# Reflection June 15 — June 21

### Glimpses into the Divine

Monotheism, the belief in a single, absolute and supreme God, distinguished Israel from its polytheistic neighbors. Fidelity to this One God was the first and most important commandment. Jews said the Sh'ma three times daily: "Hear, O Israel, the Lord your God is one, there is no other ..." Idolatry was the key sin against the covenant.

As the early Christian community reflected on and preached the mystery of Jesus, it struggled to grasp his relationship to God. His astonishing ministry, selfsacrificing death and reappearance from the grave forced his followers to reevaluate everything. Was Jesus a special messenger, the last prophet, an agent of God sent to reveal the purpose of history, or was he somehow something more?

He had said that God was his Abba, his intimate Father; and that he and the Father were one. The fourth Gospel, the last and most theological of the Gospels, claims that Jesus is in fact the divine logos, the Word of God made flesh in history. His life, death and resurrection redeemed humankind and restored our original destiny to share the divine life. In the Johannine vision, Jesus promises that he and his Father are sending their Holy Spirit to animate and guide the church. This insight overflowed into the new Christian understanding of God as a perfect unity of three divine Persons: Father, Son and Spirit.

Needless to say, the Chris-

tian doctrine of the Trinity could not and did not resolve the question of how three divine Persons, each God, form one God. It is a dynamic mystery, ineffable and impenetrable to the human mind, but a gracious invitation to know God intimately in an encounter of gradual and mutual self-revelation. One glimpse into God is to know ourselves as created in the image and likeness of God. Therefore, we also exist only in relationship, as a community of persons in love.

Because of our human limitations, we can only know God in human ways, but life is filled with glimpses into the divine. A couple plays a game with their young child, the husband whispering messages to the boy to take to his mother, she sending him back in delight to express her thoughts to his father. The game reveals the essence of love. The child who conveys each message is the message between his parents. He is the word made flesh, the expression of their love for one another. This, too, is more than biology or genetics. It is mystery.

A dating couple reaches the moment when they want a potential mate to meet their parents. But they already have, for each of us contains and reveals our family. The father is in the son, the mother is in the daughter, the parents are in their children.

Human life in all its aspects, joyful, sorrowful and glorious, is a continual encounter with grace revealed in nature, God present in everything. At table, we divide food but multiply friendship. In service and work, we spend our bodies but increase our spirits. Alone, we hear a voice whispering in our consciousness, moving us with inexpressible longing to find communion with others. Every chance meeting is grounds for celebration, as glances and gestures remind us we are not alone, but always pointed toward love as our purpose and greatest joy.

In friendship, we surrender ourselves to one another in trust, and in this imitation of God's inner life of mutual self-emptying, we participate in the Trinity. Life itself is preparing us for an eternity in the

### Finance Council Meeting Minutes March 17, 2014

### **Key Discussion:**

Erica provided the financials and the Council reviewed them. Administrative Expenses are being watched along with the line item Maintenance & Building Repairs.

The Capital Campaign, Building Faith Together has raised to date \$580,000. Discussion arose around the realistic goal for the entire project. Justin with his experience in capital construction has seen an average increase of 10% from initial estimates. A contingency of \$100,000 will ensure that the project will be completed efficiently and cover any unanticipated building issues that may arise. This will bring the amount of the project to \$1.4 million.

The Land Sale is under contract and anticipated to close in mid June. During the last Council meeting in February parishioners were able to bring up concerns to the committee regarding how the money would be used from the sale. At this March's meeting, it was agreed that of the anticipated return on the sale of \$2.9 million we have designated:

- \$100k for the contingency on the building renovation and that any costs over \$1.4 million will have to go to Finance Council for approval
- \$90k for repairs to Parish Center to be in compliance with the Protecting God's Children directive;
- \$110k for repairs on the roof, gutters, and air conditioning in the rectory;
- The remaining \$2.6 million will be designated for future capital endeavors.

