




Stewardship Matters

Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison



- The offertory collection for last weekend, October 12-13, 2013, was \$7,532.
- For the 2014 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are down 14.4% from the 2013 Fiscal Year; versus expenses, we are have a \$63,602 deficit.
- For the 2014 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$36 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.



Persistent Prayer

My house shares a back yard with four college students. Ryan is one of them. Every morning the first thing Ryan does is go out the back door with a bagful of nuts and feed the squirrels. They hang out in our apple tree the way teenagers hang out around malls.

One of the squirrels has become particularly bold and now waits expectantly for Ryan right at the back door. Lately the squirrel won't go away, no matter the time of day, no matter who's in the back yard. The squirrel just won't leave, nuts or no nuts, people or no people. Because it's become pesky, I now ignore the squirrel most of the time. Though Ryan doesn't, I do. Nevertheless, the squirrel is slowly getting my attention. Over the course of my lifetime, God is getting my attention, too.

People tend to hear this week's Gospel parable about the widow who keeps knocking on the judge's door as a story about God who eventually gives in to the widow. I think it's more a story about me eventually giving in to God. I hope God's not offended by being compared to a squirrel, but God is much more like the squirrel (or the widow) than like the judge. God's the one who does the pleading, it seems to me. While the parable seems to say, "Don't lose heart; God will eventually hear and answer," perhaps it's really saying, "Don't lose heart; God will not give up knocking on your door." — Copyright © 2012, World Library Publications.



Alive to Life

When people tell me they cannot pray, I inwardly cringe, because I never have the courage — or the cruelty — to tell them the truth. But I will tell you: If people cannot pray it is because they don't want to pray.

I will now soften that harsh judgment a little (but steadfastly stand by it) by admitting that our inability to pray is not entirely our own fault. We have been misled for centuries by powerful pray-ers. It wasn't their fault; they were simply praying in their own way, and we mistook it for immutable rules for our own prayer. We have been urged to climb sevenstorey mountains, to wander through innumerable interior castle rooms. We have been led through the dark night of Prayer is awareness of God, the soul to fight our psychic demons. We have gotten lost in intricate mazes supposedly leading to our center and God's essence. We have gone on pilgrimages to exotic places. We have obediently inhaled through our nose and exhaled through our mouth; we have knelt, stood, sat, lain and lotused.

Enough, already! We are exhausted with effort and depressed by failure. We have even forgotten what we are trying to accomplish. And maybe that's the problem: Prayer is not an accomplishment. Prayer is a state of being.

If people think they are too tired to pray, maybe they are simply bored with God and need a more exciting companion. If people say they are too sick to pray, does that mean that God is not interested in sick people? Those who complain they are too busy to pray ought to know that excuse is valid only after they are too busy to eat, sleep, work, shop, play and watch TV. People who say they just don't



engagement with God, abandonment to God, dissolution in God. It is as natural as breathing, as spontaneous as wonder.

feel like praying should get over themselves. Prayer is about God.

Prayer is a problem for us because we have misplaced God. We have lost God in eternity, and so we look for clever ways to bring God back into our time. We have forgotten that God is equally everywhere and that eternity touches down on earth every second.

Many people say that they don't know what to say to God. But they somehow know what to say to spouses, lovers, children, store clerks and even strangers. How is it that we are tongue-tied with our Creator? Is there nothing we're just dying to tell God, no joy we are bursting to share, no thing we desperately need?

All of our puzzling over prayer is a tribute to our faith, our desire to contact God. But we Americans are hindered by a triple obsession: technique, communication and the exotic. Because there's a technique for success, we think there must be a technique for prayer. We think that talking is the magic cure for everything. We're mesmerized by incense, chants and saffron robes; we somehow think that mysterious rituals give access to mystery itself.

Let's stop all this nonsense. Analyzing our prayer is like giving someone a gift while worrying if it is the right size. Giving our prayer a grade is like wondering how you are doing while making love. Prayer is not a performance.

Prayer is awareness of God, engagement with God, abandonment to God, dissolution in God. It is as natural as breathing, as spontaneous as wonder. Prayer is an automatic reflex to reality: holding our breath at the beauty of a flower, breaking our heart at the pain of a child. Prayer is our mind exploding in the presence of mystery, our spirits soaring on the wings of mutual recognition. To be alive to life is to pray.
