Greek, *petros*] I will build my church” (Matthew
16:18). The future of our Church, now 1.5 billion peo-
ple worldwide, lay in Peter's hands. With the power of
God, Jesus promised that ultimate evil would never
defeat it. Nevertheless, the Church is made up of
flawed human beings who sometimes fail. Even Peter
himself, Jesus' chosen “rock,” failed spectacularly by
denying Christ three times. Let's not walk away from
failure but strive more to live a faithful Christian life.

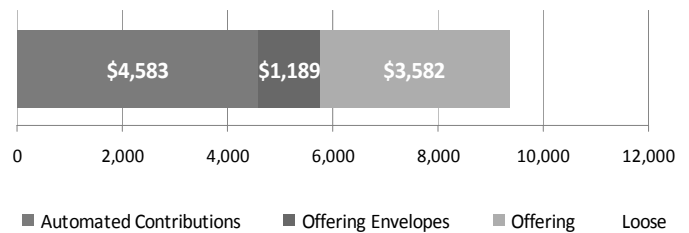

Trust

Keys hold great significance for those who carry them. They represent the trust and authority of the owner when given to another person. We may give our house key to a trusted friend to take care of our matters while we are away. We may give keys to someone responsible for maintaining or working in a particular building. Keys to vehicles are given to people who have proven themselves responsible drivers. The readings today focus on this kind of trust—the trust that conveys authority and responsibility. In the first reading, the symbol is specifically that of a key; but the second reading and the Gospel also speak of trust and leadership as they refer to the earthly church that Jesus established. —

Come, Spirit!



The presider at the Eucharist can choose from among a number of different Eucharistic Prayers, all of which follow a similar pattern. Almost always, they begin with an *epiclesis*, a Greek word that means “invocation upon” or “calling over here.” At this moment in the prayer, the priest calls down the Holy Spirit upon the gifts of bread and wine that we have brought to the altar: “Father, we bring you these gifts. We ask you to make them holy by the power of your Spirit, that they may become the body and blood of your Son” (Eucharistic Prayer III). The words of the prayer are accompanied by the ritual gesture of the laying on of hands, the ancient sign of the gift of the Spirit, which is also used in most sacramental celebrations, from the rite of confirmation to the ordination of deacons, priests, and bishops. Liturgists sometimes call this first *epiclesis* the *epiclesis* of consecration. Later in the Eucharistic Prayer, there will be another *epiclesis*, the *epiclesis* of communion, as the priest asks that the Holy Spirit be sent upon us to transform us. “Grant that we, who are nourished by his body and blood, may be filled with his Holy Spirit, and become one body, one spirit in Christ” (Eucharistic Prayer III). — Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. Santo es el Señor

Durante la Plegaria Eucarística hay una aclamación que toda la asamblea canta: el Santo. Con esta aclamación, nos unimos a las “potestades celestiales” al reconocer la total santidad de Dios y no sólo confesamos que es santo, sino que lo repetimos cantando. Esta aclamación está tomada de Isaías 6:3, a quien la gloria y santidad de Dios se le revelan. Esta misma alabanza a la santidad de Dios se ha combinado con el “Hosanna” que, traducida directamente del hebreo significa “da salvación, por favor”. El Evangelio de Mateo le atribuye este término a Jesús: “Hosanna al Hijo de David, bendito el que viene en nombre del Señor. Hosanna en las alturas”. Esta alabanza se hace no sólo en reconocimiento de su divinidad, sino de la salvación que nos trae. Por eso cantamos la santidad del Dios trinitario, que es Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo. Esa misma santidad es la vocación universal de toda la comunidad de creyentes; estamos llamados a ser el pueblo santo de Dios y lo que celebramos ha de transformar nuestra vida para que también seamos santos, porque nuestro Dios es santo. —

More on Science & Religion

Last weekend I ran in the Whirlpool Triathlon as a team member; I only did the running. I have participated in this event for several years with an associate of mine that I recently learned was a professed atheist. My friend was a God-believing individual at one time in his life and then was converted to atheism by reading the publication *American Scientist*. "I am a scientist," he says to me. "If it cannot be proven, it does not exist."

I sense that most God-fearing people have a question in the back of their minds about science and their belief. Namely: What if science proved God does not exist? Funny as it seems, this question is not a real big deal to most scientists. In fact, research shows that scientists fall along the same lines as the rest of the population. That is, most scientists believe in a God or higher power or divine source and over 90% of scientist say they pray daily.

Two weeks ago we celebrated the feast day of Saint Teresa Benedicta of the Cross (Edith Stein). Edith started her academic career as a hard core professed atheist. Well into her academic career, one of her professors asked her to assist him with research around universal eternal and religious values from a philosophical perspective. This research work lead to her conversion. From there she adopted Christianity, converted to Catholicism and joined the Carmelites after discovering St. Teresa of Avila. Later on in life she actively protested against the practices of the Nazis, tried to save her family from persecution and was eventually put to death in Auschwitz.

