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Three in One

Although Jesus does command his followers to baptize in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:19), the term “Trinity” is never appears in scripture. The Church believes that this truth has been revealed as the worshipping Church pondered its experience of God. It took three hundred years of such pondering before the Church declared the doctrine of the Trinity: the unity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as three persons in one divine Being. It is important to understand that “person” was traditionally understood as being in relationship to others. So the three persons of the Trinity are three in one: distinct, but one in being. As human beings in the likeness of our creator we cannot “go it alone” without dire consequences. We are all here to rely on one another, and find increasing joy in a faithful life.

Tres en Uno

Aunque Jesús envía a sus discípulos a bautizar en el nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo (Mateo 28:19) la palabra “Trinidad” no aparece nunca en las Escrituras. La Iglesia cree que esta verdad ha sido revelada a medida que la Iglesia reflexionó en su experiencia de Dios. Le llevó trescientos años de reflexión a la Iglesia antes de declarar el dogma de la Santísima Trinidad: la unidad del Padre, el Hijo y el Espíritu Santo como tres personas y un solo Dios. Es importante entender que “persona” era tradicionalmente entendida como un ser relacionado con otros seres. Así es que las tres personas de la Trinidad se entienden como tres en uno: tres personas distintas

y un solo Dios. Como seres humanos creados a imagen y semejanza de nuestro Creador no podemos “arreglárnosla solos” sin graves consecuencias. Todos estamos aquí para depender los unos de los otros y así encontrar siempre un gozo al vivir con fidelidad.




So far, \$48,777 has been collected or pledged through automated contributions. We have \$201,223 to go to reach our goal.

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Today's Readings


First Reading — Ask now of the days of old: Did anything so great ever happen before? Was it ever heard of? (Deuteronomy 4:32-34, 39-40).

The Mystery of the Blessed Trinity



Today we celebrate the solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. The Church sets aside this Sunday to focus our attention on the mystery of the Blessed Trinity, God who is one, but three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The first reading from Deuteronomy emphasizes both God's awesome greatness and amazing nearness. It might seem beyond belief, but the God of all creation speaks to us, protects us, and guides us. The second reading from Saint Paul's Letter to the Romans describes how we are to relate to the three persons who are one God. We are led by the Spirit to meet God the Father as adopted children. Our adoption is such that we are even heirs with our brother, Christ, the second person of the Trinity, in whose sufferings we must also share. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus speaks with his authority as God and sends us to teach and baptize in the name of the Trinity. —Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Even though the Easter season has drawn to a close, today's feast still basks in the glow of Easter's twilight. To believe that we are made in the image and likeness of God—a God whose inner life is described in terms of community—is to recognize that we are in relationship with one another. In the language of the liturgy, we do not each stand alone before God, but constantly affirm this truth in the very words of our prayers. “We believe, we offer, we ask you,” we say, or “have mercy on us, hear us, listen to our prayer,” and in preparation for Communion, we pray the perfect prayer to “Our Father.”

To be baptized is to enter into the life of a community of faith. Nowhere is this sense of community more focused than at Sunday Mass, when we respond to the love of the Father by being together in Christ, embraced by the Spirit, for the sake of the world. Today has been called an “idea feast,” and impossible to grasp fully. Yet, as the readings today explore, the Trinity is not a concept traced like a triangle on a blackboard. It is the air we breathe, the sign we trace on our bodies as a pledge and promise of God's love. —James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

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El Misterio de la Santísima Trinidad

Hoy celebramos la solemnidad de la Santísima Trinidad. La Iglesia dedica este domingo a centrar nuestra atención en el misterio de la Santísima Trinidad, Dios, que es uno, en tres personas: Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo.

La primera lectura de Deuteronomio hace énfasis en la grandeza imponente de Dios y su cercanía asombrosa. Puede parecer increíble, pero el Dios de toda la creación nos habla, nos protege y nos guía. La segunda lectura, tomada de la carta de San Pablo a los Romanos, describe la forma en que se relacionan las tres personas que son un solo Dios. El Espíritu nos guía para cumplir con Dios Padre como hijos adoptivos. Nuestra adopción es tal que somos incluso los herederos de nuestro hermano, Cristo, la segunda persona de la Trinidad, cuyos sufrimientos también debemos compartir. En el Evangelio según San Mateo, Jesús habla con la autoridad de Dios y nos envía a enseñar y bautizar en nombre de la Trinidad. – Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

La mayoría de los cristianos fuimos bautizados en nuestra infancia o niñez en nombre de la Santísima Trinidad; es por eso que continuamente hay que recordar y aceptar nuestro bautismo y el reto de vivir según el Espíritu de Jesús como hijos e hijas de Dios. Esto se hace cada vez que nos persignamos o santiguamos con la señal de la santa cruz. Así mismo, nuestra fe y religión cristiana esta fundamentada en la Santísima Trinidad y cada persona que entra en nuestra familia tiene que pasar por la cruz y la resurrección.

