Food Pantry News

We had two notable events in September. We expanded our food distribution to an additional Saturday. We had a very successful expansion – both from the number of clients and volunteers; we distributed over 140 bags of food on that day alone. Last Friday we also set a record for the number of bags of food distributed – over 210 bags. For September, we distributed over 670 bags of food. We are serving a need in the community and our clients are very grateful for our assistance.



As we add distributions we have begun to update our shopping lists. Our shopping list now includes rice (either box of brown rice or rice packets), oatmeal, and saltines or crackers. If you purchase soups, please make sure they are the heartier soups that include either vegetables or meat. We also need shopping bags with handles.

Our greatest need at this point is for assistance in shopping and bagging on Thursday. 


Weekly Collections Recap For September 30, 2012

The Barriers that Separate Us

We live in a society that has many technological avenues for stimulation and entertainment, one in which the urban population exceeds the non-urban. It is curious that loneliness is a prevalent malady. It is easy to reach out and touch someone, we are told. But—in truth—it is not all that easy, and statistics from the mental health field will reinforce that opinion. Today’s readings are about the ways in which we can authentically reach out: God touches Adam to create a mate and end his solitude; God-in-Jesus takes on human flesh and death in order that we might come to glory; Jesus reaches out to the children whom the disciples had tried to keep away, showing us the manner in which we must approach the loving embrace that awaits us in heaven. Until that day, however, we must remember that ours is a sacramental church, a church of signs of the love of God. And so we are called to reach out continually to ease the loneliness and the barriers that separate us from one another and, therefore, from the love of Christ.

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Treasures from Our Tradition

Using beads for prayer and meditation is an ancient custom, found in many cultures and religions. The Christian rosary dates from the twelfth century, when it provided a way for ordinary Christians to learn about the lives of Jesus and Mary. Alan de la Roche, a fifteenth-century Dominican, preferred “Psalter of Our Lady” to “rosary.” This fitting name recalls an explanation of the devotion’s origin. Unable to read the one hundred fifty psalms that formed the Church’s “official” daily prayer, medieval Christians substituted first one hundred fifty *Pater Nosters*, and later one hundred fifty *Ave Marias*. By meditating on the various mysteries of the rosary while repeating these simple prayers, the faithful could immerse themselves in the whole mystery of the Incarnation and the Resurrection.

The dedication of October to the Blessed Virgin Mary is an appropriate reminder of this venerable form of prayer. Faithful Christians everywhere continue to meditate on the mysteries of the rosary, praying in groups or alone. Why not take advantage of this season to renew your acquaintance with the rosary?

Las Barreras Que Nos Separan



Vivimos en una sociedad que tiene muchas posibilidades tecnológicas para la estimulación y el entretenimiento, en que la población urbana supera la no urbana. Es curioso que la soledad sea un mal prevalente. Es fácil de alcanzar y tocar a alguien, se nos dice. Pero, en verdad, no es tan fácil, y las estadísticas de salud mental refuerzan esa opinión. Las lecturas de hoy son las formas en las que auténticamente podemos acercarnos a otros: Dios toca a Adán para crearle una compañera y poner fin a su soledad, Dios en Jesús asume forma humana y la muerte con el fin de que podamos llegar a la gloria; Jesús se acerca a los niños que los discípulos habían tratado de alejar, mostrándonos así cómo aceptar el abrazo amoroso que nos espera en el cielo. Hasta ese día, sin embargo, debemos recordar que la nuestra es una Iglesia sacramental, una Iglesia de signos del amor de Dios. Y así estamos llamados a acercarnos a otros continuamente para aliviar la soledad y derribar las barreras que nos separan unos de otros y, por tanto, del amor de Cristo.

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Lecturas de hoy

Primera lectura — Dios crea una compañera apropiada para Adán: Eva. Ellos pasan a ser una sola carne (Génesis 2:18-24).

Salmo — Dichoso el que teme al Señor (Salmo 128 [127]).

