In the last century attention to Eucharistic devotions declined, while more people received frequent Communion. Recent efforts to revitalize adoration of Jesus in the Eucharist through Perpetual Adoration, Corpus Christic celebrations, and Eucharistic Congresses have brought us back into balance. At Mass, when we receive Communion we are honoring and cele-

brating the precious gift of the Lord's own Body and Blood. Communion is a fulfillment of Christ's promise to be always with us. And Jesus in the Eucharist always requires a response from us. At the end of every Mass we are sent forth to love and serve the Lord. He gives us his very self—the greatest gift of all—so that we can go into the world and give in return.




So far, \$68,902 has been collected or pledged through automated contributions. We have \$181,098 to go to reach our goal.

Sacrifice



Today the Church focuses on the Eucharist. Today's readings remind us how connected to ancient blood sacrifices we are when offering our unbloody sacrifice. The reading from Exodus describes a solemn ritual designed so the Israelites would never forget their covenant with God.

The reading from the Letter to the Hebrews turns us from those ancient animal sacrifices, the first efforts to worship the living God. Our sacrifice is the body and blood of the Son of God. Because of Christ we have a new covenant.

The Gospel from Mark retells the establishment of that covenant, the familiar story of the Last Supper. Juxtaposed with the story of animal sacrifice as it is here, we are challenged to listen with new attention, to remember the great price paid for our salvation. Treasures from Our Tradition

A new name for this feast, long known as *Corpus Christi* or "Body of Christ," points to an important recovery of Communion from the shared chalice, the Precious Blood, in the Roman Catholic liturgy. For many centuries, only the priest received from the chalice. Now, over the last forty years, the cup has been offered more frequently to the faithful. Sadly, perhaps because it is not offered at all Masses, or because people are free to pass by the offered cup, it can be seen by some as a "take it or leave it" option.

Some important meanings surface, however, when we drink from the common cup, such as our desire to participate in the pouring out of Christ's love. Bread is the staff of life, eaten by necessity even in times of pain. Wine, on the other hand, is the mark of festivity, a pledge of joy, a sign of unity between our altar table and the banquet feast of heaven. The center of the Gospel today is Jesus speaking of the pouring out of his blood, and his offer of a cup of blessing to be shared as a sign of his love. 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Sacrificio



Hoy la Iglesia se centra en la Eucaristía. Las lecturas de hoy nos recuerdan la gran conexión que existe entre los sacrificios de sangre de la antigüedad y el sacrificio incruento que ofrecemos ahora. La lectura del Éxodo describe un rito solemne para que los israelitas nunca olviden su pacto con Dios.

La lectura de la Carta a los Hebreos nos lleva de los antiguos sacrificios de animales a los primeros esfuerzos para adorar al Dios vivo. Nuestro sacrificio es el Cuerpo y la Sangre del Hijo de Dios. A causa de Cristo tenemos una nueva alianza.

El Evangelio según San Marcos relata la creación de ese pacto, la conocida historia de la Última Cena. Si contrastamos la historia del sacrificio de animales que vemos aquí, se nos desafía a escuchar con nueva atención, para recordar el gran precio que pagó por nuestra salvación. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Los cristianos creemos que Jesucristo esta físicamente presente en el pan y el vino consagrado durante la misa. Esta creencia es tan antigua como nuestra Iglesia, pero fue solo en el siglo XIII que los cristianos comenzaron a venerar la presencia sacramentada de Jesús en la hostia. Fue durante esta época que nació la fiesta de Corpus Cristi o la actual Celebración del Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo. Muchas comunidades cristianas celebran esta fiesta con procesiones y cantos en honor al santísimo sacramento del altar.

Recuerdo que en Texas el pueblo Méxicoamericano cantaba: "Bendito, bendito, bendito sea Dios, / los ángeles cantan y alaban a Dios (2x). Yo creo Dios mío que estas en el altar / oculto en la hostia ten vengo adorar (2x)". Este canto enfatiza la verdadera presencia de Jesús en el pan consagrado, pero sus cantores ignoran el hecho que nosotros también fuimos consagrados en el bautismo; consagrados para "alter Cristus" (otro Cristo) en el vecindario. En un mundo donde menos gente asiste a Misa el único Corpus Cristi que la mayoría de la gente secularizada verá es tu cuerpo. 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The Kiss of God

The Eucharist has become problematic for many Catholics. They celebrate Mass less often and they are less convinced of the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. The immediate reason is that many people no longer have a personal, direct experience of God.


When a dog sees a rabbit, it eagerly chases it, barking for joy. Other dogs hear the barking and start chasing too. But after a while they quit, because they are not chasing the rabbit, but the dog. No wonder people give up the chase when they realize that they are living on other people's faith, when they have never personally met God.

Another problem with the Eucharist is that it celebrates the death and resurrection of Jesus. But that happened 2,000 years ago. How can we realistically have any experience of that long-past event?

It happens through the gift of memory. Liturgists call it a special kind of memory: anamnesis.

Bob held the memory of that fateful day when his brother saved him from drowning. Every year, he would have a special drink to memorialize the event. The first anniversary, he could still see the swirling water and feel the fear and enjoy the relief of being saved. But each year, he remembered less and less. Until he finally remembered only that it was time to have that drink.

Unless we keep refreshing the memory of how Jesus saved us

by his life and death, unless we recall the vivid details of the life and death of Christ, then we naturally recall less and less — until receiving holy Communion becomes little more than a vague memory of some past religious reality. Something that happened to somebody else.

An old rabbi used to go to a special spot in the woods, light a fire and say a prayer — and God would come. When he died, his son would find the spot and say the prayer but forgot how to light the fire. Still, God appeared. When he died and his son took over, he found the spot but couldn't light the fire or remember the prayer. But God came. When he died, his son could not light the fire, say the

prayer or even find the spot. All he could do was tell the story of what had happened long ago. And behold! God appeared!

All we have to do is gather around the table and tell the story of how, once upon a time, our brother saved us.

Much ink has been wasted on the precise nature by which bread and wine become the body and blood of Christ. Each century has its favorite explanation according to current theological and scientific theories: transubstantiation, trans-essentialism, transsignification. These are no more than words to mark the transit from bread and wine to body and blood. They don't prove a thing; they don't make it work.

It works in the same way a kiss works. We can analyze the mechanics of a kiss, measure the pheromones exuded, gauge the activity of the muscles involved — but none of that explains how a kiss works. Nor would a 500-page dissertation on the essence of a kiss further enlighten us. And to wonder about how a kiss works while engaged in a kiss would destroy the effect. A kiss really works only when we lean into it and let ourselves go.

Holy Communion is our most intimate, physical contact with the risen Christ. Holy Communion is the Kiss of God. The best way to enjoy it is just to lean into it and let yourself go.

Children's Religious Education

Religious education is offered for children from age 3 through 8th grades. Two programs are offered -Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (a Montessori program) and a middle school program for 7th and 8th grade.