I was recently reading an interview with the 14th Dalai Lama who is requesting to retire so that he can dedicate the rest of his life to the spiritual side of his work in the world. The interviewer asked the Dalai Lama what he thought was his greatest accomplishment. I was surprised to read that he believes his greatest accomplishment was advancing the relationship between science and religion. He went on to say that the relationship was invaluable to the advancement of both science and religion, and that they really need each other to move us forward.

Fr. Thomas Kuttiyanickal, SAC will speak at all the Masses next weekend. Fr. Thomas came to the U.S. in 2004 as part of an agreement between his province in India and the Milwaukee province. Besides organizing mission appeals for the Indian province, he also works as a chaplain at St. Francis hospital in Evanston.

Fr. Thomas is a member of the Pallottines (The Society of the Catholic Apostolate), a religious community spread over several countries and five continents. SAC was founded in Rome in 1835 by St. Vincent Pallotti, the pioneer of the Lay Apostolate, recognized as having profoundly influenced teaching of Vatican II on the laity. The motto of the Society is: "Make everyone a Catholic, every Catholic a good Catholic, and every good Catholic an Apostle."

SAC runs mission stations in the remotest villages in India and they do the same in Zambia, Africa, working among the poorest, least-educated and most-oppressed peoples.

SAC runs orphanages, educational institutions and dispensaries and undertakes many other social work programs directly aimed at helping the needy. In the traditionally Catholic areas, SAC concentrates on re-evangelization and the training of the laity to become active apostles.

August 25th Wine Tasting at Little Sisters of the Poor

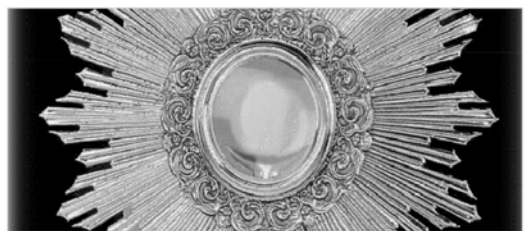

Lamb of God

One of the oldest descriptions for Mass—the eucharistic liturgy—is “the breaking of the bread.” Saint Paul often referred to this imagery of the breaking of the bread in his letters. The broken Body is given to make many disciples one body in Christ. It is a paradoxical image. The Body of Christ is broken for many disciples, so that many disciples might become one in Christ. This is a beautiful image and theology of healing, reconciliation, and communion: many becoming one in Christ Jesus.

After the Sign of Peace at Mass, the Lamb of God is begun while the priest, deacon, and/or concelebrant break(s) the eucharistic bread, the Body of Christ. In many parishes, servers will typically bring more ciboria for the eucharistic Body of Christ to the altar-table during the Lamb of God so that the fractured pieces may be divided for the ease of distributing Holy Communion to the lay faithful.

This rite should not be unnecessarily extended (see *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 83). As we have seen, a powerful theological importance underlies our understanding of this rite, so why the caution of unnecessarily prolonging or adding undue importance to this rite? Perhaps, and this is my hypothesis, it is because it may overshadow two more important liturgical acts within Mass, the Eucharistic Prayer and the Communion procession. During the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest and people pray for God, through Christ, and in the power of the Holy Spirit, to change bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. Moving forward during the Communion procession, we receive the Body and Blood of Christ in order to be united, and in communion, with the



Triune God and with one another. Therefore, this rite is secondary to those two important liturgical acts.

During this breaking of the Body of Christ—also known as the fraction rite—we sing a litany: The Lamb of God.

Lamb of God, you take away the

have mercy on us.

grant us peace.

Our liturgical documents—including the directions in *The Roman Missal*—allow for the singing of multiple invocations while the Body of Christ is being broken so that the text of the Lamb of God is connected to the entire fraction rite. The final invocation ends with “grant us peace.” This prayer text, which is often sung, is a direct prayer to Christ who is the “Lamb of God.” Christ Jesus takes “away the sins of the world.” On the surface level, it may seem a strange text for the Fraction Rite. However, Christ Jesus was the Lamb slain on the Cross at the time of the Jewish Passover when lambs were slain. Three days later, God resurrected Christ Jesus, and in so doing, he took “away the sins of the world.” Sin prevents union and communion with God and one another. Therefore, through Jesus’ death and Resurrection he establishes communion and union with us. Sin fractures relationships between us and God, but God in Christ Jesus unites our brokenness, our division into one, into the body of Christ. In our wounded and brokenness, Christ Jesus heals, reconciles, and brings us into communion with his very being.
