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Yes, Lord!

God chose to announce the promised Savior to a young woman in a backwater village called Nazareth. In a small painting created over a thousand years ago, the artist shows the angel holding up one hand in greeting. Mary is standing facing him with her hands extended in welcome. The words of the angel are rich in power and promise: “you have found favor with God . . . [your child] will be called Son of the Most High . . . The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you” (Luke 1:30, 32, 35). Pure of heart and trusting completely, Mary answered God with a wholehearted “yes.” Through her cooperation, God broke into our world, breathing the same air we breathe, experiencing our sorrows and joys. God became flesh in the Son, Jesus Christ, born of Mary. The world would never be the same. The time is here to let him into our hearts and change us completely.



The Eternal God

King David wished that the ark of God might have a more permanent home. David may have envisioned something like the cedar palace where he resided. God had in mind something more: a throne where David's descendants would rule for ever, a kingdom where Jews and Gentiles alike would be welcome.

Mary's prayerful nature led to an even more disturbing message. She would conceive and bear a Son though she was not yet married. "How can this come about?" Mary wondered. "The Holy Spirit will come upon you," she was told (Luke 1:35).

Mary's acceptance of this difficult challenge ushered in this, the final age of God's reign. What was once a secret known only by chosen people like King David and his descendants must now be made clear to all so that, as Saint Paul wrote to the Romans, we can be brought to the "obedience of faith" "according to the command of the eternal God" (Romans 16:26). – Copyright © J. Treasures from Our Tradition

We are approaching the darkest, longest night of the year. For centuries, people in the Northern Hemisphere have kindled fires against the dying of the light, turning away the dark of the winter solstice, and leading the imagination to hope and new beginnings. It is thus easy to understand why these solstice celebrations of non-Christian Europe attracted the annual remembrance of the birth of Jesus Christ, the Light of the World.

In time the solstice migrated away from December 25, but the Christmas feast remained in place. From this day, a whole season of celebration developed, stretching from Advent through the days of Christmas, and even beyond to the February 2 blessing of the candles, and beyond that to March 25, the Annunciation, nine months before the next Christmas. Centuries ago, this was New Year's Day, and many reasoned that it was the date of Adam and Eve's fall, and the date of the Crucifixion. The message is clear: don't let your Christmas be over too soon. Keep the lights blazing into January, and savor the meaning of the feast! — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

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El Dios Eterno

El rey David deseaba que el Arca de Dios tuviera un hogar más permanente. David podría haberse imaginado algo así como el palacio de cedro donde residía. Dios tenía en mente algo más: un trono donde los descendientes de David gobernarían para siempre, un reino donde judíos y gentiles serían bien recibidos por igual.

La actitud devota de María llevó a un mensaje aún más inquietante. Concebiría y daría a luz un hijo a pesar de que aún no estaba casada. “¿Cómo podrá ser esto?”, preguntó María. “El Espíritu Santo descenderá sobre ti”, le contestó el Ángel (Lucas 1:35).

La aceptación de María de este difícil desafío marcó el comienzo de esta, la era final del Reino de Dios. Lo que antes era un secreto conocido solo por el pueblo elegido como el Rey David y sus descendientes ahora debe quedar claro a todos para que, como escribió San Pablo a los romanos, podamos llegar a la “obediencia de la fe”, “en cumplimiento del designio eterno de Dios” (Romanos 16:26).

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Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

De las muchas tradiciones latinoamericanas para celebrar el Adviento y la Navidad, las Posadas parecen ser lo mejor conocido en EE.UU. Tienen su origen en la última mitad del siglo XVIII cuando las estrepitosas Misas de Aguinaldo dejaron de ser celebradas en México. Para remplazar la festividad de esas Misas, los laicos decidieron celebrar en sus casas tomando lo que habían visto dramatizado en los templos, esto es, el recorrido de José y María mientras buscaban posada en Belén. Como las “Antifonas de la O” de la liturgia oficial cristiana, estas Posadas llegaron a ser celebradas nueve noches consecutivas.

