Unpredictable Growth

Three lively parables in today's Gospel compare the invisible growth of God's life in us to the organic miracles that occur in the field and in the kitchen.

Seeds planted in the soil burst their husks, send down roots and send up shoots that produce an abundant harvest. Or an enemy sows a weed in the pasture, its roots entwining with the wheat below ground as both appear in the greening field. Or the humble mustard seed, so small we barely feel it rolling between finger and thumb, once cast into the wind takes over a farm with fast-growing bushes that attract noisy birds. Or yeast mixed into flour, water and other ingredients to turn an inert mass of dough into aromatic loaves bursting their pans in the oven, enough to feed a whole village.

God is revealed in these stories, Jesus says. The owner of the wheat field sabotaged by an enemy is wise enough to tell his workers to wait until the harvest to separate the wheat from the weeds. Matthew found rich application for this parable in his community of Jewish-gentile converts in Antioch. Conflict between the groups may have had people talking about kicking each other out. What modern parish has not witnessed this same temptation to weed out dissenters? God is patient, Jesus said, and so should we be patient, because who really knows good from evil? Better to let mercy cover us all and wait for God to sort out the harvest.

The parable of the mustard seed is about the rapid and often unpredictable growth of the kingdom of God. Cautious farmers would not want windborne seeds taking over their

fields, much less bushes that attract hungry birds. But God's extravagant love looks for trouble. Ask any church that thought it could start a nice little soup kitchen, pantry or clothing bank to express its Christian faith. When need knocks on the door, the real kingdom of God is at hand.


The parable of the yeast, like that of the mustard seed, is about great things coming from small inputs, but its full meaning expands and rises in novel ways when we take it in context. First, Jesus must have surprised his audiences by saying the kingdom was

like a woman. Women were invisible, without status or roles in religious affairs. Yet he says that God is like a woman who takes yeast, a mysterious substance allowed to decay in order to perform its pungent chemistry in the wet dough. It mysteriously comes alive, creating abundance. God dwells as much in the kitchen as in the temple, in women as in men. We do our part to assemble the ingredients of religion, but only the Spirit can breathe life into our small efforts.

Jesus taught in parables, but Matthew adds that "he taught the crowds only in parables." Why? Quoting Psalm 58, Matthew says Jesus used parables to "announce truths hidden from the foundation of the world." By using this imaginative teaching technique, Jesus drew the crowds into the hidden process of unlocking their deeper meaning. What lies beyond logical or literal truth is revealed to the heart in the "Aha!" moment only inspiration makes possible. With a wink, a nod and a smile, the master storyteller pulls his audience through the many layers of meaning to grasp the underlying truth that is both entertainment and invitation to find God.

Let those who have ears to hear enter the parables and there meet face to face a loving, astonishing God.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Charlemagne, crowned Holy Roman Emperor on Christmas Day, 800, had a major interest in shaping the worship life of the church, and began a long period of reform and regulation. We owe many confirmation policies and practices to his rule. A baptized person was required to be confirmed as soon as the bishop's presence made it possible. Priests were expected to do their best in seeing to it that a newly-baptized child received the Eucharist. One twelfth-century ritual insists that if the child is not yet capable of eating or drinking, then the priest might give him or her some of the Precious Blood on a leaf or a finger.

Despite the best efforts of the Empire to hold liturgical life together, the rules were not always lived out with great beauty. St. Richard of Chichester of thirteenth-century England, for example, was canonized for his holy life as a bishop. One of the remarkable signs of his sanctity was his willingness to climb down from his horse to confirm "merely baptized" layfolk who crossed his path! This praiseworthy practice points a finger of blame at less zealous bishops, whose casual attitudes revealed a sacrament in need of rescue. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Matthew, more than any other evangelist, talks about Jesus leaving and returning home. Often Jesus leaves the house because crowds have assembled outside and want to be taught. Today, after having taught and dismissed the crowds, his disciples follow him home, seeking further explanation of what seem to be, at least to us today, pretty straightforward parables.

For both Matthew and Mark, when Jesus is in the house with his disciples it signals a special teaching moment, and it should cause us today to perk up our ears. Usually it is Jesus giving commonsense advice about what it will mean to follow him. Today is no different. To follow Jesus means to be ready to encounter the followers of evil, to have to live and work and preach among them. It means patiently awaiting the judgment that can only come from God, the judgment of justly deciding who will be thrown into the flame and who will live to be a brightly shining saint. 



Summer Mission July 26-27, 2014

Fr. Geoffrey Andama will be our summer missionary speaker next weekend. He is a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago and a native of Uganda in Africa.

He will be speaking on behalf of the Saint Therese Youth Development Center International (STYDEC International) of Ghana, a Catholic

not-for-profit organization dedicated to Youth Ministry, Evangelization and Education in the most rural parts of Ghana, where there is no running water, no portable drinking water, and no electricity. Children have to walk several miles each day to school in a nearby town and back, and usually do so, many a time on empty stomachs and no water to drink while in school. Most of these villages have not yet been evangelized, and Bishop Bemile of the diocese of Wa in Ghana asked STYDEC to help spread the Gospel in these areas.

This year there are two main projects for the Mission Appeal. One is to provide one nutritious meal a day for the over 1,800 children in the most deprived parts of northern Ghana. The other is to build a Catholic Boarding High School to provide quality affordable education for the youth in the most deprived communities in northern Ghana.

This will cost an estimated two hundred thousand U.S. dollars to build and furnish. All funds collected from this Mission Co-op at St. Teresa Parish will go directly to these two main projects.


