A Second Chance

In Anne Tyler's *Saint Maybe*, the main character has done something horrible. As he aimlessly walks about downtown, he happens on "The Church of the Second Chance," wanders in and sits down. During the service, his mind is opened to the possibility of a way to make amends, a do-over. I remember thinking, "I want to go to that church," then remembered — I do.

If ever there was evidence that Jesus doesn't expect us to be perfect, it's today's Gospel story. Not only does he not expect us to be perfect, it seems like he gets a kick out of our bone-headedness. The Emmaus story reads like a comedy in three acts. Act 1: Two sad disciples trudge along the road, talking about all that they have witnessed. Act 2: They encounter a stranger who gives them hope. Act 3: They recognize him and race back home to tell the others.

I imagine the giddiness of the writer of this Gospel. He's just written (and relived, as writers do) the painful parts and then he gets to the part where Jesus is having a little fun with the disciples who are so sad and so clueless.

Jesus knows we don't get it, and so does the church. We are the Church of the Second Chance. We can confess our sins and resolve to do better. We can come to the table and feast on God every week, even every day, and we can know our hungers satisfied. Sure, we can go

through the motions and not feel a thing: eat, yet not appreciate; confess, yet reject mercy. (Let me just say that going through the motions is better than not going at all. A lot of grace is just showing up.) But like on the road to Emmaus, Jesus is there for us if we can just open our minds. As my husband read to me out of the current *Farmer's Almanac* (and that tells you something about the guy I married): "A mind, like a parachute, only works when it's open."

This second chance is evident even in the first years of the church. Peter denied Jesus. Thomas didn't believe. Paul was temporarily blinded before he could see clearly. Our liturgy begins with an admission of sinfulness. Before we receive holy Communion, we con-

fess that we are not worthy. And we dare to go ahead, claiming another chance. There are some who don't experience the second chance, people like divorced and remarried Catholics who have found love after failing at love. Our theology of marriage and our theology of forgiveness are struggling to find that place where both can be true and there's evidence that we're getting there. Last January, in his first address to the Roman Rota, the court primarily responsible for hearing requests for marriage annulments, Pope Francis said, "As you carry out your judicial work, do not forget that you are pastors. Behind every file, every position, every case, there are persons who wait for justice." He went on to say that a judge on a church tribunal should "render justice that is not legalistic and abstract, but appropriate to the needs of concrete reality."

We don't know what effect these words might have, but there is precedent for mercy and understanding and even, God help us, a sense of humor about our failings and our attempts to try to be better. One sound the devil cannot abide is that of us laughing at ourselves. After the pain and the death, after the fear and the denials, perhaps one response to the resurrection is giddy hilarity, gratitude and relief that God has brought out of the deepest darkness the brightest light by which we can finally see clearly; that God has given the whole world a second chance.

Key Discussion:

Erica provided the financials and the Council reviewed them. Administrative Expenses are being watched along with the line item Maintenance & Building Repairs.

The Capital Campaign, Building Faith Together has raised to date \$580,000. Discussion arose around the realistic goal for the entire project. Justin with his experience in capital construction has seen an average increase of 10% from initial estimates. A contingency of \$100,000 will ensure that the project will be completed efficiently and cover any unanticipated building issues that may arise. This will bring the amount of the project to \$1.4 million.

The Land Sale is under contract and anticipated to close in mid June. During the last Council meeting in February parishioners were able to bring up concerns to the committee regarding how the money would be used from the sale. At this March's meeting, it was agreed that of the anticipated return on the sale of \$2.9 million we have designated:

- \$100k for the contingency on the building renovation and that any costs over \$1.4 million will have to go to Finance Council for approval
- \$90k for repairs to Parish Center to be in compliance with the Protecting God's Children directive;
- \$110k for repairs on the roof, gutters, and air conditioning in the rectory;
- The remaining \$2.6 million will be designated for future capital endeavors.

The Council discussed the best ways to be transparent to the parish during the Land Sale and the church construction. It was decided that minutes of our monthly meetings would be posted in the bulletin and St. Teresa's website.

Fr. Frank talked about the costs associated with protecting the children of the parish. Particular capital improvements must be met and are expected to cost around \$90,000.

The next Council meeting will be May 19th at 7:00 pm. Please note there will not be an April meeting.

