

Finance Council Meeting Minutes

March 17, 2014

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Key Discussion:

Erica provided the financials and the Council reviewed them. Administrative Expenses are being watched along with the line item Maintenance & Building Repairs.

The Capital Campaign, Building Faith Together has raised to date \$580,000. Discussion arose around the realistic goal for the entire project. Justin with his experience in capital construction has seen an average increase of 10% from initial estimates. A contingency of \$100,000 will ensure that the project will be completed efficiently and cover any unanticipated building issues that may arise. This will bring the amount of the project to \$1.4 million.

The Land Sale is under contract and anticipated to close in mid June. During the last Council meeting in February parishioners were able to bring up concerns to the committee regarding how the money would be used from the sale. At this March's meeting, it was agreed that of the anticipated return on the sale of \$2.9 million we have designated:

- \$100k for the contingency on the building renovation and that any costs over \$1.4 million will have to go to Finance Council for approval
- \$90k for repairs to Parish Center to be in compliance with the Protecting God's Children directive;
- \$110k for repairs on the roof, gutters, and air conditioning in the rectory;
- The remaining \$2.6 million will be designated for future capital endeavors.

The Council discussed the best ways to be transparent to the parish during the Land Sale and the church construction. It was decided that minutes of our monthly meetings would be posted in the bulletin and St. Teresa's website.

Fr. Frank talked about the costs associated with protecting the children of the parish. Particular capital improvements must be met and are expected to cost around \$90,000.

The next Council meeting will be May 19th at 7:00 pm. Please note there will not be an April meeting.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Today is an exceptional event on our calendar: the Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time is eclipsed by a solemnity

honoring two saints who didn't spend much time together in their earthly ministry, and who have distinct feasts so they probably don't mind sharing this one. Yet each suffered a similar fate in the same city, Rome, during the persecution of the Emperor Nero. Nero probably ordered the destruction of

many of the residential neighborhoods in service to his building projects, and when the homeless began to look for someone to blame for the fires, Nero targeted the Christians. Soon, Peter was crucified, upside down, on the Vatican hill. Excavations (called *scavi*) under the Vatican basilica have proven the authenticity of his burial place near the place of his death. Paul, a Roman citizen, was later granted a swifter execution by sword, and is remembered at a vast basilica on the city's outskirts.

Peter and Paul were just about polar opposites. Peter rough and ready, Paul poetic and polished. Peter carried a burden of regret for his denials, Paul had his own issues with which he struggled. Peter leapt over barriers to go to the Gentiles, Paul strove with and surrendered to the same call. True, they spent very little time together in this life, but the same Spirit filled their hearts and by their witness changed the face of the earth. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En 1769 los misioneros franciscanos establecieron la primera misión en lo que hoy es la ciudad de San Diego,

California. Bajo la dirección de fray Junípero Serra, los hermanos menores pudieron establecer otras ocho misiones, incluyendo la ciudad de San Francisco, en 1776.

Junípero o José Miguel Serra, fue hijo de padres campesinos de la Isla de Mallorca, España. Ingresó a la Orden de los hermanos

menores (franciscanos) a los dieciséis años y con el tiempo, llegó a ser profesor de filosofía, pero su verdadero deseo era ser misionero en el continente americano, lo que hoy conocemos como Hemisferio Occidental.

En 1749, su orden religiosa lo envió a México como administrador del Colegio Apostólico. Poco a poco se fue desprendiendo de sus cargos académicos para establecer misiones entre los indígenas. Aunque algunos afirman lo contrario, Junípero fue arduo defensor de los nativos. En California, más de una vez tuvo problemas con los soldados españoles, debido a que éstos abusaban de los amerindios, problemas que lo llevaron a defender los derechos humanos de los nativos ante el Virrey en México. Sus esfuerzos por cristianizar los indígenas de California tuvieron como resultado más de 6000 bautizos durante sus quince años en esa región. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Peter and Paul

Today is something of a rarity: the celebration of a saint's day that replaces the Sunday liturgy. Only a handful of

these days, given the official rank of "solemnity," are considered so foundational and primal to the mission of the Church that they can interrupt the Sunday sequence. And so it is with Peter and Paul today.

In a way, they each have personality traits with which we can identify. They are both impetuous, sometimes

acting or speaking thoughtlessly, contradicting the spiritual gifts given to them by God. At such times, they might receive a nudge from God, much the same as many of us experience. On the positive side, these men were deeply rooted in their faith in Christ, tireless and fearless in living out their call to spread the Good News of his death and resurrection. Perhaps we might identify more with one or the other, but the essential truth we celebrate today is this: Through the Spirit, Christ built and continues to build the Church and make the kingdom known through fragile, remarkable human beings, each graced in a particular way for the work of the reign of God. SPRED Calling



My name is SallyAnn Rose. Prior to the start of my SPRED ministry in 2004, I was asked to attend a SPRED (Special Religious Development) informational meeting. I knew

nothing about SPRED, but quickly learned the amazing effect SPRED has on Catholics with special needs— that people who might have a hard time relating to the rituals of the Mass or the standard CCD class could learn about God and feel a sense of community within a SPRED group.

I remember being told that as a Catechist, I would not only value my experiences with the special needs Friends, but also those with my fellow SPRED volunteers. I have found this to be so true. The group of people involved in the SPRED ministry at St Teresa is one of the most outstanding groups of people I know. Over the years, we have celebrated together and also supported each other through life events such as birthdays, changes in careers, sicknesses, marriages, loss of loved ones, births of children, loss of jobs and more. I feel so lucky to be a part of this group because it not only challenges me to be a better person spiritually but has also given me a place to grow in life supported by a small group of faithful friends.

