Our task is to tend the vineyard with deeds of charity and ethical and moral behavior, and to welcome the forgotten and oppressed. Never lose heart, never give up; the Kingdom is ours.



The Gift of the Reign of God

Matthew's Gospel today expands on Isaiah's ballad considerably. A comparison with the same story in Mark's Gospel clearly shows us that here the author is busy teaching this community of Jewish Christians: "This is a story about Israel a long time ago; this is also a story about Jesus and the skeptical leaders."

Jesus as much as told these Jewish leaders that they were the tenants who first stoned their own prophets. And he told the leaders they were the tenants who would soon even dispose of him—Jesus—and, in doing so, would forfeit their privileged place of presenting to the world the promised Messiah.

"And this," says Matthew's Gospel, "is a story about you, the inheritors of what was first offered to Israel." The reign of God was first opened to Israel and is now given to the whole world, but it must be received as a gift. The first Christians are the new tenants in the vineyard. The deeper reality of the reign or kingdom of God is that it is available to everyone on the face of the earth—Israel included. — © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

The Sign of Peace

"Greet one another with a holy kiss," wrote Saint Paul to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 16:20), and he said the same thing to other communities as well. The holy kiss, the sign of peace, has been a hallmark of Christians from the very beginning. In giving and receiving the sign of peace, we are not giving something of our own, but something that Christ has given to us. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you," Jesus told his disciples (John 14:27). Jesus comes to us when we gather together in community. We celebrate the Eucharist not just to receive spiritual nourishment to help us on our solitary way to salvation, but to be transformed into one body, the Body of Christ in the world. As we receive the Eucharist, we are not only united to Christ; we are united to each other. It is never easy to live in community, and we hurt each other on the way. So we need to turn to each other in a sign of reconciliation and forgiveness, to look into each other's eyes, and give and receive the peace that is not ours, but Christ's. — Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. 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El Regalo del Reino de Dios

El Evangelio de hoy según san Mateo amplía considerablemente la balada de Isaías. Una comparación con el mismo relato en el Evangelio según san Marcos muestra que aquí el autor se ocupa de enseñar a su comunidad de judío-cristianos: “Este es un relato sobre el Israel de antaño; y es también un relato sobre Jesús y los dudosos líderes”.

Jesús llegó a decir a estos líderes judíos que ellos eran los viñadores que primero apedrearon a sus propios profetas. Y le dijo a los líderes que ellos eran los viñadores que pronto se desharían de él, Jesús, y que, al hacerlo, renunciarían a su papel privilegiado de presentar al Mesías prometido al mundo.

“Y éste”, dice el Evangelio según san Mateo, “es un relato sobre ustedes, los herederos de lo que fue primeramente ofrecido a Israel”. El Reino de Dios fue abierto primero para Israel y ahora es ofrecido a todo el mundo, pero debe ser recibido como un regalo. Los primeros cristianos son los nuevos viñadores. La más profunda realidad del Reino de Dios es que está a disposición de toda persona sobre la faz de la tierra, incluso a Israel. — © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.



Comunión Baja las Dos Especies

Lo común es que las primeras generaciones de emigrantes tengan en su experiencia litúrgica la sagrada comunión solamente bajo la especie del pan. La han recibido bajo las dos especies sólo en circunstancias extraordinarias. Aunque la teología más tradicional nos ha enseñado que al comulgar el pan solamente (la hostia), comulgamos también la Sangre del Señor, el comulgar bajo las dos especies tiene mucho sentido, no porque Jesús esté incompleto al comulgar sólo alguna de las formas, sino porque Cristo se nos da plenamente y nosotros nos unimos plenamente a él. El pan, en la tradición judía, solía suplir al cordero pascual que les recordaba la liberación de Egipto; asimismo, el vino les recordaba la alianza que Dios había establecido con ellos. Para nosotros, los cristianos, el pan es el Cuerpo de Cristo, en plenitud, que se nos da, como se nos dio en la Última Cena y también en la cruz. El cáliz, que tiene la sangre de la alianza “nueva y eterna”, representa nuestro deseo de “beber el mismo cáliz” que Jesús bebió, seguirlo hasta las últimas consecuencias. Al beberlo confesamos públicamente no sólo nuestra fe en Cristo, sino nuestro deseo de compartir su suerte, la de la cruz. — Miguel Arias, © Copyright, J. S. Paluch Co.

