View from the Tower

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You Will See

In today's Gospel, John the Baptist watches Jesus go by, and announces that Jesus is the promised Lamb of God. Andrew and another man follow Jesus, who asks what they are looking for. Their answer is strange: they want to know where he lives. Jesus replies, "Come, and you will see." The next day Andrew takes his brother, Simon, to meet the Messiah—the Anointed One. Jesus looks hard at Simon and, from what he perceives, renames him Peter ("the rock"). The two encounters are ordinary and yet life-changing. Jesus walks past John, and then offers Andrew and his friend hospitality and companionship. Jesus meets Peter, looks at him, assesses his character, and accepts him as a friend. The simplicity of Jesus' manner demonstrates his willingness to receive people "as they are" but also to see their potential. He does not offer explanations of who he is, but takes people to his home and lets them see for themselves.

Living Stewardship Now

Jesus sees you, accepts you, and welcomes you for who you are. Show your gratitude in *worship* of God, who loves and saves you; *service* to others in the parish and the community; *gifts* to the church and to good causes of your choice.



Lo Verás

En el Evangelio de hoy Juan el Bautista ve a Jesús venir hacia él y dice que Jesús es el Cordero de Dios prometido. Andrés y otro hombre siguen a Jesús quien les pregunta lo que andan buscando. La respuesta de ellos es extraña, pues dicen que quieren saber dónde él vive. Jesús responde: "Vengan a ver". Al día siguiente Andrés lleva a su hermano Simón para que conozca al Mesías, el ungido. Jesús mira a fondo a Simón y por lo que puede percibir, le da el nuevo nombre de Pedro ("la roca"). Los dos encuentros son ordinarios y produjeron un cambio de vida.

Jesús camina hacia Juan, y después le ofrece a Andrés y su amigo hospitalidad y compañía. Jesús conoce a Pedro, le echa una mirada, hace una valoración de su carácter y lo acepta como amigo. Esa sencillez demuestra su buena disposición para recibir a las personas "tal y como son", pero también les hace ver sus propias capacidades. No ofrece explicaciones prolongadas acerca de quién es él, sino que lleva a las personas a su casa y les permite ver por sí mismas.

La responsabilidad vivida ahora

Jesús te ve, te acepta y te recibe tal como eres. Demuestra tu gratitud *alabando* a Dios que te ama y te salva; *sirviendo* a otras personas en tu parroquia y comunidad; *ofreciendo* algo de tu dinero a la Iglesia y a las causas buenas de tu predilección.

The next Food Pantry Committee meeting is Monday, March 5th at 7:00 pm in the Parish Center.



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

Speak, Lord, We are Listening

In today's first reading God keeps calling out in the night to a sleeping boy. Neither the boy, Samuel, nor his teacher, Eli, understands who is calling. But God's persistence convinces them. Samuel is then ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10).

In the Gospel Jesus is out teaching. Various people notice him and begin to gather around. They soon become disciples and, like the young Samuel, are ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. "Speak," they say, "we are listening."

God's voice is always with us, awake or asleep. It swirls around us like fog on a waterfront, enveloping us, gently urging us to wake up, to listen. Awareness of the voice comes first; then willingness to listen; then, in time, the decision to act, to live according to God's word. Let's ask today for the ability to keep our ears open so we don't miss God's voice. — Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Every year, close to the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on January 25, and before the feast of the Chair of St. Peter on February 22, the cause of Church unity is commended to Christians everywhere. Sadly, Protestants, Orthodox, and Catholics have settled to a status quo of separation. When baptized people become Catholic, we speak of them as being received into "full communion." That means we already share a communion in faith in many ways, including the Word of God. Many Protestant denominations have received and revised the three-year cycle of readings first arranged by Catholics in the early 1970s. Therefore, many of your neighbors who are not Catholic are celebrating and reflecting on the same readings we are savoring on most Sundays of the year. This makes for a new spirit of cooperation among preachers of the gospel, and gives hope that the cause of reunion, desired by Christ, has great vitality at the table of God's Word, and will one day lead to unity at the table of the Lord's Body and Blood. — James Field, Copyright © J. 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Habla, Señor, Estamos Escuchando

En la primera lectura de hoy Dios llama repetidas veces en la noche a un niño dormido. Ni el niño, Samuel, ni su maestro, Elí, entienden quién está llamando. Pero la persistencia de Dios los convence. Samuel ya está listo; no para hacer algo todavía, pero dispuestos a escuchar. “Habla Señor, tu siervo te escucha” (1 Samuel 3:10).

En el Evangelio, Jesús está afuera enseñando. Varias personas lo ven y comienzan a reunirse alrededor. Pronto se convierten en discípulos y, al igual que el joven Samuel, están listos, no para hacer algo todavía, pero dispuestos a escuchar. “Habla”, dicen, “te escuchamos”.

