We are planning an evening of reflection with Brad and Kevin, our parishioners who visited the people of St. Rose of Lima in Haiti. We have begun this mission which promises to expand in the coming months with a handful of parishioners desiring to go to the people of St. Rose of Lima to be of help. I encourage everyone who is able to attend this important evening that promises to expand the horizons of the heart. Not only do we have so much to give, but the people in this little village have much to give to us. We minister to each other.

I have been given the opportunity of going on sabbatical next Fall thru Spring (October thru April). I am still working on the details, but I am praying over the possibility of walking the Camino: a 500 mile pilgrimage across the northern tier of Spain. I would love to walk with someone but getting this much time off would be prohibitive for most people. Walking this far with just a backpack and a few maps will be quite the challenge for me. Perhaps I can even work in a visit to the city of our patron saint, Avila!

Our Ash Wednesday evangelization endeavor promises to be exciting and challenging: publicly witnessing to your faith can be very intimidating, but once the challenge is met, a certain way of strengthening one's ability to communicate our Faith. We can take pride in seeing our fellow parishioners rising to the occasion and taking a step out and announcing the Good News. It is not too late, anyone can sign up in the gathering space.

The Good News

Today's readings begin with a few verses from the book of Job. First, Job complains that his nights drag on endlessly. Then, worse yet, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; / they come to an end without hope" (Job 7:6). Not exactly encouraging, these lamentations, not when taken alone.

Most of us have been there, though, and the antidote is the "good news" that Paul found so compelling that "an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it!" (1 Corinthians 9:16). Paul felt driven to announce the gospel to as many people as possible, "to save at least some" (9:22).

This good news is the mystery of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, who lifted Simon Peter's mother-in-law from her sickbed with a mere touch of his hand. "The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons" (Mark 1:33-34)). Our woes and demons are as real as Job's, and Jesus is our savior. — Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

The story of Job seems at first hearing to be an extension of February's gloom into the liturgy. The monumental suffering of a good man is so horrific that the laments of the front page of modern newspapers barely measure up. The whole story is not long to tell, but its resolution is of great comfort. We can trace in its plot the stirrings of a belief in an afterlife, and in God's great power to right every wrong and raise human beings from suffering.

In the Gospel, we see the fulfillment of these longings in the hand of Jesus, grasping an ill woman by the hand and raising her up to vibrant life. Peter's mother-in-law becomes her best self, attentive to her guests, providing hospitality, the warmth of her laughter, the delights of her kitchen. Last week, at Candlemas, candles were blessed, including baptismal candles for some not yet born. Today is a day to check the fragile flame of your own baptismal candle. Against February's customary lethargy, its background whines and ailments, the liturgy summons us to life, grasps us by the hand, and sends us to serve in Christ's name. — James Field, Copyright © J. 
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Las Buenas Noticias

Las lecturas de hoy comienzan con unos versos del libro de Job. En primer lugar, Job se queja de que sus noches se alargan indefinidamente. Y luego, aún peor, “Mis días corren más aprisa que una lanzadera y se consumen sin esperanza” (Job 7:6). No son precisamente alentadoras estas lamentaciones, no cuando se examinan por separado.

La mayoría de nosotros ha estado allí, sin embargo, y el antídoto es la “buena noticia” que Pablo encontró tan convincente que sentía que predicarla “era su obligación. ¡Ay de mí, si no anuncio el Evangelio!” (1 Corintios 9:16). Pablo se sentía impulsado a anunciar el Evangelio a tantos como fuera posible, “para ganarlos a todos” (9:22).

Esta buena noticia era que el misterio de la vida, muerte y Resurrección de Jesucristo, que levantó a la suegra de Simón Pedro de su lecho de enferma con un simple toque de su mano. “Todo el pueblo se apiñó junto a la puerta. Curó a muchos enfermos de diversos males y expulsó a muchos demonios” (Marcos 1:33–34). Nuestros males y demonios son tan reales como los de Job, y Jesús es nuestro salvador. — Copyright © J. S. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El 11 de febrero, 1858 la Virgen María se apareció a tres niños franceses del pueblito de Lourdes. Allí brotaron aguas milagrosas con el poder de sanar enfermos. Eventualmente se construyó en Lourdes un santuario en honor de Nuestra Señora de Lourdes y millones de enfermos han recurrido a las aguas curativas. Muchos de los que visitan el santuario son latinos, porque a los latinos nos encantan los milagros y lo milagroso.

Pero ¿cuál es el afán de ver milagros? ¿Es que no podemos creer sin ellos? ¿Es que necesitamos demostraciones del poder divino antes de entregarnos a Dios? La Iglesia siempre ha canonizado santos y santas por cuya intercesión se han manifestado milagros, y ha buscado su poder de intercesión. Sin embargo, también ha insistido que es más importante una vida ejemplar, una vida dedicada al bien del prójimo que una vida prodigiosa. Hay que tener mucho cuidado, porque frecuentemente en nuestro afán por ver milagros estrepitosos en lugares lejanos, cerramos los ojos a ver los milagros de las personas que nos rodean, y que silenciosamente ayudan al necesitado. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Giz, OFM, Copyright © J. 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The Wheel of Life

At our last Men's Spirituality Session we facilitated through an exercise called "The Wheel of Life." There were six spokes to the wheel. These spokes were titled Social & Cultural, Physical & Health, Mental & Educational, Financial & Career, Family & Home and Spiritual & Ethical. At the center of the wheel was the word "You."

"Zero" at the center of the wheel and 100 where the rubber meets the road. If one scored oneself at 100 all around the wheel they would be meeting their goals in these six key areas of life. Of course that rarely happens. Some scores come in at 10 some at 40 some at 80.

The idea is to review where one is insufficient and then to create priority action items to bridge the gap, to increase the score. Interestingly enough, several side-topics emerged.

Letting Go: In order to increase a score in one area, one has to let go of some things in another area. This is not to say that one has to decrease the score in an area. Rather, it means that one has to make room. And we make room by focusing on a deficient area. We set a priority.

Balance: For many wheels, there was an imbalance. One spoke or another was at a 10 while others were at 80. Paying attention to a deficient area in one's life did not detract in other areas of one's life. Rather, paying attention to a deficient area in one's life enriched all the other areas of one's life. The idea was to shoot for a healthy balance.

Gratitude: For many of us, there was an overwhelming sense of gratitude for the lives we live, for what we have access to—family, friends, economics, etc. It is easy to sit back and get caught in a game of comparison to other people. I sense this is a human trait. But for most of us, we acknowledged that live a blessed life. And there was a sense of gratitude for this blessed life.