The Council discussed the best ways to be transparent to the parish during the Land Sale and the church construction. It was decided that minutes of our monthly meetings would be posted in the bulletin and St. Teresa's website.

Fr. Frank talked about the costs associated with protecting the children of the parish. Particular capital improvements must be met and are expected to cost around \$90,000.

The next Council meeting will be May 19<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. Please note there will not be an April meeting.

### Treasures from Our Tradition

The liturgy seems reluctant to return to Ordinary Time from the joys of Easter, and so the festivities extend to today's celebration of the mystery of God's relationship to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Gospel today centers the question of our relationship with God in the struggle of

Nathaniel to believe that it is possible to experience "rebirth" in the Spirit. The answer of Jesus is that God's response to the messes of this world is the mystery of saving love in Jesus Christ and the outpouring of an empowering Spirit.

Western church architecture often tops a church building with a spire, indicating humanity's reach to a transcendent God. The Eastern Church responds with onion-shaped domes, indicating the Spirit's being poured down upon humanity precisely at this locale, the gathering of the faithful for the Divine Liturgy. This familiar design encodes a great mystery: here, at the Lord's table, we experience the outpouring of the Spirit for the life of the world. Nathaniel came to Jesus by night, since he was still working out the meaning of his life. A life attuned to the inner life of the Trinity must always be given to the light of day. — Rev. ### SPRED Calling

My name is Carrie Mondschean and I have been a member of St. Teresa's SPRED group since it started in 2005. SPRED stands for the Special Religious Development. Religious ministry is available to all persons of our faith and SPRED is the vehicle we minister to our friends which have a variety of special needs between 11 and 16 years of age here at St. Teresa.



What drew me was that I always loved teaching and I was a catechist with Liturgy of the Word at the Sunday 9:00 am masses for many years. One day, someone suggested I observe a SPRED group in action at Queen of Angels. I had no idea what SPRED was. My first thought was that I needed to be involved in another activity like I needed a hole in the head. I felt that I was already over committed. Nonetheless, I drove to Queen and Angels with another parishioner to observe. Queen of Angels has a state-of-the-art SPRED facility that allows observers to watch the group without the group knowing they are being watched. I sat there and was wowed by how beautiful the sessions were between the catechists and the friends. I knew right then and there that SPRED was my new calling. How lucky or graced upon was I that I went there and observed almost in spite of myself?

We had a group of catechists that met and began our journey together. We started from scratch and made it happen. I started out as a helper catechist assigned to one friend. After 3 years, I became an activity catechist whose role it is to ready and prepare both catechists and friends to a sense of inner calm and quietness far from our busy worlds so that they are in a position to better absorb and celebrate the spiritual message of the session. SPRED is an archdiocese program that uses Montessoritype techniques to ready our friends and catechists to hear and understand the Word of God. We foster a sense of the sacred, praverful awareness and an attitude of celebration in our community of faith through music, symbols and dance. We follow a workbook which is devised by a group of SPRED leaders that is planned and designed to reach deep into our friends' minds to give them a message or symbol that shows them Christ's light. Our St. Teresa's group is tight. Most of us have stayed. We joke that you can never leave SPRED once you join and in many ways it is true. The truth is... like so many missions we have here at St. Teresa's...you get more than you give. By far. We are always looking for more catechists to participate in this great ministry. Maybe you should schedule an appointment at Queen of Angels or the SPRED center in Bridgeport to observe? Do you hear your calling?

Please make certain that the gift is new because so many of the kids have weakened immune systems. Gifts should not be wrapped so staff at Comer can decide what to distribute to each child.

We are doing this at this time of year because it is unexpected and will hopefully be a wonderful surprise for the kids and will help lift their spirits a bit. It also happens to be close to Isabella's birthday which is June 25th.

To add to the feeling of that Christmas morning surprise, the songs at the 9:00 am Mass on Sunday will have a Christmas theme. So, come prepared to sing some Christmas carols even though the temperature will be in the '80s. And please bring a gift to help honor the memory of Isabella Feliciano.
