Reflecting on God's Word

Matthew's tale is less a story of adventurous seekers than of a luring God, drawing others into the mystery of divinity through the birth of Jesus. A star that guides and wise words that explain are what help lead the magi to their destination. Natural signs and words of revelation are what God works through in our own day to bring us into the presence of Jesus, the Son of God.

The story of the wise men is a journey that surrounds the birth of Jesus. It speaks to all seeking God in today's world. God does not use force to attract others. Angels speak a message of joy for all but give no orders that insist that the shepherds journey through the dark of night to worship. A star appears in the sky but no one forces these astrologers to pack up some gifts and make their way across foreign terrain to kneel and prostrate themselves and do Jesus homage.


At the heart of this story is the message announced in the letter to the Ephesians: God's plan was that everyone be included in the mystery of salvation, that, along with the children of Abraham, "the Gentiles are co-heirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 3:6). God wants everyone to share in divine life—*everyone!* Give it your thoughtful consideration.

We can pray that the divisions and hatreds will be resolved through the wisdom that is the gift of God. We pray for an increase of wise men and women who are attuned to the signs of God drawing them to join together in worship and live together in peace. The ultimate destination of all people is to arrive in the presence of God.

Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios

El relato de Mateo no es tanto una historia de aventureros, sino más bien la de un Dios, que atrae a las personas hacia el misterio de la divinidad por medio del nacimiento de Jesús. Una estrella que guía y una explicación con palabras sabias son las cosas que



conducen a los magos hacia su destino. Las señales naturales y las palabras que se nos van revelando son las cosas que utiliza Dios en nuestros días para llevarnos a la presencia de Jesús, el Hijo de Dios. La historia de los reyes magos gira alrededor del nacimiento de Jesús y tienen un mensaje para los que

buscan a Dios en el mundo de hoy. Dios no atrae a nadie a la fuerza. Los ángeles dan un mensaje de gozo, que es para todos; pero no ordenan insistentemente que los pastores viajen durante la noche para adorar al niño. Una estrella aparece en el firmamento, pero nadie fuerza a estos astrólogos a empacar algunos regalos y emprender su camino hacia tierras desconocidas para postrarse ante Jesús y adorarlo.

El mensaje central de esta historia es lo que se anuncia en la carta a los efesios: El plan de Dios es que todas las personas estén incluidas en el misterio de la salvación y que, junto a la descendencia de Abraham, "todos los pueblos comparten la misma herencia, son miembros de un mismo cuerpo y participan de la misma promesa en Cristo Jesús" (Efesios 3:6). Dios quiere que todos participen en la vida divina —*¡todos!* Piénsalo bien.

Vivamos la Palabra de Dios

Podemos orar para que las divisiones y los odios se resuelvan por medio del don de la sabiduría que nos ha dado Dios. Podemos orar para que aumente el número de mujeres y hombres con sabiduría, que presten atención a los signos que Dios envía para que junten esfuerzos con el fin de alabar a Dios y conseguir la paz. 

Second Reading — The Gentiles are coheirs, copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel (Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6).


Gospel — Magi from the east arrived, looking for the newborn king of the Jews (Matthew 2:1-12).

Treasures from Our Tradition

Monday of this week is Christmas Day in Russia and in much of the Orthodox world. This curious difference in schedule has a lot to do with how calendars have been developed and changed over the years. In the year 45 B.C. Julius Caesar gave the empire his Julian Calendar, with the winter solstice on January 6. This put an end to a system in which officials called "pontiffs" were able to tweak the calendar by adding extra days in as needed. He invented two new months at that time, December and January; and in order to correct the mess the pontiffs had made, forced a year of 445 days on the empire in what he named "The Last Year of Confusion." The new months varied in number of days according to a complex schedule, but the calendar was still off by nearly twelve minutes a year, and lost a full day every 130 years.

Pope Gregory XIII reformed the calendar in 1583, but not everyone appreciated his efforts. England held out for two hundred years. The year 1700 was a leap year in England, but not in France; they were eleven days apart! George Washington was really born on February 11; when the Gregorian calendar was finally adopted in the English colonies shortly before the Revolution, he had to move his birthday to February 22. Now the calendars are thirteen days apart, which accounts for Russia's Julian calendar Christmas. And Caesar thought he had brought confusion to an end! — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

En 1448 llegaron los pesebres italianos a las iglesias españolas, pero no fue hasta que el Rey Carlos III le regaló un pesebre a su hijo en el siglo XVIII que el uso de pesebres se expandió en los hogares. Desde entonces, el uso de nacimientos llega al continente americano en donde se convierte en la decoración principal para las fiestas navideñas.

Así como en todo país latinoamericano el montaje del Belén es una tradición, lo es también en Venezuela. Con el pesebre venezolano llegan también aguinaldos, parrandas, Misas y patines. ¡Sí! ¡Patines!

Desde la mitad del siglo pasado los venezolanos celebran la época navideña con “patinadas”. Estas “patinadas” normalmente se hacen por las mañanas y muchas calles están cerradas a los autos hasta las 8 a.m. para que niños y jóvenes puedan disfrutar de los patines, bicicletas y otros juguetes que les regala el niño Dios. Por eso, muchos niños duermen con un “cordoncito” atado al dedo gordo de los pies, que cuelgan por la ventana para que los despierten los que pasan patinado. – Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J.
