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Reflecting on God's Word

The other night I was looking out the window as the sun was setting and the layers of clouds allowed the sun to create an extraordinary sunset, painting some clouds with a golden hue, while others were orange and red, moving to purple and gray. It was a stunning moment. The baptism of Jesus is one of those brief moments of beauty, occurring in the first three Gospels (and alluded to in the fourth).

Luke's account differs from the others in that the dramatic moment does not occur as Jesus is coming up out of the water but only after his baptism, while he is praying. Luke's

Gospel has been called the Gospel of prayer, and from its beginning the adult Jesus is presented as one who prays. At this moment of intimacy, "heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove" (Luke 3:21–22). While he was at prayer, the voice spoke to him: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased" (3:22). From here on we find that Jesus is under the influence of the Holy Spirit, and this Spirit directs him first into the desert to be tested, then into his years of service. With this solemn celebration of the baptism, we too are sent back into the days called "Ordinary Time," reminded that God has spoken these same words to us at our baptism: You are my son, my daughter. I delight in you. I send you forth to serve as my Son, Jesus, went forth to serve, accompanied by the Holy Spirit.

Living God's Word


We pray as Jesus prayed that we might hear the voice of the Father, a voice that speaks of God's love for us. We ask that we might allow that Spirit, God's holy breath that came upon us at our own baptism, to move us out into the world in service to those most in need whom God has set before us.

Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios

La otra noche miraba la puesta del sol desde mi ventana y contemplaba cómo las diferentes capas de nubes creaban un panorama extraordinario con sus diferentes matices, desde dorados, anaranjados y rojos hasta morados y grises. Fue un momento

deslumbrante. El bautismo de Jesús es uno de esos momentos breves y hermosos, que se nos relata en los primeros tres evangelios (y al cual alude el cuarto Evangelio).

El relato de Lucas se diferencia de los otros en que el momento dramático no ocurre cuando Jesús emerge de las aguas sino después de



su bautismo, mientras ora. Al Evangelio de Lucas se le ha llamado el Evangelio de la oración, ya que desde el principio presenta a Jesús adulto como alguien que ora. En este momento de intimidad "se abrió el cielo, y el Espíritu Santo bajó sobre él en forma visible, como una paloma" (Lucas 3:21–22). Mientras él oraba llegó una voz que le dijo: "Tú eres mi Hijo amado, en ti me complazco" (3:22). De aquí en adelante vemos que Jesús está bajo la influencia del Espíritu Santo y este Espíritu lo dirige primero al desierto donde es tentado, y después a su vida pública de servicio. Con esta solemne celebración del bautismo nosotros también somos enviados hacia el tiempo litúrgico que llamamos "ordinario" y se nos recuerda que Dios nos dirigió esas mismas palabras en nuestro bautismo: "Tú eres mi hijo (mi hija). En ti me complazco. Te envió a servir de la misma manera que mi Hijo Jesús fue a servir, en compañía del Espíritu Santo.

Vivamos la Palabra de Dios

Nosotros oramos como Jesús lo hizo para poder escuchar la voz del Padre, una voz que nos habla del amor de Dios por nosotros. Pidamos permitirle a ese Espíritu, el aliento de Dios que vino sobre nosotros en nuestro bautismo, que nos inspire a servir en el mundo a los más necesitados, que Dios nos pone en nuestro camino.

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Today's Readings

First Reading — Isaiah speaks of the Servant whom the Lord upholds; he shall bring forth justice to the nations (Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7) *or* Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11.

Called to Serve



For many weeks now, we have been celebrating the appearance of the divine presence in human form. As a child, he came to Mary and Joseph, was seen by the shepherds, and then by some wandering magi from the East. Today we celebrate another showing, later in time, to a group gathered at the Jordan River.

John hesitated to baptize Jesus, whom he recognized as “one mightier than I.” But he did as Jesus asked, and the “Holy Spirit descended” and heaven’s voice spoke to Jesus, “You are my beloved Son.” Jesus was beginning his public life of teaching and service. Soon he would start calling others to join him.

Peter was one of the first to be called by Jesus. In today’s second reading, he announces the heart of the message, “peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all.” Peter was called, and you and I are called to spread that message and to serve God’s word. — Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Merry Christmas! Share that cheerful greeting with some folks today. They may wonder if you have had any Elvis sightings lately, attended Star Trek-kie conventions, or were Cleopatra in a previous lifetime. Despite the skeptics, today is solidly within the Christmas season. In fact, in some strands of the Christian tradition it represents the clearest manifestation of the mystery of the Incarnation. On Christmas Day, for example, the Gospel reading is the Prologue of John’s Gospel, which reveals the glory of Christ shining through our humanity precisely in his baptism.

At any rate, this is an ancient feast, celebrated first in Egypt sixteen centuries ago. More than most other ancient people, the Egyptians understood the life-giving properties of water. On this day, they drew water from the Nile, so central in the history of their people, and reserved it in honor. Many other places copied the custom, so that St. John Chrysostom wrote of people in Antioch gathering at midnight to collect flowing water into vessels they brought from home since “today there is a blessing on the water.” At home for dinner tonight, decorate the table with beautiful bowls of water and white candles, toast one another with goblets of sparkling water, and light a Christmas candle in the window one last time. — James Field, Copyright © J. La costumbre del bautismo infantil debe ser mucho más que un acto social o una tradición cultural, donde el ropón y los regalos son más importantes que la doctrina cristiana, y los padrinos se escogen no por su buen ejemplo sino por su cuenta bancaria.

