Wholehearted

Jesus insists that all religious rules, the witness of prophets and saints, and every aspect of faith rests entirely on wholehearted love of God, and loving others as ourselves.

A woman named Carla could not sleep one night. Restless, she opened her Bible and came upon these two greatest commandments. She realized, guiltily, how many things displaced God in her life. She hid behind baggy clothes and believed herself not good enough. Carla's parents had emphasized sin and a harshly judgmental God. Carla saw that the commandment was to *love* God, *love* neighbor, *love* self. The common thread was love, not sin, unworthiness, or judgment. Next morning Carla read the words again. Jesus said "love your neighbor *as yourself*." Carla equated self-love with selfish pride. She had to understand love in a new way. So began a new path for Carla. She prayed gratefully every day for God's love and blessings. Step by step, she changed.

Living Stewardship Now

Carla found an experienced spiritual director in her area to help her. To find a priest or qualified lay director, ask at the parish, a nearby religious retreat center, a seminary, or the diocesan offices.

Se sintió culpable al darse cuenta de cuántas cosas en su vida reemplazaban a Dios. Debido a que sus padres habían enfatizado en el pecado y en un Dios castigador, Carla siempre se sentía como poca cosa.

Pero se fijó en que el mandamiento era *amar* a Dios, *amar* al prójimo y *amarse* a sí misma. El común denominador era el amor, no el pecado ni el inmerecimiento ni las sentencias. A la mañana siguiente volvió a leer las mismas palabras. Jesús dijo "ama al prójimo *como a ti misma*". Carla identificaba el amor a sí misma con el egoísmo y el orgullo; de ahora en adelante tendría que entender el amor de una manera nueva. Y así comenzó un nuevo camino para ella. Diariamente empezó a darle gracias a Dios por su amor y bendiciones. Poco a poco ella fue cambiando.

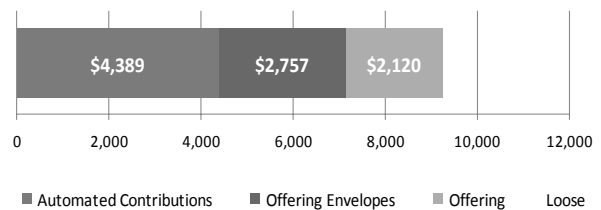

The Sound of Communion

The priest receives Holy Communion, and then there is movement, a bustle of activity, as we prepare to join the Communion procession. This holy meal does not happen in silence! Instead, we sing together even as we rise and move forward in procession to the altar. We must change and move to receive the Eucharist, and fittingly so, since the Eucharist is transformative—it demands action of us, internal as well as external. We do not receive the sacrament in silence, but with a dialogue that is also a profession of faith: “The Body of Christ.” “Amen.” “The Blood of Christ.” “Amen.” We acknowledge the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist with our “Amen” of faith, but more, our “Amen” is also a prayer that we may become what we receive, the Body of Christ, living and active in the world. We receive him not that he may become a part of us, but that we may become a part of him—part, too, of all the others who receive him, the whole communion of believers. — Corinna Laughlin, © Copyright, J. La Antigua Alianza

En la tradición bíblica, Dios se hace parte de la alianza como protector y salvaguardia de la misma. Es una alianza sencilla y poderosa: seré tu Dios y tú serás mi pueblo (Oseas 2:25). La alianza se daba por participación mutua, a partir de ella se es familia, se es uno y se corre la misma suerte. Se camina unidos hasta el final. Aunque esta alianza es entre Dios y el pueblo, no implica la misma categoría de ambas partes, tampoco igualdad de deberes, no es relación de súbdito con inferior. Dios siempre es fiel a su alianza; nosotros, no siempre. Esta es la relación de Dios con un pueblo concreto, con Israel. La alianza en sí misma es una acción sagrada y se castiga a los agresores. Se lleva a cabo mediante un juramento y quien no la cumpla, paga sus propias consecuencias. Ambas partes, plenamente libres, se adueñan de la alianza al formarla. Los ritos con los que esta alianza se marca son muy profundos: se corta la piel para derramar sangre, se mezcla y se bebe la sangre de ambas partes, se sumergen las manos en un recipiente lleno de sangre para simbolizar que se es uno solo. — Miguel Arias, © Copyright, J. Our Busy Lives Not Hearing God's Call

An alarm clock rings at 5:00 am and the snooze button gets hit more out of habit than exhaustion. We may have slept okay through the night. Five to fifteen minutes later the alarm clock is ringing again. Up out of the warm sheets, we rise to start the day. A bathrobe, a stop in the bathroom, a few stretches, coffee or tea or a protein shake for the healthy conscience. We begin the day.