La voz de Dios está siempre con nosotros, ya sea que estemos despiertos o dormidos. Se arremolina a nuestro alrededor como la niebla en una costa envolviéndonos, suavemente nos urge a despertar, a escuchar. Estar conscientes de la voz es lo primero; luego la voluntad de escuchar; y más luego, con el tiempo, la decisión de actuar, de vivir según la Palabra de Dios. Vamos a pedir hoy por la capacidad de mantener los oídos abiertos para que no se pierda la voz de Dios. –

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Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Según una vieja costumbre latina, no se les debe llamar por nombre a los niños mientras todavía están en el vientre de su madre. Mis padres siempre me hablaban por nombre durante el embarazo de mi mamá. Esto por supuesto molestaba a mi abuelita quien decía que si me iban a hablar por nombre sería mejor llamarle Tiburcio. La gran sorpresa de mis padres fue que nací el día de san Tiburcio. Gracias a Dios mis padres no eran tradicionalistas, sino tuviera que pasar mi vida con ese nombre.

Muchos latinoamericanos todavía siguen la tradición del onomástico; de dar a su hijo o hija el nombre del santo o de la santa en cuyo día nació. Esta costumbre se hace con doble intención: 1) para implorar la protección del santo sobre el recién nacido y 2) para que el niño o la niña tenga un buen ejemplo como modelo para su vida. Esta última razón implica tener que conocer e imitar al santo o a la santa.

Si tu hijo nace el 16 de enero puedes nombrarlo: Fulgencio, Acurcio, Adiuto, Frisio y Tolomeo. O si es niña, Priscila o el femenino de los previos. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Giz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.



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Any Spiritual Resolutions This Year?

I really don't like working out at the gym in January. Don't get me wrong. I generally work out five days out of the week. I just don't like it in January. The gym is filled with "tons" of people who have made New Year's resolutions. Neophytes generally, clogging up the machines and the weight room. The arrival of February comes as a relief.

Research shows that most people do make New Year's resolutions and that most participants will give up by the end of January. It's really anyone's guess; goals too lofty, too many big changes to tackle at once, not enough support from loved ones are just some of the reasons they fail.

How about on the spiritual side? Any spiritual New Year's resolutions for you? This was our last men's spirituality topic. Many concepts emerged, two are worth noting.

First, I have to make room. That is, in order to start doing something I want to do, I have to stop doing something else. Not uncommon for my life to become cluttered with activity that is not aligned with what I ultimately want to accomplish. These activities are not necessarily bad habits, they are just non-effective patterns of behavior. In the end, I have to stop doing something to make room for something new.

Secondly, I have to make room physically; I have to stop being a junk collector. I am convinced that my family has a junk collecting gene. Physically purging helps me. In the end, it becomes difficult for me to attach to something spiritual if I do not detach from something physical. Many Saints have written about this dynamic. Recall the quote from Matthew 6:21: "For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

If you have made resolutions this year, add in spiritual resolution. Stay strong, don't give up easily, be forgiving to yourself when you get off track, and most of all, make room.

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
Toward and Adult Faith

When I was in first grade, I fell in love with my teacher and decided that when I grew up I was going to be just like her. In high school I determined that entering a religious community would make me a “woman of God” just like the women I so admired. My early vocational wanderings were a roller coaster ride typically adolescent in nature. I would be up one minute, having found the perfect role model, and down the next when all did not go as planned.

While admiring others is a normal stage in the process of finding our own unique vocation, adult faith demands much more. In order to stand with the psalmist today and say, “Here am I, Lord; I come to do your will,” we must stand alone in our own shoes, ready to bear the burden of our own personal calling. How can we do this? In today’s readings, the prophet Samuel and apostles Andrew and Simon Peter show us the way.

The boy Samuel is half-asleep in his bed in the Temple when God first calls him. Too young to recognize the Lord’s voice, he goes to his mentor, the high priest Eli, thinking Eli has called him. Only after some discernment do they realize that the voice is coming from God. Samuel steps into adult faith and says, “Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.”

This story is a lesson for us: Expect to hear God speak. Stand on holy ground. Pray before sleeping,

again upon waking. Find a mentor skilled in discernment. Address God with boldness, stating your readiness to listen. Discern, then act.

In today’s Gospel, Andrew and Simon Peter amplify the lesson Samuel has already taught us, and they refine it further. They agree that one must prepare for and expect the call of God. They also understand the importance of a mentor and look to John the Baptist for guidance. Andrew teaches us the importance of contemplation when he asks Jesus where he lives. Call leads to conversation, and this invites an even deeper relationship.

Andrew also has the courage to share his call with his brother

Simon. They are invited to build community with Jesus. Contemplation and community are essential elements of an adult faith journey.

Today’s Gospel is all about recognition. John the Baptist points to Jesus and directs his own disciples to him. Andrew recruits Simon Peter, and together they seek out Jesus. Jesus, in turn, recognizes them. He responds to their questions and invites them to come and stay with him. He gives Simon a new name.

We need this same mutual recognition with God. Once we recognize God and God in turn calls us, nothing will ever be the same. Imitating others may get us started, but relying on them for our identity and vocation is not enough. Our personal search to discover God’s writing on our own hearts takes courage, but it is the only path of adult faith.

Many years ago I attended a covenant retreat given by Sister of St. Joseph Sue Mosteller, who served with the L’Arche Daybreak community in Ontario for over 30 years. During our week together she assured us that our vocation was written on our own hearts. Have the courage to listen and see and respond. Take the lessons from today’s readings. Read your own heart. Dare to say, “Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.” Step into the world of adult faith.