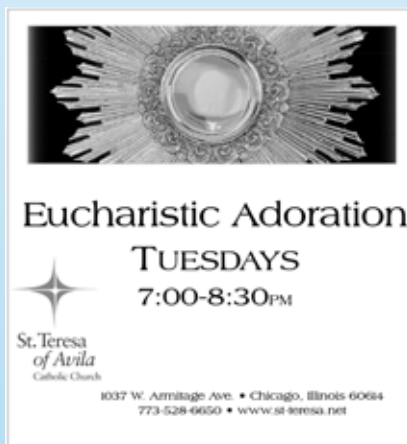

Treasures from Our Tradition

“Mystagogy,” reflection on the Easter mysteries, is the chief task of these great fifty days, a “pentecost,” in other words, of grace and renewal. Every Sunday we have accounts of Resurrection appearances of the Lord, and sketches of the earliest efforts at being church.

Lent is described as a journey to the font, and Easter may be described in similar terms, since at the very beginning an angel tells the apostles that the Risen Lord “has gone before you into Galilee.” Galilee, of course, was the place where Jesus did his finest work, his preaching, his healing, his gathering the lost and the marginalized to the table. At Easter, we hurry to catch up, putting our renewed baptismal promises to work in our own personal Galilees, our little worlds waiting for a word of grace, a healing, an act of pardon, an invitation to share a meal. The water often splashed on our Sunday assemblies in Eastertide remind us: these are the golden, shining days of grace, days to nurture the heart, to speak to one another about things that really matter. — Rev. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El 3 de mayo en el sur de Ilocos, Filipinas, se celebra la fiesta del Cristo milagroso o *Apo Lacay* como lo llaman los filipinos. Esta imagen fue encontrada dentro de una caja que flotaba en el mar, junto con la Virgen Milagrosa. Fueron unos pescadores quienes hicieron el hallazgo. Los pescadores eran de los pueblos de Badoc y Sinait y decidieron llevarse el Cristo a Badoc, pero no lograron moverlo. Una vez que decidieron llevarse al Cristo a Sinait, la imagen se hizo muy ligera de peso, por lo cual se piensa que Cristo deseaba estar en Sinait.

Este Cristo negro recuerda a los Cristos milagrosos de Latinoamérica, como el Santo Cristo de Esquipulas (Guatemala), los Cristos de Tila, Chalma y Otaltitlán (México), el Señor de los Milagros (Perú) y otros. Probablemente se trata de una evangelización española ya que en 1595, el rey Felipe II mandó varios Cristos negros a los cristianos indígenas de América. En todo caso, estos Cristos han resultado milagrosos gracias a la fe del pueblo, porque como dice Jesús: nuestra fe es la que nos salva (Marcos 5:34; 10:46-52). — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Gluz, OFM, Copyright © J. Recognizing Jesus

St. Peter speaks to us twice today. In the first reading, we hear an excerpt from his sermon on Pentecost; in the second, part of his first Letter.

Once a frightened, uneducated fisherman who often said just the wrong thing, now Peter is speaking what he knows to be true. Everything Jesus had said now makes sense. His death and rising were all part of God's plan, and our faith and hope can be centered on God.

Today's Gospel tells the story of Jesus' walk to Emmaus with two of the disciples. Frightened, sad, and confused, the two don't recognize Jesus, who tells them what we heard Peter say above: all this had to happen as part of God's plan. In the end, these disciples recognize Jesus as we are to recognize him—in the breaking of the bread. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Asustados, tristes y confusos, ninguno de los dos reconoció a Jesús, quien les dice lo mismo que escuchamos de Pedro en la lectura anterior: todo eso sucedió como parte del plan de Dios. 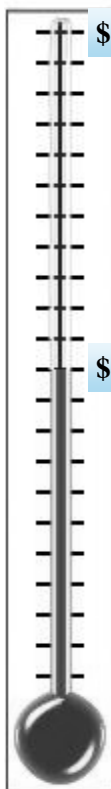

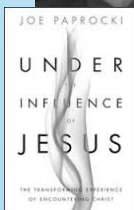

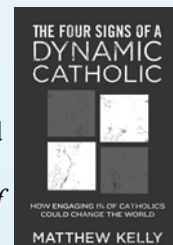
Following the Mass, join us for refreshments and a book signing with Joe. Copies of the book will be available after Mass.

My name is Dani Shain and I joined the SPRED community in October 2013.

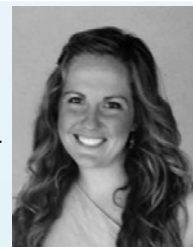
I have always loved working with youth but what really drew me to SPRED was the fact that the other catechists have been dedicated to the group for many years.
