Reflecting on God's Word

I came across a little book not too long ago that offered a selection of “B and Bs” (“Bed and Breakfast” residences) where travelers could stay in a certain state. The promise of a good “B and B” is a clean place, a good night’s sleep, and a good meal to begin the day. In short, rest and sustenance.

Is it too irreverent to propose that today’s feast is a reminder that we believers have available the “B and B” of all “B and Bs” in the Eucharist? This sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ offers an ongoing opportunity for rest and sustenance with the Lord.

Today’s scriptures all deal with offering sustenance, beginning with Melchizedek presenting Abraham a little bread and wine along with a blessing. Then there is Paul reminding the fractious Corinthians how eating the bread and wine sustains them as they proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes. Finally, Jesus provides rest and sustenance for his disciples, along with five thousand others who show up. My late stepfather worked off a truck, checking gas meters and doing repairs for the Baltimore Gas and Electric Company. He used to stop in a church and have his lunch there. He said it provided him a chance to talk to the Lord and rest for a few moments in the Lord’s presence. It sustained him over the years. Again, rest and sustenance.

God’s ongoing hospitality in the Eucharist has continued over generations to offer rest and sustenance. What could be better than having the Lord coming to dwell within us, giving us the nourishment necessary to sustain us on our journey?



Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison to Date



- For the first eleven full months of the 2013 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are down 6.7% from the 2012 Fiscal Year. As the chart above depicts, the key drivers were poor collections in September 2012 and May 2013.
- In September 2012, Fr. Frank and the Finance Council asked Parishioners to consider an increase to their weekly gifts to St. Teresa's. Thank you to everyone who has been able to do so. As a point of reference, the weekly cost per adult to operate St. Teresa's and all of her programs is \$32.
- Our goal is to fund all operations from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the bars to exceed the expense line in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.



Appreciating the Eucharist

For centuries today's feast was called *Corpus Christi* (the Body of Christ) and was observed on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday. In many countries it has now been moved to Sunday, so that more people may participate in its celebration. In its present form, the liturgy of this day focuses our attention on the meaning of the Eucharist that we celebrate so often.

Today's reading from Genesis tells how "Melchizedek, king of Salem, brought out bread and wine" and prayed over Abram. Though it took place nearly two thousand years before Jesus, this event has long been used by the Church as an ancient foreshadowing of the Eucharist.

The reading from Paul's Letter to the Corinthians is the same one we hear proclaimed on Holy Thursday, retelling the story of the first blessing and sharing of bread and wine at the Last Supper. Luke's tale of the miraculous feeding of the crowd in today's Gospel is also clearly intended to evoke the Eucharist. Thus today's readings give us three opportunities to deepen our appreciation of the Body and Blood of Christ.

Treasures from Our Tradition

We owe today's beautiful feast to a valiant woman who suffered a great deal to establish a feast out of her love for the Eucharist. Juliana was a nun in Belgium in the thirteenth century. She served in a hospital for lepers. She became convinced through her prayer that the liturgical year was incomplete because it had no feast for the Eucharist. Her efforts were not welcome, and a supervising priest sought to punish her for promoting a feast that "nobody wanted." He even had her accused of financial mismanagement and banished her from her convent.

Shortly after she was exiled, the bishop approved the feast. It quickly spread through Europe. In those days, people very seldom received Holy Communion, and so the processions through the streets with the Eucharistic bread not only led to an awareness of Christ's hunger to be with us, but prepared the way for a deeper desire to receive Christ's Body and Blood in more frequent Communion. The feast grew rapidly, but Juliana disappeared into poverty and a hidden life. She ended her days as an "anchoress," a woman living in seclusion in a room attached to a parish church. Imagine her delight at seeing us gathered at the table of the Lord on this day, aware of Christ's presence in our midst, sharing fully in Christ's Body and Blood. Our celebration today invests her struggle and sorrows with dignity and meaning.



Apreciar la Eucaristía



Durante siglos, la fiesta que hoy celebramos se llamó *Corpus Christi* (Cuerpo de Cristo) y se conmemoraba el jueves siguiente al Domingo de la Santísima Trinidad. En muchos países ha sido movida al domingo siguiente, para que más personas puedan participar de esta celebración. Hoy en día, la liturgia de esta fiesta concentra nuestra atención en el significado de la Eucaristía, que tantas veces recibimos.

La lectura de hoy del Génesis nos dice cómo “Melquisedec, rey de Salem, presentó pan y vino” y bendijo a Abram. Aunque esto tuvo lugar casi dos mil años antes de Cristo, este momento ha sido usado siempre por la Iglesia como un anuncio de la Eucaristía.

La lectura de la carta de Pablo a los corintios es la misma que se proclama el Jueves Santo, volviéndonos a contar la historia de la primera bendición y distribución del pan y el vino en la Última Cena. La historia de Lucas sobre la multiplicación milagrosa de los panes y los peces para alimentar a una multitud en el Evangelio de hoy es una clara alusión a la Eucaristía. Por tanto, las tres lecturas de hoy nos brindan la oportunidad de profundizar nuestro aprecio por el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Perú tiene más de 3000 fiestas cada año, normalmente en torno al santo patrón de algún pueblo. La celebración de *Corpus Christi* es celebrada en todo el país. Pero es más llamativa en Cusco. Durante el día se escucha el repique de María Angola, la campana más grande de todo Perú, que existe desde el siglo XVI.

