In 2000, Pope John Paul II dedicated the Basilica of Saint Bartholomew in Rome as a shrine to all Christian victims of twentieth-century wars and persecution. In 2008, Pope Benedict XVI visited the basilica and spoke of the great love of those saints, known and unknown, who suffered for Christ. The basilica is in the care of the Community of Sant'Egidio, founded in Rome by high school students in 1968 and now expanded around the world. Pope Benedict was celebrating this community's fortieth anniversary.

Like the members of the Community of Sant'Egidio, we should observe and value the images of the saints in our church. 




Weekly Collections Recap For August 5, 2012



Civil Discourse



“Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God.” These words bring us up short! What could we be doing to grieve the Holy Spirit? Alas, the same things that the Ephesians were doing in the time of Paul, that is, fighting, shouting, reviling each other with fury, anger, and malice. Just tune in to talk radio some day or observe some “road rage” on the expressway. If we who are partakers of the Body of Christ can treat one another this way, what does that mean about our belief in Christ’s message of peace and reconciliation? The Eucharist is the sacrament of unity. It is communion with God and with each other. A good first step would be to speak civilly to each other, even in disagreement!

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Treasures from Our Tradition

The roots of this week’s feast of the Assumption can be traced back at least to the fifth century, when it is noted in the Armenian lectionary. Celebrated in Jerusalem, the feast in honor of the *Theotokos*, the Mother of God, became the principal feast of Mary throughout the Christian world. The place of celebration was at the tomb of Mary in Gethsemane and was therefore known as the “Dormition of Mary.” In some cultures this feast is celebrated today with a resting statue of Mary, much like a wake service of modern times.

The liturgy of this feast provides images of “the place of your rest” in Psalm 132, and reverence for the Ark of the Covenant that held the signs of the Promise. Like that Ark, Mary is for us the ark of the Savior, the one who bore the Son of God. When the doctrine of the Assumption was defined in 1950 the Gospel reading for the feast was changed to include the verses of Mary’s song, the Magnificat. The scripture readings for both the vigil Mass and the Mass of the day speak to us of life after death as well as the path to be followed in order to reach it. The key to this promised immortality is found as we take to heart the words of the vigil’s Gospel, “Blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it.”

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Tiny Steps in Obedience

Every now and again I get into a conversation with someone who is not all that familiar with the Catholic faith. As you can imagine, all kinds of interesting questions emerge. One question is a question about obedience. "Do priests really have to make a vow of obedience?"

The question is almost always asked with a sense of amazement and sadness. That is, for most men, they cannot see themselves being obedient to anything except their own will to make certain things happen in their lives. Being obedient to anything other than oneself is like choosing to live the life of a wimp. Who would do that? It is so unmanly to not be my own master.

Saint Paul teaches us that we would be better off not getting hung up on obedience. It is a fact of life and our thinking that we are obedient to ourselves is an illusion. That regardless of what I may think or perceive I am in fact obedient to something, and it's not me. More importantly, true freedom comes to us through an act of obedience. It is one of the great paradoxes of our faith. The more critical question to be asking is, "To what or to whom am I obedient?"

How do I really advance my relationship with God? How do I dispel the illusion that God is not living in me? I do this by my obedience. I surrender to the precepts of the Gospel and become obedient to the values and teachings of Jesus the Christ. This takes a lot of muscling up to, a lot of courage. It is not simply having a certain attitude toward life and faith. It requires action. I become obedient and in my obedience I become truly free.

Christmas quite yet, we are planning something special for the 9:00 am Mass on August 19, 2012. Please bring a new, unwrapped item that is suitable for children of all ages to any of the Masses that weekend. These gifts will be delivered to the Comer Children's Hospital at the University of Chicago, where doctors and nurses undertook heroic efforts to extend Isabella's life.

Another reason we have chosen Comer is that a significant number of the patients at Comer do not have insurance or the private means to pay and receive care, which is paid for with Medicaid or other subsidies. The gifts do not need to be elaborate or expensive. Books, pencils, pads, crayons and other arts and crafts materials will go a long way to put a smile on the kids' faces.

Please make certain that the gift is new because so many of the kids have weak immune systems. Gifts should not be wrapped so staff at Comer can decide what to distribute to each child. The hospital staff will then wrap the gifts.

We are doing this at this time of year because it is unexpected and will hopefully be a wonderful surprise for the kids and will help lift their spirits a bit. To add to the feeling of that Christmas morning surprise, the songs at the 9:00 am Mass on Sunday will have a Christmas theme. So, come prepared to sing some Christmas carols even though the temperature will be in the '90s. And please bring a gift to help honor the memory of Isabella Feliciano.

Catholics worship God in a variety of ways, but the main act of our communal worship is the Liturgy of the Eucharist; we call it Mass.




But how much do we really know about the Mass, what goes on during Mass, and its meaning?

Get Up and Eat

Millbrook Crescent, Ontario, the intergenerational epicenter of the Johnson clan, was the place I called home.


Grammy and Pop lived with us, so our address was an ever-popular destination; aunts, uncles and cousins traveled from near and far. Prior to anyone's arrival, Grammy would dedicate a full day to making her raisin bread and buns, a family favorite.

First the kitchen air would be pregnant with flour as she whirled about the kitchen with handfuls of this or that. Later, with firm intent, she would knead and punch the dough. Finally the smell of baking would fill our home and greet our guests. In our home, food equaled love.

In the Hebrew scriptures, the dispensation of daily bread from heaven also indicated God's love. In today's first reading, Elijah receives just such a blessing, with an angel of the Lord delivering two meals to strengthen him on his journey.

While the physical delivery of bread from heaven was in itself miraculous, it was but a foreshadowing of a spiritual banquet yet to come. Those who knew and understood the Hebrew scriptures with their hearts awaited the Messiah and an everlasting banquet that would feed both physical and spiritual needs.

Unfortunately, when Jesus began speaking of himself as that long-awaited bread that would sat-

isfy all hungers, most of the listeners who heard him were blinded by his ordinariness.

Was he not just the son of Mary and Joseph? Didn't he live just up the street from us and drink water from our well? They had been expecting their messiah to come and wield great political power and bestow honor and glory upon them. Now Jesus, son of a carpenter, is saying that he is the bread of life. This didn't fit with their vision of the coming of the messiah. Many turned away.

So here we stand at a Mass 2,000 years after Jesus walked the earth. God places before us a banquet of bread and wine, body and soul food, and invites us to get up and eat. Are we ready to do so, or are our hearts and souls blinded by ordinariness?

For most of us, Mass has become a routine part of our lives. Babies cry, readers falter, homilies cease to inspire. We have lost the wonder; we have lost the mystery. The miracle of Communion feeds

neither our hearts nor our souls because we have lost our sense of awe. How do we regain it?

Expectancy is an important attitude. When we pray, "Give us this day our daily bread," we need to believe that our request will be granted. We must fully acknowledge and embrace our dependence on God. This depth of humility opens our minds, our hearts and our souls to the love of God.

Our ancestors in the desert and the Christians in the Acts of the Apostles can be our guides. They yearned to experience the love of God; they trusted they would be fed.

Whenever I remember Grammy's raisin bread, I feel enfolded in love. God yearns for his love to be just as palpable as raisin bread. To reach us, he uses scripture and the sacraments.

This week, immerse yourself in scripture; come to Communion and expect to be fed. Get up and eat; otherwise, the journey will be too much for you.
