Reflections

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Reflecting on God's Word

The apostles were probably not very different from the rest of their families or their friends. They were not very different from any other Jew of their day. Indeed, given our expectations and hopes for our own leaders, we would not have answered Jesus much differently ourselves. They were waiting for the Messiah to come, and once he came, happy days would be here again.


They expected the Messiah or “Anointed One” to come in power and might. He was going to be a liberator like Moses who led God’s people out of slavery, and he was going to be a great king like David, who brought the people of the northern kingdom of Israel and the people of the southern kingdom of Judah into one nation. The Messiah would usher in a new era. It was going to be great!

Imagine their surprise when Jesus rebukes Peter for saying that he is “The Christ [Messiah] of God” (Luke 9:20). Then Jesus goes on to say that he must suffer greatly, be rejected by their religious leaders, and be killed—“and on the third day be raised” (9:22). (I wonder if they even heard the last part about being raised.) But worse yet, he goes on to say that they must be willing to deny themselves, take up their cross daily, and follow him.

This Messiah would not get many votes, even now. But it is through faith in Christ Jesus, Anointed One of God, that we have become children of God. And we are called to “clothe ourselves with Christ” (see Galatians 3:27). Which is a more pleasant way of saying, “take up [your] cross daily” (Luke 9:23).

Living God's Word

We pray that we may walk the way of Christ together with Christ, taking up our cross today. We pray to understand what it means to “put on Christ” and to live “in Christ,” and to have that faith that allows us to know God as a loving, gracious God.



Reflexionemos sobre la Palabra de Dios

Los apóstoles probablemente no eran muy diferentes del resto de los miembros de su familia o de sus amigos. No se diferenciaban mucho de los otros judíos de su época. En efecto, considerando todas las expectativas y esperanzas que nosotros tenemos puestas en nuestros líderes, es probable que le hayamos contestado a Jesús más o menos igual que los apóstoles. Ellos esperaban la

venida del Mesías y con él llegarían también los tiempos felices.

Ellos esperaban al Mesías, o sea, al “Ungido de Dios”, que viniera con poder y majestad. Sería un libertador como Moisés, que sacó al pueblo de la esclavitud, y sería un gran rey como David, que unió en un solo pueblo a Israel, el reino del norte, y a Judá, el reino del sur. El Mesías abriría el paso a una nueva era. ¡Todo sería maravilloso!

Uno puede imaginarse la sorpresa de ellos cuando Jesús prohíbe terminantemente a Pedro decir que él es “el Mesías de Dios” (Lucas 9:20). Jesús continúa diciendo entonces que él debe sufrir mucho, que sería rechazado por las autoridades religiosas y que lo matarían, pero “al tercer día resucitaría” (9:22). (Me pregunto si es que ellos no oyeron la última parte acerca de la resurrección). Aún peor, Jesús sigue diciendo que ellos tenían que estar dispuestos a renunciarse a sí mismos, cargar con su cruz de cada día y seguirlo.

Este Mesías no alcanzaría muchos votos ni siquiera hoy día. Pero es por la fe en Cristo Jesús, el Ungido de Dios, que nosotros nos hemos convertido en hijos e hijas de Dios. Somos llamados a “revestirnos de Cristo” (véase Gálatas 3:27), lo cual es una manera más grata de decirnos que “carguemos con nuestra cruz de cada día” (véase Lucas 9:23).

Vivamos la Palabra de Dios



Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison to Date



- For the first eleven full months of the 2013 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are down 6.5% from the 2012 Fiscal Year. As the chart above depicts, the key drivers were poor collections in September 2012 and May 2013.
- In September 2012, Fr. Frank and the Finance Council asked Parishioners to consider an increase to their weekly gifts to St. Teresa's. Thank you to everyone who has been able to do so. As a point of reference, the weekly cost per adult to operate St. Teresa's and all of her programs is \$32.
- Our goal is to fund all operations from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the bars to exceed the expense line in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

A Personal Response of Faith



Today's Gospel starts with a conversation with which Jesus begins his journey to Jerusalem—and the cross. As his followers, we strive to march with him, even to the cross.

Paul's Letter to the Galatians tells us that we who have been baptized have "clothed" ourselves with Christ. Being one with Christ, we must no longer discriminate according to nationality or race, according to social status, according to gender.