Según los Hechos de los Apóstoles, familias enteras se bautizaban cuando el padre de familia decidía hacerse cristiano. Esta práctica de bautizar, no solo al nuevo creyente sino también a su mujer y a sus hijos, poco a poco, quedó solo en bautizar los niños del original creyente. El mundo en aquel tiempo estaba basado sobre la familia así como muchas culturas latinas de hoy.

El bautizo infantil nació en la Iglesia primitiva y al pasar de los siglos llegó a transformarse en un rito religioso muy importante en la catequesis del nuevo cristiano. El niño viste de ropita blanca que recuerda la presencia de Cristo en su alma, se le regala una vela que lo invita a brillar con la luz de Cristo y se le da una madrina o un padrino que le enseñará a vivir en Cristo. – Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. We're All Adopted by God

Over the holidays there were a number of newspaper articles about Vladimir Putin signing a law banning the adoption of Russian orphans by U.S. families. Adoption is such an interesting topic. First, I don't know anyone that doesn't know someone that was adopted or knows of a family that has adopted. Secondly, there is a bit of mystery about adoption. For those whom were raised by biological parents, we wonder what it would have been like to be raised by adopted parents, or if all those whom were adopted eventually desire to seek out their biological parents. Third, there are all kinds of guidelines and laws and procedures around adoption. And countries manipulate these laws and procedures for many reasons and most often not for the benefit of those being adopted.

Jesus was in effect adopted. We believe that Mary gave birth to Jesus, yes, but that Joseph was not his biological father. God is Jesus' father. Joseph adopted Jesus. For all those adopted, they are in good company. And we might even say that they can identify with Jesus in a way that we whom were raised by biological parents cannot identify with Jesus. However, like most of our faith, there is more to the story.

In the book of Ephesians it reads that "In love, God predestined us to be adopted as his sons through Jesus Christ." If we use inclusive language it would read "his sons and daughters." In any case, what this implies is that through Jesus Christ all people become God's children. No one religion or group of people have a lock on the kinship with God; we all belong. We are all brothers and sisters through Jesus Christ, and God has predestined it this way through his love. There are no restrictions, no guidelines, no who is in and who is out, anyone from any background from any religion has been adopted by God the Father, and they are your brother and sister. Wow! That is some kind of adoption.

2013 Archdiocesan Annual Catholic Appeal Begins "Love Never Fails!" 1 Corinthians 13:8





Let Reality In

Matthew's Gospel has God speaking to the people standing around, saying, "This is my Beloved Son." But Luke has God speaking directly to Jesus, saying, "You are my Beloved Son." In this scene, God is directly, personally confronting Jesus with the reality of who Jesus is and who God is. Although Jesus is the Son of God, even he must wait for God to act before he responds.

We modern people do not like to wait for anyone — even God. We are self-starters, we get things done, we are in charge. Our science and technology have taken over much of God's work in the world. Which God doesn't mind. God was doing it for us only until we got the hang of it. But scientific knowledge and technical know-how do not translate into human interactions. There we must wait on the Other; there we must be passive, receptive.

Love, for instance. We accept the theory that God is love and therefore all love comes from God. But in the practice of love, it seems that we are the instigators. We decide who and when to love. And if that power ultimately comes from God, that Unseen Lover seems to make no practical difference, any more than it matters where electricity comes from — we are the ones who turn it off and on.

However, love is not a separate thing in itself. It is relational. Love is not some force aimed at someone. It is a response to someone. Originally and especially, love is our response to God's love.

mortals. An infant will make all kinds of facial expressions in reaction to different physical stimuli. What looks like a smile is just pleasure reaction; what looks like a frown is just a tic. At that merely physical level, there is no human meaning. But after a few weeks of being human, an infant develops human responses.

Then, when the infant for the first time notices that her mother is smiling at her, she spontaneously smiles back. That moment is the first human response to another human's affection. At that moment, the infant experiences love.

We experience truth in a similar way. We do not make something true — we accept it as true, recognize it as true, agree with it. Two plus two are four even without

our consent; DNA was there before we discovered it. Reality possesses its own truth independently of our knowledge or ignorance of it.

Nor is beauty in the eye of the beholder. We may have a taste for this or that kind of beauty, but beauty itself is in the object. Their internal beauty shines forth. When Mozart played a new piece for the queen, she harrumphed, "It has too many notes." He replied, "Madam, I use only necessary notes."

When we are receptive to reality, our lives are enlarged. Once we dethrone the tyrant of our ego, stop controlling things, start letting whatever is envelop us, then strange things happen. The poet Rilke was once so overwhelmed by a statue that he heard the statue say, "You must change your life." Rilke knew that the marble was more real than he was. As Jesus changed his life when heard the Father speak.

Such radical change is not likely for most of us, because we are not receptive enough, passive enough, patient enough. But we can practice. We can be less aggressive, less active, less determined. And, as we become more open, more vulnerable, our life can be more true, our viewpoint more beautiful, our actions more loving.