Stereos, televisions, PDAs, phone messages, email messages, messages from whomever. Cats, dogs, mice or rats, kids (not necessary in that order) all come rushing at us. Dogs out the door, kids out the door, us out the door...., and the world starts coming at us with hoards of advertisements and tons upon tons of noise. And when we get downtown or wherever we are headed, who knows what will be coming at us.

Oh, the sweet thought of a quiet uninterrupted space. Let's find a nook or a corner where we can hide. Shut off the mobile phone, disconnect from the world for just a little bit and become quiet and reconnect into something greater, a silence. "I will just sit by myself," I say. "I don't want any company; I just want to be left alone."

There is only one challenge. Once we get into that quite uninterrupted space of silence, we don't know what to do. We are uncomfortable. After a very short period of time, we start looking at our email on our phones, start fidgeting with whatever is around us. We cannot quiet ourselves. "I'm not sure what to do, with the quiet," we think. A little bored and a bit irritated, we crawl back into the noisy world.

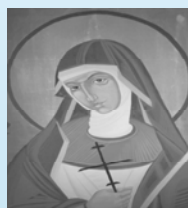
Trick-or-treating starts at 4:00 pm, followed by an Open House with food and drinks from until 9:00 pm in the Rectory.

The festivities are free, but we ask that you bring a non-perishable food item for the St. Teresa Food Pantry.



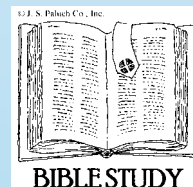

Connected to the Human Family

The laws of Exodus and the laws of Jesus set the structure of human life together. Because, as philosopher Alfred North Whitehead wrote, “We are attuned to coordinates wider than personality.”

An awful lot of philosophy, psychology and theology is packed into that simple statement.

Since everything is related to everything else in the cosmos, that means everything is coordinated. Every city is so many degrees latitude and longitude, north of one place and west of another. The same is true for countries, religions, restaurants and microbes. Every single thing is an entity in itself but is also coordinated with its surroundings. In fact, a thing is not really itself if it is uncoordinated, torn from its context. A thing arises out of its context.

Although this is equally true of every being, Whitehead and we are primarily interested in human beings. Only human beings have personalities, only human beings are self-conscious, only human beings realize that they are related, that they have coordinates.

Our first physical coordinate is our body. Our skin separates us from every other being; our senses enable other beings to impact us. But it is our spirit that translates this physical engagement and interprets it into human experience.

Our first personal coordinate is our own self. We are the only creature that stands outside the



self, and we can observe our self more or less, like or hate it, improve our self or let it crumble.

Many people are finely attuned to this coordinate of personality. All of life is perceived from

their personal perspective. In every situation they ask: What do I want, what do I need, what do I like, what do I hope for, what do I have to do, what can my country do for me, how can my family help me, how can I succeed, get rich, be popular, get a raise, meet a mate?

All of us must look at life this way sometimes. It is matter of personal survival, and we are obligated first of all to care for our own bodies, minds, emotions, spirit, self. But that is merely personal survival. To be fully human, we must extend our coordinates beyond our own self. If an earthquake in Japan, an epidemic in Ghana, a drought in India means nothing to us, we are humanly diminished. If starving children, tortured adults, grieving widows, homeless men and sick

cats do not move us, we are less human.

Whitehead said, “We are coordinated wider than our own personalities.” Our first external coordinate is our neighbor, the one closest to us physically, emotionally, by contract or covenant, by choice or by necessity. Our lives are enlarged by everyone we care for, worry about, take an interest in, love or even hate.

Social coordinates enrich and confirm individual destiny: family, church, club, country. These associations ground us in society, situate us in safe circumstances, tie us to familiar surroundings, support our efforts, coordinate our existence in the world.

Our ultimate coordinate is God. God is the master architect who designed the cosmos, set its coordinates, positioned every thing in space and time. God is the one who sustains all creatures in existence. God is the love that moves the sun and stars; God is a North Star that guides all movement, the magnetic pole that attracts all things. God is our personal compass who coordinates our journey through life.
