On Guard

In today's reading Saint Mark gets right to the point: be on your guard; stay awake; don't be asleep when the Lord arrives. Advent is a time to ponder three events: God's entrance into the world as a human child, God's coming into our world today, and God's glorious coming at the end of time. These reflect three promises: God's promise to bring salvation to all people, and Jesus' promises to be with his followers and to return at the end of time. We do not know when Christ will return. In the meantime we are gatekeepers and stewards. We must be ready to welcome Christ when he comes again. We must be attentive to God now: in the Eucharist; in the guise of the homeless, the hungry, the prisoner, the addict in whom Christ appears before us; and in the Spirit within us. We are urged to live with hope in our hearts for Christ's final return.

En Guardia

En el Evangelio de hoy san Marcos va directo al asunto: estén en guardia, velen; que el Señor no los encuentre dormidos a su regreso. Adviento es un tiempo para reflexionar en tres acontecimientos: la entrada de Dios al mundo en la persona de un niño, la venida de Dios a nuestro mundo de hoy y la venida gloriosa de Dios al final de los tiempos. Éstos a su vez reflejan tres promesas: la promesa de Dios de salvar a todos, la promesa de Jesús de estar con todos los que le siguen y la otra promesa de Jesús de regresar al final de los tiempos. Se nos insiste en que vivamos con esperanza en nuestro corazón hasta la última venida de Cristo.





Mark's Jesus

Mark's Gospel is the shortest and tersest of all four. The discourses of Jesus tend to be terser as well. Mark's portrayal of Jesus has none of the poetry of the Sermon on the Mount or the Sermon on the Plain as in Matthew or Luke, nor the extensive, reflective "I Am" discourses as in John. Mark's Jesus "cuts to the chase," we would say today. This is reflected quite well in today's passage.

It is no accident that the dialogue of Jesus at this point in the Gospel according to Mark—the concluding words about the end of the world—immediately before his passion, is riddled with exclamation points and an overall sense of urgency.

We would do well to re-tool our own way of living this Advent, for we live in a world urgently in need of hearing the message of Jesus proclaimed. It's time for us to "wake up!" and get out into the world to do it.

Treasures from our Tradition

Long ago in northern Europe, the growing dark and winter weather in Advent forced people to remove the wheels from their carts and replace them with snow runners. The wheels were hung high in the rafters of the house, fitted out with lanterns, and wound tightly with evergreen boughs. The first wreaths were windows into heaven, a source of light, a comforting sign of the victory of the light of Christ over our world's dark wildernesses, its mountainous obstacles, its valleys of need.

The Advent wreath started in the home, and only later appeared in church. Its four candles represent the four Sundays of our journey: typically three purple, one rose. Why not set a wreath in your own home as a place for Advent prayer? Don't let a shortage of purple candles discourage you: some use a deep blue, others have white candles and weave blue and purple flowers, seashells, and pine cones into the green. When the sun sets tonight, light a single candle, sing a verse of a well-loved Advent hymn, and name a mountain to be leveled, a valley to be filled.

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El Jesús de San Marcos

El Evangelio según San Marcos es el más corto y terso de los cuatro. Los discursos de Jesús tienden a ser concisos también. El retrato de Jesús que nos da Marcos no tiene nada de la poesía del Sermón del Monte o del Sermón de la Llanura como en Mateo ni Lucas, ni la extensión y reflexión de los “Yo Soy” los discursos en Juan. El Jesús de Marcos “va al grano”, diríamos hoy. Esto se refleja muy bien en el pasaje de hoy.

No es una casualidad que el diálogo de Jesús en este momento en el Evangelio según San Marcos, las palabras finales sobre el fin del mundo, inmediatamente antes de su pasión, esté plagado de signos de exclamación y una sensación general de urgencia.

Haríamos bien en remodelar nuestra manera de vivir este Adviento, ya que vivimos en un mundo con necesidad urgente de escuchar el mensaje que Jesús proclamó. Es hora de que nos “despertemos” y salgamos al mundo para hacerlo.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El significado de la palabra “¡Adviento!” es muy interesante. Viene del latín y quiere decir “Allí viene” o “Ya está llegando”. Pero, ¿de quién hablamos cuando proclamamos “adviento”? ¿Del Rey de la Gloria?, ¿del Príncipe de la Paz?, ¿del Hijo del Dios Altísimo?, ¿del Salvador de Israel? Sí, sí, sí y otra vez, sí, pero más todavía del Hijo del Hombre, del niñito de María. Allí viene y ya está llegando. Tenemos que estar preparados. Pero ¿cómo prepararnos para la llegada de un rey que es pobre?, ¿de un príncipe que nació entre una mula y un buey? ¿de un niñito que ya es todo un hombre y además es Dios? He allí el dilema del Adviento cristiano. Es un llamado a vivir la paradoja de un tiempo que está a medias, donde el Reino de los Cielos ya existe pero no en su plenitud. Es un llamado a buscar en el templo, en el *mall*, en el barrio, en el hogar y en el propio corazón, para ver si “allí viene” el dueño de la casa. Es un llamado a estar atentos y vigilantes.



