Spiritual Hard Hats

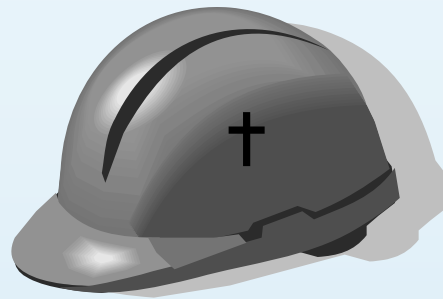
Contemporary spiritual writer Annie Dillard writes about those of us in churches on Sunday:

Why do people in churches seem like cheerful, brainless tourists on a packaged tour of the Absolute? Does anyone have the foggiest idea what sort of Power we so blandly invoke? The churches are children playing on the floor with chemistry sets, mixing up a batch of TNT to kill a Sunday morning. It is madness to wear straw hats and velvet hats to church. We should be wearing crash helmets. Ushers should issue life preservers and signal flares; they should lash us onto the pews. For the sleeping God may wake some day and draw us out where we can never return.

The place we gather in, this Sacred Place, is not a living room, nor a dining room; it is a place of transformation. We gather not simply as parishioners of an organized religion, but as baptized disciples, "on fire" with the Spirit that pushes us out of our comfort zones to allow Divine Mystery to have its way with us.

As Jesus walked out of the Jordan after his own baptism, the heavens parted, they were "opened" with this announcement: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

Jesus left those waters of rebirth and embraced his mission to "bring forth justice to the nations," to quote Isaiah in the first reading. We, too, entered the waters of the Jordan in our own baptism; we, too, have been filled with the very same Spirit that descended on Jesus; we, too, have a mission to live the Good

News in our own lives.

God needs us to set the world on fire with his love and mercy. Our mission is to the whole world, to all people of all walks of life. Our mission is to spread the Gospel by living the Gospel and changing our lives so that they mirror the Presence of Christ.

The Second Vatican Council summoned the entire Church to a renewed understanding of Baptism, the sacrament that unites all followers of Jesus and gives us the power — the power to serve by feeding the hungry, clothing the poor, reaching out to the sick and lonely, and working to bring about a just world.

Yes, we are all called to holiness; we are all called to share in

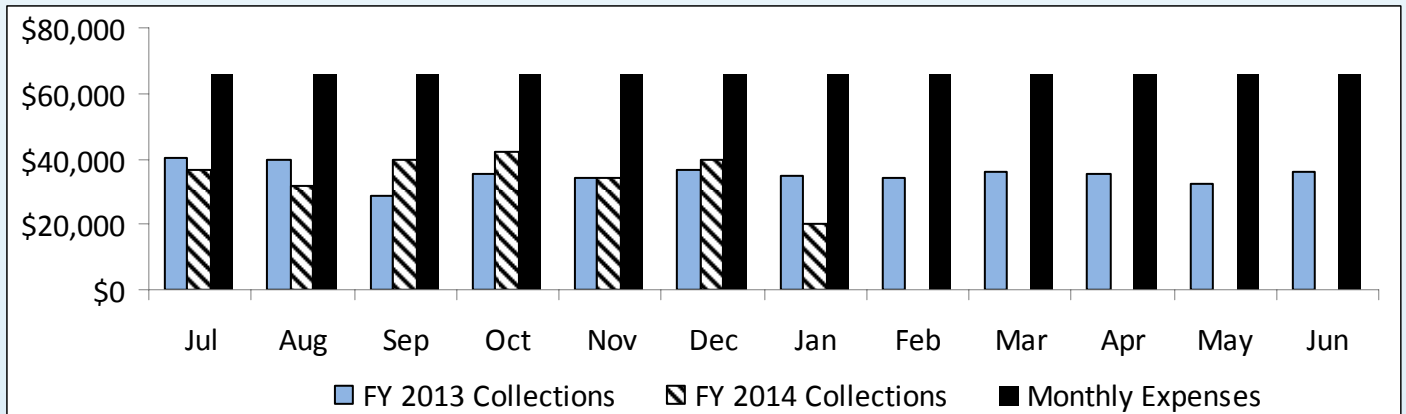
the one priesthood of Jesus Christ. And we fulfill that calling by walking together, shoulder to shoulder, planting the seeds of the Kingdom with our love...with Christ's Love.

We should all be wearing spiritual hard hats as old worlds and old, outdated structures of politics and religion must crumble. We are in the business of spiritual transformation of the world, which ultimately amounts to a subversion of our lives: our old life, our old, false self must die so that our true self rooted in Christ will grow.