200 años después, muchos latinos continúan celebrando las Posadas en EE.UU. Recuerdo como de niño cantábamos “En el nombre del cielo” recorriendo las calles del barrio hasta llegar a la casa donde nos abrirían con cantos, tamales, galletitas y chocolate. Ese recorrido de José y María lamentablemente sigue todos los días en los pasos temerosos y cansados de tantos inmigrantes en este país. Como la Sagrada Familia, otras familias latinoamericanas continúan buscando hospedaje con la esperanza de dar a luz una nueva vida para sus hijos e hijas. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. 

This fall we have 16 teens (7th, 8th and 9th graders) participating in the EDGE: a fun-filled youth group experience which includes confirmation preparation, learning practical life skills and community service. We meet most Sunday evenings from 7:00-8:30 pm in the Religious Education Center. Our first semester we have been learning about the seven principles of Catholic Social Teaching and how we can apply them to our lives.

The EDGE is designed to meet the educational, spiritual, emotional, and social needs of young adolescents. At this age youth are open to good and bad behaviors as well as positive and negative ideas. Many of the values and beliefs that they held as children are now questioned and challenged. As young adolescents they are trying to figure out who they are and what they believe. In many respects middle school kids are on the edge because so much is going on in their lives physically, mentally, spiritually, and socially. It can be a very stressful and difficult time for them and their parents. As a Catholic Community, we are going to give our middle school youth The EDGE they need in life: God's love that is made known to us through Jesus, The Word, The Eucharist, and the Church.

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More than a Myth


Advent celebrates two comings of Christ, two approaches of Christ in human history. The first is the birth of Jesus at Christmas; the second is the final visitation of Christ at the end of time. They are both momentous events — which is probably why we think of them in mythical form rather than in historical terms.

In myth, the goddess Athena springs full-blown from the head of Zeus. In myth, Caesar is born immaculate, out-fights young adversaries, quickly conquers the whole world and is later declared a god. In myth, Jesus makes clay birds fly, outstrips his little friends in wisdom and astounds the world — and a few chapters later is crucified. Jesus appears to come from nowhere, and just as quickly disappears from view.

That scenario may be somewhat accurate on his Father's side, since Jesus came from mysterious heaven. But his mother's side has an entirely historical background. None of us is simply dropped on earth un-attached. We all are products of environment and heritage.

Matthew traces the family of Jesus to Abraham, but it really goes back to Adam. Wives and prostitutes are recorded as his ancestors. He inherited the absolute faith of Abraham, the wisdom of Solomon, the lust of David, the courage of Esther.

Jesus is in a long line of prophets: men who stuck their

finger in a socket and charged the air around them with sparks. Jesus got his priestly attributes through Melchizedek; he has leadership genes from Moses and a contemplative instinct from Anna and Simeon. The confusion of Babel is somewhere in his psyche; the desert wandering of his people has scarred his memory; living under foreign domination has taught him prudence; the promise of a kingdom gave him hope.

So it is not a mythological hero we encounter in Advent. It is a flesh-and-blood person who shares our humanity in all things but sin.

The second and final coming of Christ lends itself even more easily to mythology. Because the Book of Revelation teems with mysterious symbols and catastrophic events beyond our experience, it is no wonder we reduce this panorama of divine providence to an

image of a shining man coming on a puffy cloud.

When the original Christians prayed, “Come, Lord Jesus,” they were expecting Jesus to reappear in person, defeat their enemies and install Christians as rulers in the kingdom.

When he arrived the first time, Jesus was the culmination of all that went before him. But when he died, he did not retire: He resurrected. He kept on living; he is living now; he will live until he comes again. And he is still incorporating all things human unto himself.

The future Jesus will incorporate in himself all the beauty, goodness and tragedy of humankind from the day of his ascension until the end of time. The coming Christ will include in his person the bravery of soldiers, the grief of widows, the holiness of saints. He will include the artistry of Shakespeare, Michelangelo and Bach.

The experience of the once and future Christ will also include the horror of Auschwitz, the genocide of Stalin, the annihilation of Hiroshima, terrorist attacks, rape, torture and starvation. Nothing human is alien to the model of humanity. Anything that Christ does not include in his own future coming cannot be saved.