Segunda lectura — Cristo, el que consagra, y aquellos a quienes consagra tienen un mismo origen. Por eso puede llamarlos hermanos (Hebreos 2:9-11).

Evangelio — Lo que Dios ha unido, que ningún ser humano lo separe. Dejen que los niños vengan a mí. El reino de Dios pertenece a los que son como ellos (Marcos 10:2-16).

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Un viejo chiste relata que una ancianita por más que se apresuraba a llegar al templo, siempre llegaba tarde al rosario. Un día decidió adelantarse para ver por qué duraba tan poco tiempo el rezo del rosario. A la hora establecida salió un ministro de la sacristía y velozmente recitó “Cruz, Bola, bolita, bolita, bolita, Bolita . . .”.

Esta es una exageración del hecho que muchos rezan el rosario como si fuera una serie de fórmulas que se repiten sin pensar. Esta devoción mariana debe meditarse con tranquilidad y en silencio. El enfoque del rezo del rosario son los misterios de la vida de Jesús. Los “Padrenuestros” y las “Ave Marias” nos ayudan a entrar en esa meditación en una forma mas profunda. Esas oraciones deben ayudarnos a penetrar el misterio de un acontecimiento gozoso, luminoso, doloroso, o glorioso de la vida de Jesucristo. Pero, una vez que estamos en presencia del misterio, debemos enfocarnos y contemplar a Dios. Esto no significa que el rosario no deba nunca rezarse en voz alta y en grupo. El rosario también tiene su dimensión comunitaria, pero ésta necesita fundarse en una verdadera meditación. En varias culturas latinoamericanas aún se canta el rosario. Ya sea a solas o en comunidad, rezado o cantado, el rosario es un tesoro de nuestra fe que nos puede facilitar la contemplación del salvador.

"I Wish I Could Give You My Legs."

This past summer my son, Rainer, spent a week in Louisville to visit a cousin of his, John Michael. They are about the same age; they like to look for garden snakes together, get into a little trouble, bug their mothers; you know, the typically twelve- or thirteen-year-old kind of stuff boys like to do.

John Michael has a condition where his gross motor skills slowly diminish over time; it starts with slowness in general things like walking up stairs, putting on cloths, playing kick ball. At some point braces are needed, eventually one is resigned to a wheel chair. At late stages most of all one's gross motor skills are lost. I personally know nothing about the condition. I do know, however, that the brain is not affected. As one loses control of their body, the sharpness of the brain continues to develop. And John Michael is a fairly sharp kid.

Fast forward three months. I was down in Louisville for a business meeting. I stayed with my in-laws. My Father-in-law told me that he took Rainer and John Michael to a climbing wall when Rainer was in town. John Michael was having trouble. Rainer asked him how he was doing. Anyway, at some point Rainer stopped and said to John Michael, "I wish I could give you my legs."

I get so ridiculously busy with life and business and setting goals and obtaining goals — my stuff. My heart truly goes out to John Michael. But the thought, the words, "I wish I could give you my legs" have never entered my mind. I could not help but think: Isn't this what I am called to do in my faith, to take a break from "my stuff" and think from the heart and respond? I am convinced that the living presence of Christ in me, the establishment of the Kingdom of God on earth in me, is tied directly into my response to the world that is immediately before me. "I wish I could give you my legs." I am still reeling from it.

In this country, we take so many things for granted. It is difficult for us to imagine living our lives without sufficient clean water. When we want water, all we have to do is turn on the faucet.

Imagine a poor country like Haiti where 40 percent of its 10 million people do not have access to a dependable supply of clean water, where the walk to the faucet is an average of 5 miles away, walking an average of 10 miles per day

for clean water.

Our goal is to raise \$20,000 for Haiti; this money will be used to build wells to provide clean and accessible water. If we raise more than our goal of \$20,000, that money will be used to provide healthcare for the people of Haiti.