The prophet Zechariah, centuries before anyone heard of Jesus, spoke of how the people find God's message uncomfortable, and so turn against the messengers. Later, though, the people awaken to the realization of what they have done and are moved to repentance. Thus, they are always welcomed back by God, who always gives us grace to do the right thing, however difficult it may be. —Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Processions are life's journey distilled. We move with companions, aware that Christ accompanies us, as we move to the altar for Communion or to the font for baptism, or carry a loved one to a place of rest. In Europe, the season of pilgrimage is beginning now, and tens of thousands of people are moving by foot on well-worn paths. Some take as long as six weeks to walk the last few hundred miles of the medieval pilgrimage route to the Shrine of St. James the Apostle in Compostella, in northern Spain.

Those who make the journey by foot, hiking, or by bicycle, have a kind of passport stamped at villages and monasteries on the road. When they present this document at the cathedral, they are given the emblem of a pilgrim, the scallop shell of St. James. High over their heads at Mass, a huge *botafumero* twirls clouds of sweet incense through the cathedral. Cynics say it is to mask the odor of smelly feet. The pilgrims know better. Seeing through the clouds the happy faces of those they met along the road, they recognize a foretaste of the welcome into heaven, and the joy of meeting loved ones in the Kingdom of God. —James Field, Copyright © J. Sin embargo, luego la gente se daría cuenta de lo que habían hecho y se arrepentirían. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Según san Mateo, una noche mientras los discípulos estaban en la barca de Pedro, Jesús vino hacia ellos caminando sobre el mar. Ellos se espantaron creyendo que era un fantasma de algún pescador pero él los calmó diciendo “¡Ánimo!, que soy yo; no teman”. Debió ser impactante ver al Señor caminar sobre las aguas, especialmente en una época donde las aguas venían consideradas como el caos.

En varias partes de latinoamérica los fieles celebran a distintos santos con procesiones de barcos sobre ríos o mares. En el Puerto de Paita, Perú se llevan a los santos Pedro y Pablo en una procesión acuática. San Pedro, que fue pescador, está en casa sobre la barca, ya que normalmente son barcas de pescadores las que forman la procesión. Esta procesión reconoce el caos del mar reconociendo a los pescadores, que durante el año perdieron sus vidas en el mar, con guirnaldas lanzadas a la bahía. Pero, esta procesión no se espanta del mar ya que es una fiesta en honor de dos siervos de aquel que camina sobre las aguas, dominando el mar. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos





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Doing What God Has Intended For Us

The following question emerged in the Men's Spirituality Group: How do we know that we are truly doing what God has intended for us to do? I thought the question well worth addressing.

Most spiritual masters would tell us that from a cognitive perspective, we cannot know that we are truly doing what God has intended for us. We can only know from some other strata deep within our beings. The question immediately made me think of the famous prayer of Thomas Merton. It goes as follows:

"My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road, though I may know nothing about it. Therefore I will trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone."

Thomas Merton has tons of really wonderful spiritual writings. Many critics would say that Merton is the greatest spiritual writer of the twentieth century. The prayer above comes out of a resource titled *Thoughts in Solitude*. And as wonderful as Merton's writings can be, they can be a bit of a spiritual mind-bend.

If one were to try to articulate Merton's writing in a short phrase it would be "God Alone." For Merton, we potentially have a sense of knowing what God has intended for us if we are striving to become united with God, which, by the way, requires us to go through the painful work of foregoing our false self.

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28th Annual Hunger Walk, Next Saturday, June 29th

As many of you know, St. Teresa is now a member of the Greater Chicago Food Depository (GCFD) network which allows us to purchase food there at a very low cost. The GCFD has an annual Hunger Walk that provides a great way for food pantries like St. Teresa to raise funds to purchase food. This year, the event will be held on Saturday June 29th starting at 8:30 am from Soldier Field, and St. Teresa is pulling together a team of walkers. We hope that you can join us.

How does the Hunger Walk help our Food Distribution at St Teresa?

- **Cost:** There is no cost to participate.
- **Benefits:** For every adult or child walker, we receive \$12 to spend on four bags of food at the GCFD. A family of four earns \$48, enough for 16 bags, etc! 100 walkers will provide the pantry with food for one month.
- **Pledges:** If walkers collect pledges, the food pantry gets up to 120% of every dollar collected, that's an extra \$20 for every \$100 collected! \$100 in pledges will provide 40 bags of food. If 25 walkers collect \$100 each, the pantry will have food for an additional 2½ months. Pledges can be made through a web-based tool or collected through a sign-up sheet. We will provide assistance with both.