La celebración incluye una procesión con quince santos y vírgenes del siglo XVII, que vienen desde sus santuarios hasta la barroca Catedral de Cusco para honrar el Cuerpo de Jesús. Estas imágenes son cargadas por la plaza de armas antes de llegar a la catedral donde se quedarán hasta el octavo día. Según los peruanos los santos y vírgenes pasan las siete noches platicando con el Señor de los temblores, bromeando y planificando el año que viene para sus parroquias. El último día los santos y vírgenes regresan a sus santuarios con otra procesión.

Estas dos procesiones nos recuerdan que por mucho que los latinoamericanos amemos y veneremos a los santos y vírgenes reconocemos que tanto ellos como nosotros están al servicio de Cristo Jesús.






Become Dazzling White

A few weeks back our Men's Spirituality Group took on the story of the transfiguration of Jesus portrayed in Mark's gospel. We at St. Teresa of Avila are fortunate to possess the large canvas icon of the transfiguration on the wall, just south of the altar. We look at it every week but I can't recall ever getting into a discussion about it with any other parishioner. In brief, the transfiguration of Jesus is not merely a metamorphose where he "changes in appearance." More importantly, we see and experience Jesus in a "changed state of being."

The story of the transfiguration in Mark's gospel sits exactly in the center of his gospel, a technique used to give the transfiguration story special prominence. Some scholars believe that the transfiguration is the most important story in Mark's gospel.

In the icon there are two prophets standing next to Jesus on the mountain, Moses on our right in green garb and Elijah on our left in a grey garb. Moses symbolizes bringing God's law to humanity; he is holding the Ten Commandments. Jesus comes to complete God's law and to move God's law from external stone tablets to a living law written on our hearts. Moses also was tasked with leading the Hebrews out of Egypt, from slavery into freedom. In a similar way, Jesus leads us from the slavery of death into the freedom of life and union with God.

Elijah was another great Hebrew prophet that performed a number of healing miracles. In the First Book of Kings Elijah raises a young man from death. In the Second Book of Kings Elijah performs a multiplication of loaves and cleanses a Leper. These are three miracles that Jesus performs in Mark's gospel. Elijah is also the only Hebrew profit that ascends into heaven, and he did so on a fiery chariot. We know that Jesus ascended into heaven as well. Most significantly is that Elijah did battle with the false Gods and leads the Hebrew people back into a loving relationship with God.

The three figures below are Peter, James and John. When we read the story of the transfiguration we can sometimes think that the three apostles were innocent bystanders as Jesus changed in his state of being. This is not accurate. Not only is Jesus leading the apostles into his transfigured state, but he is also letting us know that our calling is to become as "dazzling white" as he became. This idea of becoming "dazzling white" is one of the many things upon which we can reflect: How are we becoming transfigured in the world due to our relationship with Christ? In this beautiful icon lies our calling.

Another reason we have chosen Comer is that a significant number of the patients at Comer do not have insurance or the private means to pay and receive care, which is paid for with Medicaid and other subsidies. The gifts do not need to be elaborate or expensive. Board games, books, arts and crafts materials (sticks, glue, boxes, sequins, beads, strings, glitters, origami, brushes, paints, ceramic, knitting/crochet materials, etc.), colored pencils, special paper, colored pens, crayons and other similar materials are most appreciated and will go a long way to bring a smile. Art therapy helps children in their healing.

Please make certain that the gift is new because so many of the kids have weakened immune systems. Gifts should not be wrapped so staff at Comer can decide what to distribute to each child.

We are doing this at this time of year because it is unexpected and will hopefully be a wonderful surprise for the kids and will help lift their spirits a bit. It also happens to be Isabella's birthday on June 25th.

To add to the feeling of that Christmas morning surprise, the songs at the 9:00 am Mass on Sunday will have a Christmas theme. So, come prepared to sing some Christmas carols even though the temperature will be in the '80s. And please bring a gift to help honor the memory of Isabella Feliciano.

28th Annual Hunger Walk, Saturday, June 29th

As many of you know, St. Teresa is now a member of the Greater Chicago Food Depository (GCFD) network which allows us to purchase food there at a very low cost. The GCFD has an annual Hunger Walk that provides a great way for food pantries like St. Teresa to raise funds to purchase food. This year, the event will be held on Saturday June 29th starting at 8:30 am from Soldier Field, and St. Teresa is pulling together a team of walkers. We hope that you can join us.

How does the Hunger Walk help our Food Distribution at St Teresa?

- **Cost:** There is no cost to participate.
- **Benefits:** For every adult or child walker, we receive \$12 to spend on four bags of food at the GCFD. A family of four earns \$48, enough for 16 bags, etc! 100 walkers will provide the pantry with food for one month.
- **Pledges:** If walkers collect pledges, the food pantry gets up to 120% of every dollar collected, that's an extra \$20 for every \$100 collected! \$100 in pledges will provide 40 bags of food. If 25 walkers collect \$100 each, the pantry will have food for an additional 2½ months. Pledges can be made through a web-based tool or collected through a sign-up sheet. We will provide assistance with both.
