Reflecting on God's Word

Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios

Kings are not easily cornered. Hamlet has to put on a play to catch the conscience of the king, his own uncle, who has killed Hamlet's father and married his mother. In the passage just prior to today's first reading, the prophet Nathan catches the conscience of Israel's King David by telling the story of a rich man who takes a poor man's beloved and only lamb and serves it up in a stew. When David angrily demands to know who this man is, Nathan replies: "That man is you." David repents. And God forgives.


Jesus catches the conscience of a Pharisee—perhaps. We don't really know if there is any change in Simon after hearing the story. But it is hard to conceive that he did not "get it." Those who know their need for God's mercy receive God's mercy and love in return. Those who do not recognize their need for mercy live their lives refusing to love others.

The woman had already known God's forgiveness; she walked in freedom and acted in freedom. No judgments could stop her from honoring the one who had brought her this freedom. So she stood weeping tears of gratitude, trying to mirror the extravagant love she had received. Simon, dry-eyed and dry-hearted, can only denigrate Jesus ("if this man were a prophet") and the woman ("he would know who and what sort of woman this is who is touching him" [7:39]). Simon saw only "a sort of woman."

The heart that has been forgiven is deep enough to hold the love of God and to share it with others. Extravagance begets extravagance. Ask for the gift of a forgiven and forgiving heart.

Living God's Word

Sometimes we need to pray to God for forgiveness for ourselves; at other times that we can forgive others. Not to forgive can be a great burden, doing more harm to the one who won't—or can't—forgive than to the one who did the harm.



Los reyes no son fáciles de acorralar. Hamlet tiene que escribir una obra literaria para hacer consciente al rey, que es su propio tío, y que ha matado al padre de Hamlet y se ha casado con su madre. En el pasaje anterior al que leemos en la primera lectura de hoy el profeta Natán trata de hacer consciente al rey de Israel, David, al contarle la historia de un hombre rico que le robó la única y

querida oveja de un hombre pobre, y la preparó en un guiso. Cuando David enfurecido demanda saber quién es este hombre, Natán le responde: "¡Ese hombre eres tú!" David se arrepiente y Dios lo perdona.

Jesús hace consciente a un fariseo sobre su mal juicio. Bueno, no sabemos ciertamente si se dio algún cambio en Simón después de escuchar la historia, pero no se concibe pensar que Simón no "entendió" lo que Jesús le trataba de decir. Aquellas personas que saben que necesitan la misericordia de Dios reciben la misericordia y el amor de Dios. Aquellas personas que no reconocen la necesidad que tienen de misericordia pasan su vida rehusando amar a los demás.


La mujer ya sabía que Dios la había perdonado, por eso actuó con libertad. Ningún juicio iba a prohibirle honrar a quien le había traído esa libertad. Por eso derramó lágrimas de gratitud tratando de reflejar el amor extravagante que ella había recibido. Simón, con sus ojos y su corazón secos, sólo atinaba a denigrar a Jesús ("si éste fuera profeta") y a la mujer ("sabría que clase de mujer es la que lo está tocando" [7:39]). Simón sólo podía ver a esa "clase de mujer".

El corazón que ha sido perdonado es lo suficientemente profundo como para contener en él el amor de Dios y compartirlo con los demás. La extravagancia engendra extravagancia.

Vivamos la Palabra de Dios

Algunas veces necesitamos orar a Dios para que nos perdone; otras veces tenemos que pedirle que nos ayude a perdonar a otras personas. Dejar de perdonar puede ser una gran carga, haciendo más daño a quien no quiere o no puede perdonar, que a quien hizo el daño.

- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

Hope and Forgiveness



There were some interesting conceptions of sin prevalent in the time of the Hebrew scriptures. There was the belief that God punished sin immediately. Those who suffered disease or misfortune were, therefore, sinners getting their due from the Al-

mighty.

Today's first reading hints at another kind of God. When David admits his sin, Nathan declares, "The LORD on his part has forgiven your sin" (2 Samuel 12:13b). Here was not a vengeful God but a merciful God. What good news that must have been to David and those who, like him, could be honest enough to admit their sinfulness!

Jesus is the good news of God's mercy and forgiveness incarnate. Without Jesus, perhaps the Good News would have been too good to believe, too difficult to imagine. But there he is in today's Gospel, the God-man, forgiving a sinner and declaring that she is forgiven because of her great love.

There is hope, then, for the rest of us sinners, if only we love enough! — Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

June is the month most associated with weddings in the United States. Wedding celebrations always require some savvy planning, and people who have a talent for hospitality in the mix. At the wedding feast at Cana, the mother of Jesus was recruited to deal with some of the details of the banquet, and when a very understandable crisis arose, she did what she could to rescue the party. Anyone who has ever run out of ice, dessert, or table settings knows the stress!

Slowly, the memory of Jesus Christ's blessing of this marriage feast led the Church to form a way to bless marriages. A thousand years ago weddings migrated from the family home to the doors of the church, where the celebration was held in public view. From this practice came a prayer called the "Nuptial Blessing," one of the most solemn prayers in our tradition. It is very much like the prayers by which baptismal water and chrism are consecrated, the ordination prayer over a priest, and the Eucharistic Prayers over bread and wine. Four hundred fifty years ago, weddings moved inside the church building. All of this gives married couples good reason to celebrate their anniversaries well, especially with the clinking of glasses filled with good wine. — James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Había algunas concepciones interesantes sobre el pecado que prevalecían en la época de las escrituras hebreas. Estaba la creencia de que Dios castigaba inmediatamente el pecado. Los que sufrían alguna enfermedad o desgracia eran, por lo tanto, pecadores

que recibían su merecido del Todopoderoso.

