

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

I wanted to bring to your attention to a trend in our weekly giving that the Finance Council has been observing during first four months of the fiscal year, July through October. In total, our collections are down roughly \$10,000 over last year's weekly collections. Moreover, we are down nearly \$16,000 versus our budgeted weekly giving amount for the year. The Finance Council will continue to monitor collections and expenses extremely closely over the next several months and communicate with you if the trend continues. We have always provided detailed financials for the Parish on the website, and we are looking to improve how we summarize information in the weekly bulletin.

I have gone back-and-forth about whether to raise this issue to you through this letter. I have concluded that, as the Chairman of the Finance Council and a steward of the parish, I need to make sure that I keep you apprised on things that concern me. I love this parish very much. Though very few parishes in the Archdiocese operate in the black, I feel that it is very important for us to make this the 4th year in a row that we finish with revenues higher than expenses.

Here are things that you can do to help:

1. Increase your weekly giving (if you can.)
2. Make a one-time special donation at Christmas.
3. Move to automated giving. This provides us the most stable source of funding.
4. Bring food for the Food Pantry. Our Food Pantry efforts have increased substantially over the past several years. This is what our parish is called to do, but it also creates a financial strain when we need to go out and purchase food to meet the needs of the poor. In fact, this is a major source of our increased expenses this year. For every dollar worth of food that you bring to church, this goes directly to help take pressure off the parish's expenses.
5. Prayer. Please remember our parish in your daily prayers, that we are all guided by the Lord's will for us.

I am always happy to discuss the parish's financials with you. As I mentioned, the detailed financials are always available on our website. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me on my cell phone at (312) 286-9190.





Treasures from Our Tradition

Look around most Catholic churches, and you will discover an image of John the Baptist, often in the old baptistery, or in a window near where the font is or was located. He has two feast days in the calendar: one commemorating his birth, and the other his death. There are only three nativities in our calendar: for Jesus, for Mary, and for the Baptist. John's birthday is reckoned according to the schedule given in Luke's Gospel of the angel's announcement to Mary. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth is in the sixth month of pregnancy, and so Mary hastens to help her. Reckoning Christmas as December 25, we count backwards nine months to March 25 for the Feast of the Annunciation. Then we count forward three months to June 24 for John the Baptist's birth. Halfway to Christmas, his nativity gives ample reason for rejoicing in the summer, and his symbols of fire and water are used playfully in bonfires and dives into the sea. Even at the polar opposite of Christmas in the calendar, the energy of Christ's birth in the Incarnation provides cause for rejoicing. —James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

En 1726, Juan de la Cruz (1542-1591) fue canonizado por el Papa Benito XIII. Nació en la región de Castilla en España, este doctor de la Iglesia junto con Teresa de Ávila fue reformador de la Orden Carmelita. Muchas órdenes religiosas del siglo XV sufrieron grandes decadencias. Por eso mientras los Protestantes se separaban de la Iglesia, los religiosos descalzos, recoletos y observantes buscaban reformar órdenes religiosas, como la Orden de la Bienaventurada Virgen María del Monte Carmelo, uniéndose siempre más a la Iglesia Romana.

Para los reformadores católicos quedarse en la Iglesia no fue fácil, ¡sin embargo se quedaron! Aunque sus reformas fueron apoyadas por los Papas, muchos de ellos como Juan de la Cruz tuvieron que aguantar muchas oposiciones y persecuciones para lograr sus reformas. Estas reformas ardían con el deseo de amar bien a Cristo Jesús y a su cuerpo que es la Iglesia.



Our Troubled Joseph

Every icon is balanced. The icon is balanced with the figures, the colors and the landscape or back drop that make up the icon. Balance is critical to one's spiritual progress. When one is out of balance, it is difficult to advance spiritually. Being out of balance typically leads to walking in circles. We end the day spiritually in the exact same spot as we began the day.

The balance in an icon also helps us to meditate on it; the balance puts us at ease. We don't have to figure out what is happening. The balance in an icon is what allows the icon to come into us, and we, into the icon; it aids the spiritual truth that the icon is communicating to us.

Our icon of the Nativity is cyclically balanced. The story of the birth of Christ revolves around the actual event of the birth that is in the center of the icon. Look in the lower left corner of the icon; there we see a troubled Joseph. He is troubled because he is trying to make sense of his wife becoming pregnant and the birth of this child.

Joseph is visited by an old man who represents the voice of *unenlightened* reason. Ultimately, Joseph has to make a leap of faith; a practice with which he is uncomfortable. He is a man of logic; he is not used to the grey of life and appears *unenlightened* on why he has been chosen to assist in bringing the Christ child into the world. It weighs heavily on him. Just go up to the icon and look at his face.

In our times of misunderstanding, when things don't make sense, this image of a troubled Joseph is comforting to meditate upon. It is as these times that we need to seek out the voice of *unenlightened* reason. And when it comes to us, we need to listen.

And we know what happens when the culture reigns supreme without biblical critique: extreme individuality leads to rich privacy, lonely sex and cafeteria religion.

A negative identity is the easiest to acquire. Just look at the 2-year-old who says “No” to everything; or the rebellious teen who disdains adult wisdom; or the political party out of power whose only platform is to object to whatever the administration offers. The world offers infinite possible identities, but it can’t force anyone to become someone.

Identity cannot really be achieved alone. It takes two to tango and a village to create a real person. Before Eve, Adam saw only disparate things; after Eve, Adam recognized a world. That is, creation went from chaos to a meaningful cosmos. That happens to all of us, because we create

our own self in relation to other creatures. That is how we learn to love and be loved.

Love can spring up suddenly, like a trout leaping out of a calm stream. We are going along minding our own business when all of a sudden we realize that we are not alone in this world. Of course, we always knew that obvious fact of bumping elbows; but suddenly we actually feel our real connection with other people. We didn’t create the relationships, they are just there. We intuitively understand that the bonds of love are not an addition to our individuality — love is an essential element of our identity.

Encouraged by this experience of human intimacy, we are able to see the good in others, their beauty, their desirability. We begin to love. Then,

strengthened by loving, we become brave enough to open our private self to the public, to reveal our inner being, to allow ourselves to be loved.

Loving and being loved may be the highest level of maturity that most people attain. Yet some people realize that love is not quite enough, that something is missing if we do not feel a personal responsibility for the shape of the secular world and for the condition of God’s kingdom. As the late Cardinal Jaime Sin of the Philippines uncharacteristically said: “Compassion without love is mere sentiment ... and love without justice is baloney.”

Mature persons feel responsible for the world and their position in that world. You and I have won the lottery of life. We benefit from the mysterious meeting of genes that situates us in the middle class of a rich country. That unearned accident obliges us. Someday, we all may mature to the point where, instead of starting with a lot of stuff and whittling down, we will start with bare necessities and gradually build up to a responsible level of livelihood.