La señal de la cruz la trazamos en nuestro cuerpo desde la frente hasta nuestro vientre; del hombro derecho al hombro izquierdo— poniendo nuestro corazón casi al centro de este misterio. Muchos latinos terminan la señal poniendo el pulgar sobre el índice en forma de cruz y besándola confirmando el amor que nosotros tenemos por la cruz de Jesús y el hecho que cargamos en nuestros cuerpos el efecto de esa cruz, la reconciliación con Dios. Our men's spirituality group will every now and again make a visit to someone in the parish that is struggling with an illness or is in recovery from a medical situation. A couple of week's back it was my turn to make a visit to Br. Tony Kreutzjans.



As you may or may not know, Br. Tony was with us at St. Teresa for many years. Due to a transfer several years back he was not able to attend services as often as he liked, but he kept in contact with many of us.

It was a surprise to learn two years back that Br. Tony underwent surgery to remove a brain tumor the size of golf ball. The doctors told Br. Tony that he had stage four cancer and that he had less than six months to live. That was over two years ago.

Br. Tony is now living in the greater Detroit area at a center for Jesuits. My visit with him was fantastic. After breakfast, he showed me around the facility which is quite big and quite active with many groups. He is in great spirits. His doctors are excited that he is "beating the odds" with his cancer.

Br. Tony is not out of the woods. He takes Chemotherapy via a pill. He also struggles with minor colds and rashes and other things due to his immunity being down. He is faithful to his treatments, is in really good spirits and sends his love and prayers to us all. Please pray for him.

Five-Act Relationship

The Blessed Trinity is the greatest mystery, God's inner life, our most important article of faith. It deserves endless meditation.


Our relationship with God is not a doctrine or a list of doctrines — it is an ongoing affair. However, it does have specific incidents that give it direction, important occurrences that move the plot along. Our story is like a play in five acts: Creation, Fall, Israel, Jesus and Church.

Act One: Creation. It all begins with Creation, at least as far as we know. The setting is a lush garden; the characters are God, a man and a woman. Genesis especially notes that God and humans were close friends, taking a walk each evening and talking things over.

Act Two: Fall. But there was a snake in the garden: some unknown evil influence that encouraged a rift between God and his new friends. The story wants to be clear that the fault was not God's, that humans are responsible for their decisions but are not as free as they might think.

This Fall chapter closed immediate access to God and began a sad history of increasing evil until God almost stopped the whole story. Yet, having pity on poor humans, and not wanting to scrap a basically good storyline, God began ...

Act Three: Israel. Just as God included a pair of humans in his original act, so God continues his play by working with a group of people called Israel and with individual representatives among them according to circumstances. There was the original Abraham, the liberator and lawgiver Moses,

King David, wise Solomon. And whenever the people strayed too far from the plot, God chose prophets to whisper "asides" to remind Israel of its lines.

Act Four: Jesus. This is the climax, the high point of the drama. God got involved immediately in the action by inserting his own Son in the middle of the plot. The job of Jesus was to reconcile humans with their God after the Fall. He did this by becoming completely human, sharing all human highs and lows — all the way to death. By letting his innocent self be executed by evil forces, Jesus concentrated all evil in his own person and took it to death with himself. From that moment into all eternity, the salvation of humankind is assured. No matter

what bad things happen in history, no matter what befalls individual humans, the story of God and creation will have a happy ending.

Act Five: Church. That can sound like a self-advertisement if we read it wrong. The church is not an organization: The church is the people of God. The church is not just the bishops and pope: The church is all the followers of Christ (in the same way the United States is not just Congress, but all citizens who are animated by a common spirit). The spirit of the church is the Holy Spirit, God's own Spirit, the Spirit of the Father and the Son. This Spirit inspires the body of Christ in the way she inspired the body of Jesus. The church is how God carries the plan for Creation to its conclusion. Act Five is the last act, which climaxes in the end of history, the end of the world.

Then comes the epilogue, *epi-logos*: the last word, which concludes all words since the prologue, *prologos*: the first word, through whom all things were made. All the players of all time assemble on stage. All loose ends are connected. The Word of God gathers all creation to himself and hands it over to his Father. **Lower the Curtain.**