St. Teresa's SPRED group meets weekly from September to May, and every other week the special needs Friends attend for a Total Community session. At Total Community Sessions, our Friends participate in sensory, art and everyday living activities to prepare and focus their hearts and minds so that they may enter into prayer with God. After these activities, the Friends and Catechists pray together by discussing a

symbol for that week that relates to a coordinating Bible passage. Our Friends are given a message of God's love by the Leader Catechist and then join together as a faith community in song and movements of prayer, followed by Agape. On alternating weeks, the Catechist sessions allow the adults to meet alone to reflect, pray, prepare for the next Total Community session and share a meal.

When I first began as a SPRED Catechist, I thought my life was so busy; little did I know what marriage, starting a business, moving, and having two kids could do to your spare time! But all of this has happened since I have been a part of SPRED, and even though my free time has decreased astronomically, there is always time in my heart and schedule for SPRED. I value the nights I drive to a SPRED session, because I get to shed myself of my responsibilities as mother, wife, entrepreneur, etc and just be a servant of Christ who is sharing my gifts and talents with the special needs children.

Several years ago I was paired with a 14 year old boy named Phillip who remained my Friend for three years. Phillip was severely autistic and non-verbal. His mother spoke little English and worked hard to support Phillip and his three siblings. Phillip had been baptized as a baby, and was attending the Spanish Mass at St. Alphonsus in Lakeview, but was having a hard time sitting through Mass and was also acting out in school. Through SPRED, Phillip came to know Christ. He looked forward to the Total Community sessions and started to open up to me. He would beat his chest to vibrate sounds as if to try to talk during sessions. He would smile when he entered our activity/celebration room and participate in our songs and movements

to music as a way of worship. He eventually received the sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation at a special SPRED mass at St. Teresa. This meant so much to his family. Phillip's mother told me that Phillip kept a picture of me next to his bed and would point to it each Tuesday morning when he woke up and knew it was a SPRED day.

I still keep in touch with Phillip and his family. We exchange Christmas cards each year and I just sent his family an announcement for the birth of my second child. I see Phillip from time to time at SPRED masses at St. Teresa. The bond and relationship that Phillip and I have is so meaningful and rewarding. What a gift the program has given me!

Over the years, I have heard many potential catechists use the weekly time commitment as a reason for not joining the ministry. We all value our time as there are so many demands placed on us by work, family, school and other commitments. However, what better value can be placed on your time than that of serving Christ in our special needs Friends and receiving the rewards of their love and discovering of faith. If you are looking for a

way to share your faith with others while at the same time deepening your own faith, please consider becoming a part of this awesome ministry.



Church Unity in Diversity

Christianity is a religion grounded in history. It is based not just on ideas or visions but on the person of Jesus Christ, whom we believe to be God appearing in human history. The Catholic church also claims a unique historical grounding in the apostles Peter and Paul, who are linked directly to Jesus by call and conversion to proclaim his message to the world. The city of Rome makes a further unique claim to special leadership by asserting that both Peter and Paul were martyred there. Peter, identified by Jesus as the rock on whom the church was founded (Matt 16:18), is held to be the first in a long line of popes Roman Catholics say are the true vicars of Christ on earth. What the church claims historically it celebrates liturgically in today's Solemnity of Peter and Paul, Apostles.

It is an impressive history, even if it requires many interpretive lenses to justify these claims or downplay the fact that all history is written to affirm the institutions that emerged from the crises, confusion and competition of the centuries to lock their particular narratives in stone and ceremony. The real proof of authenticity is an institution's fidelity to its founding principles. The church is authentic when it looks and acts like Jesus, who sided with the poor and outcast, taught and lived God's limitless mercy, laid down his life for love.

failed deeply: Peter denied his Lord to save his own life; Paul persecuted the followers of Jesus. Most institutions would have been tempted to edit their bios to make them seem more heroic. But it is their conversions that affirmed the power of God's grace, that enabled them to preach mercy and reconciliation as the heart of the good news. The church is authentic, attractive and effective when it is a refuge for failures and sinners. Peter and Paul lead the way in this regard.

The scriptures show they had strong disagreements about the direction the church should take. Peter devoted his energies to serving the mostly Jewish Christian communities, while Paul went out

to evangelize gentiles. They clashed over whether gentiles had to observe the Mosaic Law to be full Christians. Paul confronted Peter for waffling about the freedom gentile converts had in Christ. The first church council in Jerusalem resolved this issue to allow the community to expand beyond its original Jewish identity. Again, the witness of their struggle and the need for the Holy Spirit teaches an important lesson to our contemporary church. Change is necessary. Even saints can disagree. Consensus is possible under the Spirit's guidance. Unity in diversity, not uniformity or the suppression of dissent, is built into the history of the church.

Paul's house churches — convened by charismatic leaders, including women — remain part of church history alongside the emergence of a male hierarchical priesthood. Tradition means handing on essentials, not holding on to cherished past forms even when they are no longer effective. The spread of the Gospel has always involved adaptation, enculturation and dialogue between diverse interests, between East and West, across sectarian and religious lines.

Celebrating the memory of Peter and Paul, Apostles, helps us remember how much courage was required by early church leaders to achieve what we now enjoy. We honor them by imitating that same spirit today.
