


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Promesa Cumplida

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My Polish Mother

My wife keeps telling me that I have to write a little book entitled "My Polish Mother" because she has given us so many entertaining stories. She is, I have to say, quite a remarkable woman. And this year she took on the Christmas Spirit in a new way.

I come from a big family, double-digit big. In a family that big, there is never a time of total peace. There is always one sibling quibbling with another. Over the past few years there have been two enormous rifts in the family: one rift among three brothers and another rift between two sisters.

Well, my wonderful Polish mother had had enough. This year, she told the family that if they were not going to talk to one another then she was not going to put up a Christmas tree. And she didn't this year.

How awesome. My hardheaded and hard hearted brothers decided to call one another and the word in the family is that reconciliation is in progress. "In progress" is the operable phrase because everyone knows that it is next to impossible to move a Polish mountain over night. My two sisters have yet to talk.

It is easy to fall into the thought that the birth of Jesus has to come to us from the outside with a guiding star and a legion of angels singing "Glory to God in the Highest" with all the fanfare and spot lights. Yet our Catholic faith teaches us that the birth of Jesus comes to us internally in the ordinary decisions we make day in and day out. My Polish mother made a simple decision, and as a result, reconciliation is breaking in where there once was darkness. What a great way to bring about the Spirit of Christmas.

Max Moses, the spouse of parishioner Kari Richardson, was just appointed Interim CEO of The *Inner Voice, Inc.*, an agency runs seven interim homeless shelters designed to keep families together as they transition back to permanent housing, enable self-reliance and provide hope.

Inner Voice has been serving the needs of Chicago's homeless for 27 years and provides services to over 7,000 clients a year. As you can imagine, times are tough and *Inner Voice* is in desperate need of basic supplies for those living in the shelters.

Inner Voice is asking St. Teresa parishioners to help by donating such items as:

- Toiletries including toilet paper, shampoo, soap
- Cleaning supplies
- Paper goods
- Silverware
- Plates
- Bowls
- Plastic cups

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Lord of All

Saint Paul was born and brought up a Jew with an excellent religious education. He expected a Jewish Messiah for the Jews, probably a great leader like King David. Jesus did not fit that profile. Paul was convinced Jesus' followers were deluded and dangerous, so he hunted them down. After his vision of Jesus on the Damascus road, Paul's outlook changed profoundly. He was wrong about Jesus and about Jesus' followers. He was wrong about a Messiah just for the Jews. Remarkably, he could admit that he was wrong! He knew he had been given an insight into the mystery of God's grace, which is universal and unconfined. These convictions took Paul and his companions out into the Mediterranean world on long, dangerous journeys. Jesus was born a Jew in Bethlehem yet, as Risen Lord, he is Lord of all nations and peoples. Paul knew this. It changed his mind. It changed his heart. It changed the world.
