2012 Instant Wine Cellar




Instant Wine Cellar collections have already begun. We would like to get everything in by October 26-27th. A drop off station will be set up in the Parish Center.



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Today's Readings


First Reading — I will lead the people to brooks of water, on a level road, so that none shall stumble (Jeremiah 31:7-9).

Even so, it is Bartimaeus who recognizes Jesus as the Messiah, places all his faith in him, throws aside everything he has (his cloak), begs him for mercy, receives new vision, and follows Jesus on the way to suffering and death in Jerusalem. 

Treasures from Our Tradition

“What is the Church if not the assembly of all the saints?” wrote the fifth-century bishop Niceta. Each Sunday, in the Profession of Faith, we express our belief in the communion of saints, the one body—with Christ as its head—made up of “those who are pilgrims on earth, the dead who are being purified and the blessed in heaven.” We are not alone!

The preface for All Saints begins, “For today by your gift we celebrate the festival of your city, the heavenly Jerusalem, our mother.” What astounding words! All Saints Day (like every solemnity) is nothing less than the festival of the fullness of the paschal mystery, our dying and rising in Christ. Of course, now in autumn the mystery comes “clothed” in glorious autumnal garb, and so we celebrate our Easter faith with signs of the harvest, signs of nature's dying, signs of the “homecoming” that happens naturally when the weather gets cold and families find themselves together more often. While the dying can point to our own mortality, the homecoming reminds us of the mystery of our own resurrection with Christ. — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En México y otros países latinoamericanos se están preparando para celebrar el Día de Todos los Santos (1° de noviembre) y el Día de los Muertos (2 de noviembre). Estas dos fiestas cristianas fueron mezcladas con antiguos ritos y devociones mesoamericanas. Ellas enfatizan que la muerte es parte normal del ciclo de la vida y que los difuntos no se olvidan de sus seres queridos. Esta es la base de la devoción católica a los santos: Dios es Dios de los vivos y no de los muertos (Mateo 22:32); por eso los muertos siguen vivos en una nueva dimensión.

En estos días las familias pasan tiempo en los cementerios, visitando las tumbas de sus parientes y amistades, lavando las lápidas, poniendo arreglos de zempasuchil y encendiendo veladoras.

En casa, muchos latinos construyen y adornan altarcitos dedicándolos a las almas de sus seres queridos que han muerto. En los altares se encuentran papel picado, fotos de los difuntos, artículos religiosos, comida, bebida, cigarritos y otras cosas que los ya muertos disfrutaban durante sus vidas. Para los niños muertos se añaden juguetitos que les gustaban en vida.

Are you a monk or are you a friar, or both?

A friend of mine was recently going on about the difference between monks and friars and that most Catholics don't know the difference between the two. I was hesitant to show my lack of knowledge having a Masters in Theology and all. But finally I overcame my hesitancy and asked my friend, "So what's the difference?"

My friend, very proud I must say, explained to me that a monk lives in a monastery and focuses on praying, fasting and working in the monastery. Friars on the other hand typically live in small communities and are in the thick of it, offering ministerial services to the people of God. Where monks focus on the "other worldly" kind of things Friars focus on "working in the world," making the Kingdom of God a reality.

Probably the most famous monk is Dom Pérignon, the monk who improved the process for making Champagne. I don't know this for a fact, but I believe the creation of champagne was an accident; lucky for us. Probably the most famous friar is Friar Tuck, the happy-go-lucky friar that hung around with Robin Hood who, by the way, also was associated with wine and beer and the like.

For us church going folks we don't think too much about monks or friars. I am sure that one trying to discern a vocation as a monk or friar there would be quite a bit of thinking and praying about it all. But there is, in each of us, both a monk and a friar. When we are praying and contemplating our monk side is coming out. And when we are doing good works in the world our friar side is coming out. Just being aware that they are there and striving for a healthy balance can be a good thing for our spiritual development.

Help Bring Clean Water to Haiti

In this country, we take so many things for granted. It is difficult for us to imagine living our lives without sufficient clean water. When we want water, all we have to do is turn on the faucet.

Imagine a poor country like Haiti where 40 percent of its 10 million people do not have access to a dependable supply of clean water, where the walk to the faucet is an average of 5 miles away, walking an average of 10 miles per day

for clean water.

Our goal is to raise \$20,000 for Haiti; this money will be used to build wells to provide clean and accessible water. If we raise more than our goal of \$20,000, that money will be used to provide healthcare for the people of Haiti.

All donations Fr. Frank raises through sponsorship of his pilgrimage will go to *Zanmi Lasanté* —Paris, a social justice agency who will have wells built in Haiti by



Haitian labor and fund other education and development in impoverished rural Haiti.