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Hearing God's Call

Back when I was a kid, half way through college, I took a year off school and moved out to the State of Washington. I ended up staying for several years and finishing my college degree out in the Seattle area. A college friend of mine, who was a car nut, wanted to come back to the Detroit area to walk through the Henry Ford Museum along with a few other automobile-related historic sites.

We made the trip and over the week or so that we were in town my friend heard several nick names for me that he never heard before. One afternoon when we were out and about he asked me, "What is it with all the silly names your family calls you?" Embarrassed, I passed it off as old family habits. But in reality, my travels out West had really changed me and my good old family did not see the change.

This is not so with our response to our personal call from God. When God calls us and we listen and we do something about it, respond to the call, we change, we become a new person, and therefore, are given a new name. Like Saul that was given the name Paul after his conversion. Like a Sister that takes on a new name after her final vows. Like a *confirmandi* that takes on a new name upon reception of the sacrament of Confirmation.

All this "transformation" starts with a personal call, a personal invitation from God. And the invitation is to become someone new in Christ. Do we hear God calling? It is not a one-time call. It is not a once-in-a-life-time knock on the door. God's calling to us, to consistently become one with God and one with Christ and one with the world is a never ending rhythmic beat. Do you hear it? Do you hear your calling?



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“For Many”

In the current translation of *The Roman Missal*, the Eucharistic Prayer proceeds as follows:

Take this, all of you, and drink from it: / this is the cup of my blood, / the blood of the new and everlasting covenant. / It will be shed for you and for all / so that sins may be forgiven.

In the revised translation of the Roman Missal, the words “for all” have been changed—as directed by Pope Benedict XVI. With the revised translation, the priest will pray:

Take this, all of you, and drink from it, / for this is the chalice of my Blood, / the Blood of the new and eternal covenant, / which will be poured out for you and for many / for the forgiveness of sins.

Although this change may seem surprising at first, the Holy Father has expressed strong and sound reasons for this change.

1. The synoptic accounts of the Gospel (Matthew 26:28; Mark 14:24) make specific reference to the “many” for whom the Lord is offering the sacrifice, and some biblical scholars have emphasized this particular wording as a connection with the words of the prophet Isaiah (53:11–12). It would have been entirely possible in the Gospel texts to have said “for all;” instead, the formula given in the institution narrative is “for many,” and the words have been faithfully translated thus in most modern versions of the Bible.

2. The Roman rite in Latin has always said *pro multis* (“for many”) and never *pro omnibus* (“for all”) at the consecration of the chalice.

3. The anaphoras (Eucharistic Prayers) of the various Oriental rites, whether in Greek, Syriac, Armenian, various Slavic languages, etc., employ the verbal equivalent of the Latin *pro multis* in their respective languages.

4. “For many” is a faithful translation of *pro multis*, whereas “for all” is rather an explanation that belongs properly to catechesis.

5. The formula “for all” certainly corresponds to a correct interpretation of the Lord’s intention expressed in the scriptures. Even more, it is a dogma of faith that Christ died on the cross for all men and women (see John 11:52; 2 Corinthians 5:14–15; Titus 2:11; 1 John 2:2). However, the expression “for many” is scriptural, historical, and ecumenical, and has a solid theological interpretation: “for many” is a reminder that, while salvation is *offered* to all,

there are some who do not accept it. Salvation is not imposed in a mechanical way, against one’s free will or voluntary participation. It is freely offered to all to accept in faith, and many do indeed accept it. Some do not. As for those who apparently reject the gift, the Church entrusts them to the mercy of God. But in doing so they place themselves outside the Church’s liturgical offering. Christ’s death on the cross was certainly intended for all, but it can only help those who respond to it freely and willingly. The holy sacrifice of the Mass may well be offered or intended for all, but it can be fruitful only for those who accept it. The Eucharistic Prayer thus refers to those who accept it, in whatever form that acceptance takes.

6. Lastly, in line with the Instruction *Liturgiam Authenticam* (the document issued in 2001 by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments to regulate liturgical translations), translations should be more faithful to the actual prayer of the Church—the Latin text as given, and not as interpreted. It is intended and understood that further catechesis will explain that God our savior, “wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth” (1 Timothy 2:4).

Given the reasons above, the hope of the Church is that when the faithful hear the words over the chalice “for many,” they will be inspired to make a personal affirmation of their faith in—and desire for—the gift of salvation freely offered in Christ Jesus to the whole world.
