
Thanks to your generosity, St. Teresa's *Preserving Our Heritage* collection is up and running!

Gifts



In today's readings, we discover that material wealth alone does not keep us from discipleship. We will see that there are other gifts more important than material wealth, but even so, it is how we use our gifts that matters most.

Today's scriptures point to the value of the gifts of wisdom, trusting in God, and letting our actions reflect the love of God from within. It is not gold that causes us to fall, but rather the desire for gold above all other things. From the readings in Wisdom and Hebrews, we find the source of God's gifts in our lives. Wisdom is more valuable than worldly possessions. In Hebrews, we are challenged to look at our own values and admit honestly what controls our lives.

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Treasures from Our Tradition

Forty-nine years ago Pope John XXIII opened the Second Vatican Council with these challenging words: "Our duty is not just to guard this treasure, as though it were some museum piece and we the curators, but . . . what is needed at the present time is a new enthusiasm, a new joy and serenity of mind." As the participants in Vatican II proceeded with their deliberations, the first document they produced was the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, for they knew that it is from the liturgical life of the Church that everything else we do proceeds.

This seminal document, arrived at after much debate and approved virtually unanimously, set the tone for the entire Council to follow. It also set in motion the liturgical reforms that we are still implementing today. Perhaps no single phrase of the entire Vatican Council has had more influence on the life of the Church over the last half-century as the Constitution on the Liturgy's ringing declaration that "full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else." — James Field, Copyright © J. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Existe en Perú un mural milagroso de la Pasión de Jesucristo. Esta imagen reconocida como el Señor de los Milagros, el Cristo Moreno o el Cristo de Pachacamilla fue pintada por un angoleño en el siglo XVII para una cofradía de africanos. A mitad del siglo un fuerte terremoto sacudió a Lima y las paredes de la cofradía se cayeron, sin que se dañara el mural. Eventualmente la imagen se reveló como milagrosa para los que oraban delante de ella.

En la imagen aparece Jesús crucificado. Sobre Él el Espíritu Santo y el Padre. A la derecha de la cruz está su Madre con el corazón traspasado por una lanza y a su derecha, el fiel discípulo amado. Esta imagen es venerada como el Señor de los Milagros. Sin saberlo el artista angoleño ha pintado una reflexión teológica sobre la divinidad y la humanidad de Jesucristo. En su pasión redentora Jesús abre las puertas del cielo y de la comunicación entre el cielo y la tierra, entre Dios y la humanidad representada por la Madre y el discípulo. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glez, OFM, Copyright © J. Centering Prayer: An Old Way to God

After a couple of sessions on prayer the Men's Spirituality Group decided to try an experience of "Centering Prayer." For many guys, centering prayer can be quite the challenge. Most of us are use to praying with words. Namely thanking God for something or someone in our lives or asking God for some special graces. We talk and God listens. Well, centering prayer reverses this flow of communication. God talks and we listen.

Many saints, including Saint Teresa of Avila, tell us that God is all around us. Scripture tells us that we are made in the "image and likeness of God." But do we see and recognize God all around us; do we experience the divine presence within us? This, in part, is what centering prayer is about: quieting one, utilizing a simple prayer word that is internally chanted over and over, letting our thoughts leave our mind as quickly as they enter, and listening and experiencing the divine presence within.

Our Director of Religious Education, Kate Lynch, led us through the experience. At the beginning of our session, Kate read a few things about centering prayer. Our Church's understanding of centering prayer is that it is an advanced stage of prayer. Kate also pointed to various resources that showed that Church leadership encourages the faithful to pursue and engage in centering prayer. Saint Teresa of Avila describes the activity in down to earth language, "Contemplative prayer is nothing else than a close sharing between friends; it means taking time frequently to be alone with him who we know and love."

There are many really good resources to acquaint oneself with centering prayer. Our Men's Group also learned that there are several churches in the area that offer centering prayer experiences. The road to such praying is not easy. There are challenges. But one thing is for sure, if we do nothing, then nothing will happen. We encourage you to join us in trying an experience of centering prayer.

In this country, we take so many things for granted. It is difficult for us to imagine living our lives without sufficient clean water. When we want water, all we have to do is turn on the faucet.

Imagine a poor country like Haiti where 40 percent of its 10 million people do not have access to a dependable supply of clean water, where the walk to the faucet is an average of 5 miles away, walking an average of 10 miles per day

for clean water.

Our goal is to raise \$20,000 for Haiti; this money will be used to build wells to provide clean and accessible water. If we raise more than our goal of \$20,000, that money will be used to provide healthcare for the people of Haiti.

All donations Fr. Frank raises through sponsorship of his pilgrimage will go to *Zanmi Lasanté* —Paris, a social justice agency who will have wells built in Haiti by



Haitian labor and fund other education and development in impoverished rural Haiti.