La primera lectura de hoy nos muestra a otro tipo de Dios. Cuando David admite su pecado, Natán declara: “El Señor te perdona tu pecado” (2 Samuel 12:13b). Aquí no hay un Dios vengativo sino un Dios misericordioso. ¡Qué buena nueva debe haber sido eso para David y para los que, como él, eran lo suficientemente honestos como para admitir su pecado!

Jesús es la Buena Nueva de la misericordia y el perdón de Dios hecho carne. Sin Jesús, quizás la buena nueva hubiera sido demasiado buena como para creerla, demasiado difícil de imaginar. Pero allí está en el Evangelio de hoy, el Dios-hombre, perdonando a una pecadora y declarando que está perdonada debido a su gran amor.

Pero, no fue hasta 1972 que se fijó un día oficial para el papá. Poco a poco esta fecha del segundo domingo de junio se ha ido expandiendo al resto del mundo con algunas excepciones. En Italia por ejemplo, la fiesta del padre se celebra el 19 de marzo, día de san José.

Durante la Revolución Industrial del siglo diecinueve, José, esposo de María recibió su primera fiesta oficial. La Iglesia, preocupada por el ingreso del padre a las fábricas, propuso a este santo varón como ejemplo de lo que los padres deben ser en la vida de sus hijos e hijas; ejemplos de fe, ternura y trabajo. Aún en nuestro tiempo, el Rito del Bautismo de Niños insiste que el padre, junto con la madre, deben ser los mayores maestros de sus hijos. 

The Transfiguration Part 3: Gethsemane

Two weeks ago I wrote a little bit about the Transfiguration in Mark's gospel. It was something we took on in our Men's Spirituality Group a few weeks back. I explained that one literary technique that the writer of Mark's gospel utilizes is connecting three stories together; the middle story being the most important of the three and the flanking stories telling us something about the middle story. The flanking stories to the Transfiguration of Christ in Mark's gospel are the rising of the little girl and Gethsemane. Last week I addressed the rising of the little girl, this week Gethsemane.

The way the events unfold for Jesus, Peter, James and John at Gethsemane are quite interesting. Jesus takes with him the same three disciples that witnessed the rising of the little girl and the transfiguration into the garden of Gethsemane. He asks the disciples to "Sit here while I pray." As you know, they could not stay awake. Their physical weariness was stronger than their spiritual readiness. As important as this is for us to reflect upon, the core of what happens in the story at Gethsemane is Jesus' prayer, "Abba, Father, all things are possible to thee; remove this cup from me; yet not what I will, but what you will."

One lesson about the Transfiguration that the Gethsemane story tells us about is that the movement into a transfigured state will require purification, a turning away from *our will* toward *God's will*. Remember, the transfiguration is about Jesus transfigured state, but it is also about our transfigured state, our calling. For this movement to occur in us we need to let go of our will and move toward an openness toward God's will. If one were to meditate on this dynamic of the Transfiguration icon, a question upon which to meditate is, "What do I need to let go of in order to move into God's desired transfigured state for myself?" Do not forget that Jesus prayed to the Father in the garden of Gethsemane, "all things are possible to thee."

Please bring a new, unwrapped item that is suitable for children ages 1 to 18 to any of the Masses that weekend. These gifts will be delivered to the Comer Children's Hospital at the University of Chicago, where doctors and nurses undertook heroic efforts to extend Isabella's life.

Another reason we have chosen Comer is that a significant number of the patients at Comer do not have insurance or the private means to pay and receive care, which is paid for with Medicaid and other subsidies. The gifts do not need to be elaborate or expensive. Board games, books, arts and crafts materials (sticks, glue, boxes, sequins, beads, strings, glitters, origami, brushes, paints, ceramic, knitting/crochet materials, etc.), colored pencils, special paper, colored pens, crayons and other similar materials are most appreciated and will go a long way to bring a smile. Art therapy helps children in their healing.

Please make certain that the gift is new because so many of the kids have weakened immune systems. Gifts should not be wrapped so staff at Comer can decide what to distribute to each child.

We are doing this at this time of year because it is unexpected and will hopefully be a wonderful surprise for the kids and will help lift their spirits a bit. It also happens to be Isabella's birthday on June 25th.

To add to the feeling of that Christmas morning surprise, the songs at the 9:00 am Mass on Sunday will have a Christmas theme. So, come prepared to sing some Christmas carols even though the temperature will be in the '80s. And please bring a gift to help honor the memory of Isabella Feliciano.



28th Annual Hunger Walk, Saturday, June 29th

As many of you know, St. Teresa is now a member of the Greater Chicago Food Depository (GCFD) network which allows us to purchase food there at a very low cost. The GCFD has an annual Hunger Walk that provides a great way for food pantries like St. Teresa to raise funds to purchase food. This year, the event will be held on Saturday June 29th starting at 8:30 am from Soldier Field, and St. Teresa is pulling together a team of walkers. We hope that you can join us.

How does the Hunger Walk help our Food Distribution at St Teresa?

- **Cost:** There is no cost to participate.
- **Benefits:** For every adult or child walker, we receive \$12 to spend on four bags of food at the GCFD. A family of four earns \$48, enough for 16 bags, etc! 100 walkers will provide the pantry with food for one month.
- **Pledges:** If walkers collect pledges, the food pantry gets up to 120% of every dollar collected, that's an extra \$20 for every \$100 collected! \$100 in pledges will provide 40 bags of food. If 25 walkers collect \$100 each, the pantry will have food for an additional 2½ months. Pledges can be made through a web-based tool or collected through a sign-up sheet. We will provide assistance with both.
