

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## Reflecting on God's Word

## Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios

My father used to refer to the town of my—and his—birth as a “nickel-and-dime” town. As a child, I was never exactly sure what he meant, but it didn't sound like a compliment. I think it was similar to Micah's words about Bethlehem as “too small to be among the clans of Judah” (5:1). Another description would be “backwater.” Hardly a place deserving of great expectations. Yet backwater Bethlehem, city of David the shepherd boy, was to be the birthplace of the Messiah—not Jerusalem, center of government and religion, city of David the warrior king.



God's strange choices extend beyond geographical sites to the people on whom God sets eyes. A young betrothed girl up in the north, a barren woman down in the south—these were chosen to play pivotal roles in the story of salvation. The once-barren Elizabeth, soon to bring forth the greatest of all prophets, now proclaims God's most marvelous work and the little one through whom God is working: “Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb” (Luke 1:42).

Elizabeth cues us to join in the response of the baby in her womb: to allow our hearts and spirits to leap for joy. Again and again God works through those who are open to the Spirit. Blessed are they who place their trust in the Lord, who continues to come to give us new life.

### *Living God's Word*

After hearing Elizabeth's final words, “Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled” (Luke 1:45), we can pray the words of the refrain of today's responsorial psalm: “Lord, make us turn to you; let us see your face and we shall be saved” (Psalm 80:4).

Mi padre se refería al pueblo donde él y yo nacimos como un pueblo “de poca monta”. De niño yo no sabía en realidad lo que él quería decir con eso, pero no me sonaba como un halago. Creo que sería algo similar a las palabras que pronuncia Miqueas acerca de Belén: “que no destacas entre los clanes de Judá” (5:1). Otra descripción pudiera ser “agua muerta”. Difícilmente un lugar merecedor de grandes expectativas. Así y todo, el agua muerta de Belén, la ciudad de David

el joven pastor, estaba destinada a ser el lugar de nacimiento del Mesías, y no Jerusalén, el centro del gobierno y de la religión, la ciudad de David el rey guerrero.

Las selecciones extrañas de Dios se extienden más allá de los lugares geográficos hasta las personas en quienes Dios pone sus ojos. Una joven comprometida en matrimonio en la región norte del país, una mujer estéril en la región sur. Ambas fueron escogidas para jugar un papel fundamental en la historia de la salvación. Isabel, que una vez fuera estéril, pronto daría a luz al mayor de los profetas y ahora con su exclamación de “¡Bendita tú entre las mujeres y bendito el fruto de tu vientre” (Lucas 1:42), proclama la obra más prodigiosa de Dios, el pequeño a través del cual Dios trae su salvación.

Isabel nos da la indicación para que nos unamos a la reacción que tuvo el niño en su seno: dejemos que nuestro corazón y nuestro espíritu salten de gozo. Una y otra vez Dios obra a través de aquellas personas que están abiertas al Espíritu. Bienaventurados los que ponen su confianza en el Señor, que sigue viniendo a darnos una vida nueva.

### *Vivamos la Palabra de Dios*

Después de escuchar las últimas palabras de Isabel, que recoge el pasaje del Evangelio de hoy, “¡Dichosa tú que has creído! Porque lo que te ha dicho el Señor se cumplirá” (Lucas 1:45), nosotros podemos orar con la respuesta del salmo de hoy: “Señor, muéstranos tu favor y sálvanos” (Salmo 79).



## Treasures from Our Tradition

In ancient pagan Rome, these days in mid-December were a time for general slacking off at work and far too much rejoicing. The period of leisure after the harvest and a whole cluster of pagan festivals were a force for the church to reckon with. The Saturnalia, breaking out on December 17, was a time of high living and loose morals. Christians were advised by their bishops to drop out of the mayhem and do some serious fasting. A famous church council at Saragossa in Spain made a season of fasting mandatory from December 17 to December 23, exactly coinciding with the Saturnalia. The bishops at that time were perhaps less concerned with preparing for Christmas than with resisting the kind of loose living going on.

Modern times have restored a bit of the Saturnalia spirit to our culture, so that a general period of partying with a vague connection to religion is now upon us. How does a Christian keep balance? The practice of charity by remembering the poor in our gift-giving, of hospitality in finding a place at our holiday tables for the poor and lonely, and of daily prayer in the home and at church are great helps. Although Advent is not a penitential season like Lent, it is a time for making room in our lives for what matters most. — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

## The Cave

The other day I was walking down State Street on my way to the train and I saw a homeless man. I see this guy every few weeks. Let me tell you, I have seen a lot of homeless in my day and this guy is the most homeless guy I have ever seen. He sits with his legs extended, head down and his hands in a prayer position. He has a cup between his feet for change. His right ankle is bent on a 90 degree angle. I don't even know how he walks around. This is despair.