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Where Does Contemplative Prayer Lead?

When I moved from the Midwest to the West Coast I went through a conversion. Life was not going to be the same. I quickly sensed it was going to change, but I was not sure how it was going to change. When I left full-time ministry and took a job in the business world I went through another conversion. When I went from being single to being married I experienced another conversion. Getting married was capital “C” conversion.

Every person walking the earth cannot escape capital “C” conversion. Sometimes it is a result based upon one’s decisions. At other times it just happens through the grace of God. I think about my children. My wife and I wanted to have children and it’s easy enough to say, “Let’s have kids.” But how many? But wow. My children have significantly changed my life, offered me initiative and space for conversion...for the good, thank God.

The practice of contemplation is the active work of little “c” conversion that will ultimately lead to capital “C” conversion. One takes on the practice of contemplative prayer in order to be converted into being the love and mercy of God. The inward and external result of contemplative prayer is conversion; conversion is by its nature the work of repentance. In conversion, one travels from a state of no union or a semi-union with God, to a state of total union with God.

Through contemplative prayer, one allows the presence of the living Christ to dwell in one’s heart. Therefore, the practice of contemplative prayer ultimately leads to a redemptive conversion of the heart where the love and mercy of God lives, dwells and has being. One becomes, as scripture so ardently exclaims, “One with Christ.”

Volunteers Needed For Parish Leadership Day



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
Active Waiting

Advent is a time of remembrance and expectancy. It focuses our spiritual lives, bringing together our past, our present and our future. On our Advent journey, we revisit the spiritual yearning our ancestors felt as they awaited the first coming of the Messiah. Strengthened by their faith, we renew our own belief in Jesus' presence and love in our present-day lives. Finally, we prepare for his second coming. We ready ourselves to rejoice in a glory yet unseen.

Waiting is not a popular pastime — yet if we do not learn to wait well, we will never be prepared for Christ's coming. Advent teaches us how to cultivate and maintain a spirituality of waiting.

So, how do we wait? First, we recall the goodness of God. This is not an easy task, particularly if our lives are filled with harshness rather than goodness, abandonment rather than love. Sometimes we have to rely on the remembrances of others. In today's first reading, Isaiah reminds us that God is a Father, a Redeemer, a Potter intimately involved in the unfolding of our lives.

The Advent season is filled with stories of faithful waiting. If we dare to sit with Isaiah and Hosea, Mary and Joseph, Elizabeth and Zechariah, Anna and Simeon, our vision will be forever transformed. Empowered by their unwavering faith in God's goodness and their ardent desire for the coming of the Messiah, we see the en-

We need to see the world anew if we are to interpret today's Gospel correctly. Here, Jesus implores us three times to "keep alert" or "keep awake." Sometimes this can sound like a frightening command. In my 'tween years I took this admonishment literally, and stayed awake all night. My newly formed conscience had convinced me I was doomed to hell. Fueled by fear, my alertness served no useful purpose. I was a sleepy, ineffective disciple, and I soon admitted defeat. Jesus doesn't require me literally to stay awake, I realized. He invites me to maintain an alertness that recognizes the goodness of God both around and within me.

While we recognize the faith of our spiritual ancestors, it is also essential to acknowledge our own sacred story, that we stay alert to our own unique salvation history. Keep alert: Who are your relatives, friends and acquaintances that demonstrate the divine in your life?

Keep alert: Which elements of nature illustrate the divine most forcefully for you? Keep alert: Your true vocation is written upon your very heart. Can you identify your divine purpose in this world? Are you clearly engaged in that purpose?

This type of alertness — alertness to the world around us, alertness to the world within us — makes us great disciples. This alertness is based upon hope rather than fear; it is active rather than passive waiting. We believe that what we wait for is already planted deep within us and will take root and bloom. We continue to live in the present moment and remain focused on the love of God. We prepare for our inevitable death.

During this Advent season, immerse yourself in the spiritual stories of your faith-filled ancestors. Have the courage to write your own salvation history. Hold this history with open hands. Allow your waiting for God, and God's waiting for you, to transform the world in which you live. Allow this Advent, the coming Messiah, this arrival to transform your life.
