Just Do It

Most of our experience of baptism is that of a little child whose primary role is to cry or not cry. It is the parents who are the principal actors.

At the beginning of the ritual of baptism of a child, the parents are questioned about their intentions. The presider then instructs them, "You have asked to have your child baptized. In doing so you are accepting the responsibility of training him (or her) in the practice of the faith. It will be your duty to bring him (or her) up to keep God's commandments as Christ taught us, by loving God and our neighbor."

Then comes this kicker question: "Do you clearly understand what you are undertaking?"

So far I've never heard an "honest" response. Every parent says, "Yes." But of course it's not true. As we hold that little child, all scrubbed up and shining, crying or not crying, we have no idea how he (or she) will break our hearts.

But they will. Because life is a struggle and sometimes it's a struggle with those we love the most, with those for whom we would give up our lives — in fact *do* give up our lives, in little ways every day.

What did Jesus know on the day he accepted baptism? He was God, after all, and God knows everything. But Jesus was also human and presumably only knew what a human being could know.

Did he picture the cross that would loom above him just three

years after his baptism?

Did he know the pain he tea would suffer as he tried to make his it. disciples understand his mission?

Did he know how much it hurts to love someone and let them go?

What Jesus knew for sure is that he was in the care of God and that God would direct him as needed, when needed. This is exactly what we know — whether we are parents or priests; young people just starting out or older people who have been around a while. We don't know the future, but we know God is present there.

Our task is to live each day, each hour, as people of integrity, as believers who are called to a standard of behavior that is worthy of Jesus. Whether at work, at home, on the road, in church wherever we find ourselves, we belong to Jesus.

We made a promise. We're supposed to live as he would live, speak as he would speak, do as he would do.

Put simply, we are supposed to do what we say we will do. And in baptism, even if we had nothing to say about it at the time, we said we will try to be good and follow Jesus.

Life can be complicated, but there is a secret to making it easier. If you want to simplify your life, do what you say you're going to do. If you're a Catholic, you have said you will go to Mass every Sunday. So don't debate it — just do it.

If you have said you will teach your children about Jesus. Do it

You have said you will obey the commandments. Don't lie or cheat or steal or gossip. That's not what Jesus would do. Don't worry so much about being first or best or greatest. Jesus wouldn't do that either. Love God. Love each other. Do it, because we said we would.

And then, friends, if we listen closely, maybe we will hear that voice of God say those words we long to hear: "You are my beloved ... and I am so pleased with you."

Treasures from Our Tradition

Through the centuries, artists and craftspeople have depicted Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River by John. At first in mosaics and frescoes, and later in tapestries, stained glass, and paintings, the scene is familiar. Jesus is standing

waist-high in flowing water. Above him, standing on dry land, John the Baptist pours water over Jesus. The first artists to depict this were sketching from memory. This is exactly how most people were baptized in the early days: as adults, standing or kneeling in the water, with water poured over their heads.

This method of baptizing, called immersion, is the favored way today. An

adult enters a font, or an infant is lowered a bit into the water supported by a parent's hand, and water is poured or splashed over them. The treasures of baptistry art attest that submersion, or plunging beneath the water's surface, is not really in our tradition, and that "infusion," the mere pouring of a few drops of water, yields too narrow an understanding of what it means to be plunged into Christ's life. Jesus Christ has gone before us into the water, and waits for us there with abundant gifts. No wonder the tradition calls for abundant symbols! —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