The purpose of Liturgy, the reason we are baptized, is to change the world in such a way that we bring healing and compassion to a broken world; "... a bruised reed we shall not break; a smoldering wick we shall not quench."

We are about to renovate our church building, so that the power of our Baptism will be better expressed in this space. We have a mission to change ourselves and the world, a mission that begs us to roll up our sleeves and put on our hard hats.

Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison



- The offertory collection for the first two weekends in January 2014 is \$20,144.
- For the 2014 Fiscal Year, Sunday and Holy Day collections are 3.3% over Fiscal Year 2013 collections; versus expenses, we are have a \$63,602 deficit.
- For the 2014 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$36 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the striped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

Treasures from Our Tradition

The symbols and actions of baptism evolved around the experience of adults dying to old patterns of life and rising from the waters of baptism as new creations. As for newborn babies, at first it was desired to wait until the following Easter, when they could be baptized, anointed with chrism, and given a taste of the Eucharist in association with adults. The Church was always willing to baptize adults in emergency situations outside the Easter timetable, and in time, since infancy itself was a life-threatening situation, the baptism of babies became commonplace. As with the “emergency” adult baptisms, it was required that parents bring the child, as soon as health was recovered, to the bishop for the full menu of sacraments.

The very real fear of death for infants thus created a situation in which the three sacraments drifted apart from each other, and away from their original, adult celebration at Easter. Today, at last, we know a great deal about how our practices evolved. This knowledge is reshaping how we celebrate Easter, how we receive adult faith, and how we structure the faith journey of children.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Los retablos de metal son famosos en muchas partes de Latinoamérica. Estos pequeños retablos o laminitas contienen imágenes de Cristo, la Santísima Trinidad, María, los ángeles u otro santo/a pintados sobre lámina, madera u otro material para decorar los altares familiares de los hogares hispanos. Aunque los retablos no siempre siguen las normas del arte cristiano, los retablos latinoamericanos son bellos ejemplos de la mezcla de culturas amerindias, europeas y africanas. Pero no todos los retablos son pequeños. En muchas

iglesias coloniales de Latinoamérica se encuentran retablos gigantescos hechos de mármol o madera, cubiertos de oro y joyas que recuerdan los grandes retablos europeos, pero con el color y folclor latinoamericano.

Originalmente, los retablos europeos eran pequeños y móviles, de tal manera que se podían colocar sobre un altar para la celebración de la Misa. Cuando la Iglesia fue construyendo sus propios templos, los retablos empezaron a formar parte de la decoración de los santuarios y tomaron dimensiones impresionantes. Los retablos pequeños pasaron a los hogares de los fieles, quienes quieren tener a Cristo y sus santos como parte de su diario vivir.

The Catholic Church — Here's Comes Everybody

This popular way of describing the universality of our Church is a theme of today's readings. The prophet Isaiah tells of God's servant who will be the "light of the nations." It will not be enough for this servant only to bring back the survivors of Israel's dispersion and captivity. God's salvation must reach to the ends of the earth.

Saint Paul writes to a local church of mainly Gentiles and presumably former sinners of all kinds in Corinth. He greets them and tells them that they are to take their place with "saints everywhere" in the name of Jesus Christ.

The Gospel reading from John tells of Jesus' commissioning by the Father in the Holy Spirit to bring salvation to all, to take away the sins of the world. This Chosen One has come to baptize the world in God's Spirit. Everybody.

As you hear these words, consider your own task to bring the good news of salvation to everyone you will meet in the coming days, weeks, years.



Candlemas Celebration February 2nd *Our Festival of Lights*



Forty days after the birth of Christ Mary complied with Mosaic law; she redeemed her first-born from the temple (Numbers 18:15), and was purified by the prayer of Simeon the Just, in the presence of Anna the prophetess (Luke 2:22.).

No doubt this event, the first solemn introduction of Christ into the house of God, was in the earliest times celebrated in the Church of Jerusalem. The date of

February 2nd places the Candlemas celebration forty days after Christmas and continues the religious cycle that leads up to Easter Sunday. February 2nd is also the mid-point between the Winter Solstice and the Spring Equinox, which is the basis for various ancient European celebrations that commemorate the annual beginnings of the agricultural season.

For the Church, however, Candlemas remains a day of hope and light. It is a time to honor the Lord as the Light of the World and to remind us that we too have that light within us.

On February 2nd, St. Teresa Parish will celebrate Candlemas with a candlelight procession in honor of the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple. Parishioners are encouraged to their own bring candles to be blessed.

After Mass, Fr. Frank will conduct the traditional Blessing of Throats in Honor of St. Blaise whose feast day is February 3rd.
