A Life with God



People find some of Jesus' teachings very hard to accept. Some of the disciples mentioned in today's Gospel are no exception. They could not accept what Jesus had just said about himself as the bread of life, so they left. We often hear, "I'm not religious, but I am very spiritual." Either the person has seen and rejected a life of faith, or has not understood what a life of faith requires and is seeking meaning and emotional comfort elsewhere. We bear some responsibility for this. The best way for people to recognize Jesus is through our example. Bracelets inscribed with the letters WWJD? (What Would Jesus Do?) have become very popular recently. Perhaps a better way to say this is "What Would Jesus Have *Me* Do?" The responsibility is not on Jesus but on us. Like Joshua in today's first reading. "Decide today whom you will serve . . . we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15).

("¿Qué haría Jesús?", por sus siglas en inglés) se han hecho muy populares recientemente. Tal vez una mejor manera de decir esto sería: "¿Qué *me* pediría Jesús que hiciera?" La responsabilidad no recae en Jesús sino en nosotros. Escuchemos y contestemos la pregunta que hace Josué en la primera lectura de hoy: "Digan aquí y ahora a quién quieren servir . . . serviremos al Señor" (Josué 24:15).






Weekly Collections Recap For August 19, 2012

Decisions

There is an axiom that states, "Not to decide is to decide." This saying was popular in the turbulent times of the Vietnam War. It urged us not to allow others to answer the moral questions raised by our nation's involvement in that terrible conflict, but to decide for ourselves. Making such choices is never easy. Avoiding them is common. Jesus, for his part, was not only a gallant risk-taker, but a clear decision-maker. As he pursued the mission to which the Father called him, he continually decided for us and for the Father. He worked hard to lay out a scenario that would enable others to make similar choices. Never did

he make decisions for others or force others into decisions, even decisions that had eternal ramifications. Jesus is inviting us to make such decisions today. We won't be absolutely sure. What is sure, however, is the command that issues from God's word: Take the risk. Decide! -

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Treasures from Our Tradition

The Eucharist was never meant to be only "comfort food," something that makes us feel warm and satisfied. It is to be bread for the journey, nourishment for the task that God has set for our community and for each one of us. Thus it is not surprising to see some walk away in today's Gospel, for they understood that recognizing Jesus as the bread of life is a commitment to changing one's life.

St. Augustine, whose feast we celebrate this week, once observed that in celebrating the Eucharist we become what we receive, the Body of Christ. As we conclude the series of reflections in John's Gospel on Jesus as the bread of life, it is appropriate to think about the role that the Eucharist plays in our lives and in our parish. It is in the Eucharist that we are nourished and renew our commitment in faith to serve the Lord. How does the parish social ministry carry out that mandate? How do you carry it out in your own life? Is it related in any way to the celebration of the Eucharist? How does celebrating Mass Sunday after Sunday make a difference in your life and in the world? - James Field, Copyright © J. S. La Toma de Decisiones



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Hay un axioma que dice “No decidir es decidir”. Este dicho fue muy popular en los turbulentos tiempos de la Guerra de Vietnam. Nos instaba a no permitir que otros respondieran a las cuestiones morales planteadas por la participación de nuestro país en ese conflicto terrible, sino decidir por nosotros mismos. Esa clase de decisiones nunca es fácil. Evitarla es común. Jesús, por su parte, no solo era un valiente arriesgado, sino un claro tomador de decisiones. Al buscar cumplir la misión a la que el Padre lo había llamado, continuamente tomó decisiones por nosotros y por el Padre. Trabajó duro para establecer condiciones que permitieran a los demás tomar decisiones similares. Nunca tomó decisiones por los demás ni forzó a nadie a tomarlas, incluso las decisiones que tenían ramificaciones para la eternidad. Jesús nos invita a tomar estas decisiones hoy día. No estaremos absolutamente seguros. Lo que es cierto, sin embargo, es el mandato que sale de la Palabra de Dios: arriésgate. ¡Decide!

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Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Narcisa de Jesús Martillo Morán nació el día de san Narciso (29 de octubre, 1832), hija de campesinos ecuatorianos. Vivió su vida como costurera y doméstica. Falleció en Perú en 1869. Su fe se distinguió por su amor a la presencia de Jesús sacramentado en la Eucaristía, sus prácticas de penitencia y sus obras de caridad.

Cuando aún era joven, conoció la vida de la recientemente beatificada y ahora santa, Marianita de Jesús, “la Azucena de Quito” (1618-1645). La vida de esta santa mujer latina la inspiró a vivir como mejor cristiana, buscando ser guiada espiritualmente por una serie de directores espirituales.