I was on a flight from Baltimore to Chicago earlier this week and I witnessed something I have never seen before. A woman came on to the plane, late and rushed. She stopped near me, looked up and said, "Whose coat is this? Luggage needs to go up here." She proceeds to take the coat down from the bin. In the coat was wrapped several small gifts that fall out and bounce off an old timer's head in the aisle seat. She continued to take stuff out of the bin in order to put her bag in bin. Several people around were immediately incensed. This is fear mixed in with a touch of pathetic.

That black cave in our Nativity icon, it represents these two experiences of mine plus a lot more like hopelessness, disbelief, vengeance and the like. And what does all that represent? Death!

We have the Arch of God piercing the blackness of our world and hearts to birth Christ. What that icon is saying is that Christ comes to us in our nastiest, blackest, loneliest, hopeless moments. I forget what Saint said this, maybe Francis, but it was something like we can see the face of God in the most disenfranchised people in our community.

It is very hard to stop and talk to the homeless guy. What am I going to say? It is very difficult to not immediately get angry at the lady on the plane. It is far easier to label her as a moron. This is that black cave pulling me into it. If one were to meditate on that black cave, it might be to come to know what to pray for when we are being pulled into it. And that is just for starters.



The Women's Center directly assists mothers and families experiencing crisis pregnancies by offering emotional, financial, material, and spiritual support.



## You Do Not Desire Sacrifice

The Letter to the Hebrews was written largely to explain how the Christian religion was the fulfillment of the Jewish religion.

Jesus was a Jew; so were all of his disciples and friends. They all followed the basic Jewish laws and beliefs. They had no intention of starting a new religion. They thought they were being faithful to their tradition, simply following its belief to its logical conclusion.

Jews had always believed in one God and looked forward to a messiah and the kingdom of God on earth. Jesus said he spoke for that same God and that the kingdom of God had come. Jesus himself was the sign and proof of the kingdom.

Ideally then, all of the Jews would have accepted Jesus as the expected messiah and the presence of God's kingdom. Ideally, the Jewish religion would have gradually, smoothly transformed itself around this new expression of Judaism and become Jewish Christianity.

That didn't happen, as we know. The traditional Jews fought to retain their ancient beliefs while Christians tried to introduce them to a fuller understanding of their faith. Both sides fought bitterly over the truth until the Christians left or were driven out of the Jewish religion. Then, after being separated in fact, Christians had to separate themselves in practice.

The greatest Jewish ritual was sacrifice. Every day, the temple was filled with dripping blood,

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boiling fat and billowing smoke. Offering animal sacrifice was an expression of worship. Though prophets raged against substituting sacrifice for doing God's will, sacrifice remained a physical bond with a spiritual God.

The Letter to the Hebrews deals with the issue. It says that Jesus repeated God's rejection of sacrifice. Jesus said that instead of sacrifice to God, he came to do God's will.

Of course, the Jews had always tried to do God's will. That was the whole point of the Torah. God's will took on even more significance when the Jews were exiled in Babylon and could not offer temple sacrifice. When they could not get to the temple, they gathered in synagogues to study the Torah.

So, in historical fact as well as religious practice, the Jews were already replacing sacrifice with doing God's will when Jesus came

along. And once again, there might have been a smooth transition to the religion of Jesus. But this Letter to the Hebrews points out the intractable problem. It quotes Jesus as saying: “Sacrifice and offering you did not desire, but a body you prepared for me to do your will.”

The Jews might have been weaned away from animal sacrifice, but they could not accept the human sacrifice of Jesus as a replacement. They would exchange sacrifice for doing God's will — but God's will as they knew it in the Torah, not the interpretation of the Torah according to this upstart preacher.

The Letter to the Hebrews accepts the split between Judaism and Christianity, stating this conclusion when it says: “Christ takes away the first to establish the second.” God's will replaces sacrifice; the sacrifice of Christ replaces animal sacrifice. But even in Christianity, sacrifice is ambivalent. We can still offer little sacrifices instead of doing God's will.

In modern terms, God says, “I don’t want your giving up chocolate or TV shows, the sacrifice of all those parts of your life — I want your life. I don’t want any religious practices that protect you from direct contact with me. I want you as I made you: naked.”
