2012 Instant Wine Cellar




Instant Wine Cellar collections have already begun. We would like to get everything in by October 26-27th. A drop off station will be set up in the Parish Center.





The Humanity of Jesus Christ



Called to service

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All three readings today support—each in its own way, of course—a reflection on the humanity of Jesus Christ and how that humanity played a key role in the drama of our salvation.

Although not chosen specifically

to coordinate with the other two readings, today's second reading does in fact carry forward the theme of Christ's humanity in a remarkable way. The author of the Letter to the Hebrews highlights the solidarity that exists between Jesus and us, precisely because in his human nature Jesus has known the same sufferings and testing that are our own experience. Because he can "sympathize with our weaknesses," we can "approach the throne of grace to receive mercy." For the author of Hebrews, the humanity of Jesus was an essential requirement for his redemptive death, as well as an invitation to us to find in Jesus someone with whom we can identify in our daily struggles. — Copyright © J. Treasures from Our Tradition

In the eyes of many, the papacy is a peculiar institution. Still bedecked with some of the regalia of medieval princes, contemporary popes have worked to define their role in ways that give them influence over the world both within and outside the Church. The trappings of royalty, never really a good fit for the successors of Peter, could render a pope distant and irrelevant. On the other hand, the tendency of many to think of the pope as if he were the CEO of a modern corporation is also inaccurate.

St. Gregory the Great, himself a pope, first called the pope "the servant of the servants of God." He is "first among equals" among other bishops, who by tradition exercise significant authority within their own dioceses, not depending on the pope's authority. This arrangement often puzzles those accustomed to a top-to-bottom "chain of command." History has seen popes of many styles, but most strive to live up to Gregory's definition. Perhaps today's Gospel puts it all into the best perspective: "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." Pray for the pope this week. — James Field, Copyright © J. S. La Humanidad de Jesucristo



Llamado al servicio

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Las tres lecturas de hoy apoyan – cada una a su manera, por supuesto– una reflexión sobre la humanidad de Jesucristo y la forma en que la humanidad tuvo un papel clave en el drama de nuestra salvación. Aunque no

fue seleccionada específicamente para coordinar con las otras dos lecturas, la segunda lectura de hoy, de hecho, continúa el tema de la humanidad de Cristo de una manera notable. El autor de la Carta a los Hebreos pone de relieve la solidaridad que existe entre Jesús y nosotros, precisamente porque en su naturaleza humana Jesús ha conocido los mismos sufrimientos y las pruebas que son parte de nuestra experiencia. Debido a que puede “compadecerse de nuestros sufrimientos” podemos “acercarnos al trono de la gracia para recibir misericordia”. Para el autor de Hebreos, la humanidad de Jesús era un requisito esencial para su muerte redentora, así como una invitación a que veamos en Jesús a alguien con el que podemos identificarnos en nuestras luchas diarias. – Copyright © J. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Además de ser el Mes del Rosario, octubre es el Mes de las misiones porque fue durante este mes en 1492 que el terciario franciscano Cristóbal Colón trajo los primeros cristianos al continente americano. También lo es porque varios santos misioneros como Francisco de Asís, Pablo de la Cruz, y santas relacionadas con las misiones, como Teresita del Niño Jesús, son conmemorados durante este mes.

Uno de estos santos, Antonio María Claret, fue obispo de Cuba de 1850 a 1857. También fue fundador de los Hijos Misioneros del Corazón Inmaculado de María (Claretianos). El fundó su orden basando su afán por la misión de Cristo en los santos Evangelios. Recomendaba que los cristianos debemos leer el Evangelio cada día para disponernos al servicio del Señor.

Un misionero no necesariamente es la persona que deja su nación para predicar el Evangelio a otros pueblos. El verdadero misionero es aquella persona que une su vida a la misión de Jesús, viviendo el Evangelio ya sea en su hogar, su trabajo, su parroquia o, si Dios así lo pide, en otras tierras. – Fray Gilberto Cavazos- Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. Are you a Monk or are you a Friar, or Both?

A friend of mine was recently going on about the difference between monks and friars and that most Catholics don't know the difference between the two. I was hesitant to show my lack of knowledge having a Masters in Theology and all. But finally I overcame my hesitancy and asked my friend, "So what's the difference?"

My friend, very proud I must say, explained to me that a monk lives in a monastery and focuses on praying, fasting and working in the monastery. Friars on the other hand typically live in small communities and are in the thick of it, offering ministerial services to the people of God. Where monks focus on the "other worldly" kind of things Friars focus on "working in the world," making the Kingdom of God a reality.

Probably the most famous monk is Dom Pérignon, the monk who improved the process for making Champagne. I don't know this for a fact, but I believe the creation of champagne was an accident; lucky for us. Probably the most famous friar is Friar Tuck, the happy-go-lucky friar that hung around with Robin Hood who, by the way, also was associated with wine and beer and the like.

For us church going folks we don't think too much about monks or friars. I am sure that one trying to discern a vocation as a monk or friar there would be quite a bit of thinking and praying about it all. But there is, in each of us, both a monk and a friar. When we are praying and contemplating our monk side is coming out. And when we are doing good works in the world our friar side is coming out. Just being aware that they are there and striving for a healthy balance can be a good thing for our spiritual development.

In this country, we take so many things for granted. It is difficult for us to imagine living our lives without sufficient clean water. When we want water, all we have to do is turn on the faucet.

Imagine a poor country like Haiti where 40 percent of its 10 million people do not have access to a dependable supply of clean water, where the walk to the faucet is an average of 5 miles away, walking an average of 10 miles per day

for clean water.

Our goal is to raise \$20,000 for Haiti; this money will be used to build wells to provide clean and accessible water. If we raise more than our goal of \$20,000, that money will be used to provide healthcare for the people of Haiti.

All donations Fr. Frank raises through sponsorship of his pilgrimage will go to *Zanmi Lasanté* —Paris, a social justice agency who will have wells built in Haiti by



Haitian labor and fund other education and development in impoverished rural Haiti.