En esta laica beata, encontramos dos puntos de reflexión para nosotros los latinos. El primero es la necesidad de conocer nuestros santos latinos no sólo para recurrir a ellos sino para imitar su santidad. Lo segundo es la necesidad de buenos directores espirituales, ya sean sacerdotes, religiosos, religiosas, laicos o laicas. La dirección espiritual es una práctica antigua en nuestra Iglesia y muchos hombres y mujeres han sido directores espirituales para guiar a personas como Narcisa, ayudándoles en el camino a la santidad.

The Way

There's a movie out titled *The Way* starring Marti Sheen. It is based on a true story about an eye doctor that has to go to Europe in St. Jean Pied de Port to get his son who died while hiking the trail to Santiago de Compostela. Some of you may have heard about the trail to Santiago de Compostela. It is the same trail that our Pastor, Father Frank, is going to walk on his sabbatical.

I recently had the chance to walk a small piece of The Way this summer. I was in France during the month of July and my last two weeks I went on a camping trip with the Scouts de France. We were all split into teams of four or five people. We did a lot of backpacking through the Pyrenees. We even got to go on a trek with only our team for three days with no adults!

On the first day of our journey our team got lost and we ended up asking a nice French man for a ride. The second day we walked thirty kilometers, approximately twenty miles. It was the hardest hike we had to face. We walked from 7:30am to 6:00pm, up and down and up again through the mountains with our heavy backpacks, surviving off of only two pieces of brioche, a granola bar, and a cup of hot chocolate. By the end of the day, everything hurt.

The odd thing for me about walking The Way is that I didn't know was on The Way. I learned about the trail to Santiago de Compostela and the movie titled *The Way* from a waitress at a bar owned by a little Italian man named Jacques. This guy was quite the character, and his bar even made it in the movie.

Anyway, when I got back to the States I learned a lot more about the trail to Santiago de Compostela and *The Way*. For many us, our lives are like my hiking experience. We are all on a journey in life. There is the outward journey of accomplishing our life goals and there is the inward journey of our spirit. Our outward journey of our goals can be clearly mapped out and defined. Our inward journey of our spirit..., well, like I said, it is like my trip, I was on The Way and did not even realize it. .

Automated Contributions




Back to Basics

The disciples walked away from Jesus. And many people are now leaving the church. But there was and still is a hunger for God. People are searching for an experience of God, a taste of the divine. Some of them want to feel God because they have tried everything else and have been left empty. Others want to experience God because they simply enjoy experience, and so want to give God a whirl.

But on these God-quests the disciples and we often approach God incorrectly in at least three ways: We look for God in all the wrong places, we live on the surface of life, and we are far too familiar with God.

One might think that religion is a likely place to run into God. But it has to be religion based on the Gospel. God's own Son embraced the human condition instead of running away from it. His humanity was the expression of his divinity, not the contradiction of it. God put us on earth so we could find God here. God gave us life so we could experience God in the thick of it.

And we have to live life in a godly way. Instead, we flit from this job to that, from this toy to that, from this diversion to that. Afraid of missing out on anything in life, we race through life as through a fun fair or museum, getting no more than a taste of the current experience. If we taste only the froth of a beverage, we can barely tell beer from champagne. Only when

we drink deeply can we detect the faint aftertaste in the bubbles. So with life: Only when we engage it deeply can we feel its reverberations in everyday events.

That is also how we experience God: in the deepest recesses of our humanity. Of course, God is always with us, even in the most frivolous activities. But only in a frivolous way. When we get more serious and think of whether to change jobs or fall in love or have a baby, God pays more attention. And when we get more serious and wonder about the meaning of life and whether it ends at death, God sits up straight. But God really comes to attention when we slip to the end of our rope, run out of answers, get deathly weary of life.

Just where nothing works or matters is where God is at God's best. God is not the answer to our problems but a resolution beyond answers. God does not give us meaning but hope beyond reason. God does not give us someone to

love but the capacity to love. God is simply Mystery. But in that Mystery is our fulfillment.

We tend to be too familiar with Mystery. We call it God, then figure it out as a Trinity of persons, then we give God's Son both a divine and human nature; we give him a virgin birth, a sinless mother; we fill in the outline of his life and believe he rose from the dead. We know so much about God that we forget that we know next to nothing.

We believe so many words about God that we lose faith in God's real identity. We create a God in our minds but leave God out of our activities. We compartmentalize God in a religious box, and then try to bring God back into everyday existence. But God gets lost in transit.

Let's get back to basics. We have a built-in thirst for God, but God is nothing like us, like anything we can imagine. God is absolutely other than us, total mystery. We cannot domesticate God.
