

Building the People

Twelve years ago I visited Rome with my parish choir. It was a privileged 10 days, singing in those ancient and venerable places: St. Peter's Basilica; the catacombs where early Christians were buried; the churches of St. Mary Major and the Gesu; and St. John Lateran, the pope's cathedral, the dedication of which we celebrate today.

I confess to a certain "So what?" response to this feast. Why this commemoration in every Catholic church in the world, and why is it so important that it replaces the Sunday? For us American Catholics, where it is in our blood to create anew, this is especially strange. "What has this to do with us?"

St. John Lateran was the first Christian basilica, dedicated on November 9 in the year 324. Its name comes from the family who donated the land, the Laterani family, and the church is dedicated under the patronage of both St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist. The popes lived in the palace adjoining the church until the 14th century.

This was the site of five ecumenical councils. The church is still the pope's cathedral, not, as many assume, St. Peter's. And, as the pope is the shepherd of the universal church, the Lateran Basilica of St. John is the cathedral church of the world. Over the doorway of the facade, the inscription reads: *Omnium urbis et orbis ecclesiarum mater et caput*, that is, "Mother and

head of all the churches of the city and of the world."

That is why the dedication of St. John Lateran is celebrated in parish churches in Missouri and New Brunswick and Honduras and Hyderabad and everywhere else I have Facebook friends. As Facebook is a prime example, the movement of history is to bring peoples together, not separate them. Our technology has created of our world a global village where we can be in almost instant communication with anyone on the planet. Even when Rome was remote and communication took days, it is through Rome that we connect to all Catholics everywhere. Rome's failures are our failures. And Rome's glories are also ours. One of those glories is that we are one people despite our native language, our race or ethnicity, our station in life. That is what this feast of dedication is about: building the whole

people of God, across space and time, into a holy temple.


Just as the building is sacred because of the people who fill it and what they do there, so are we each created to be sacred: holy temples of the Spirit of God. As St. Paul reminds his beloved community in Corinth, we are each being formed into a dwelling place for God on earth. As there is behavior not acceptable in God's house witness Jesus admonishing those who would turn his father's house into a marketplace — so there are actions and attitudes unbefitting those called to be Christ-bearers to the world.

If we are each a temple of God's Spirit, aren't we so much more than mere consumers or commodities? We are more than our possessions, more than our market value. Maybe it's time for inventory, time to clean house for the Divine Guest and rid ourselves of what is not suitable for the sacred Christ-bearers we are called to be. Let us pray for each other, as brothers and sisters in Christ, and pray especially today for Pope Francis, that he may continue to inspire believers everywhere to holiness, humility and humor as we witness to the love of God for this world.

Treasures from Our Tradition

For several weeks, we have considered penance as a sacrament of forgiveness, and yet there are two other sacraments in this category. The first, of course, is the Eucharist itself. The other is the sacrament of the sick, long associated with penance.

The Letter of James sets out the deep tradition for caring for the sick: sending for the priests, who will pray and lay their hands on the sick ones, anointing them with oil, and giving them forgiveness. Long before other rites of penance developed, the sacrament of the sick was therefore a profound experience of forgiveness. Jesus often healed the sick, nearly always as a visible sign of forgiveness of sin. The tradition didn't unfold smoothly,

however, and within a few centuries the oil of the sick was taken home to be applied by caregivers as a salve, or even to be drunk as a medicine. As early as the second century, bishops were therefore urging that priests should be the ones to visit those separated by illness from the Sunday assembly. Thus the practice of consigning the Eucharist and the oil of the sick to the non-ordained faithful to bring home was relatively short-lived. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Hoy celebramos la memoria de la Iglesia madre de la cristiandad. Por extraña coincidencia, no está en Jerusalén donde nació la Iglesia, tampoco es la Basílica de San Pedro en el Vaticano, donde está el sepulcro (o la tumba) de san

Pedro. Esta iglesia es la Basílica que está dedicada a la memoria del Divino Salvador, a san Juan Bautista y a san Juan Evangelista. Fue la primera basílica consagrada en el año 324 al culto cristiano en Roma.

De allí ha tenido una larga trayectoria, y aunque es la catedral del obispo de Roma, el Papa se trasladó al Vaticano en 1377, luego de que el papado estuvo durante un período de 100 años en Francia.

Al recordar la consagración de la Basílica de Letrán no debemos olvidar lo que dice san Pablo: "Cada uno de nosotros somos un templo del Espíritu Santo" (1 Corintios 6:19). En un sueño, Inocencio III vio que Letrán estaba por caerse, pero san Francisco pudo sostenerla en pie. The Temple and Worship

In all of today's readings, the temple is prominently mentioned. Ezekiel speaks of streams of living water flowing

out from the temple, watering the desert, bringing life to all living things, offering fresh healing to God's people.

Paul reminds the Corinthians that their faith rests upon the firmest of foundations, Christ himself. More than that, Paul reveals that those who follow Christ are themselves temples, temples of the Holy Spirit; that is, God dwells not only with them, but in them.

For the Jews of Jesus' time, the temple had come to be identified with the presence of God and the only place where authentic worship of God took place. Jesus had a different perception. Jesus identified himself not with the temple, but as the temple. In so doing, Jesus indicated a dramatic

shift in what it means to worship God, to be in God's presence. No longer was a place to be the focus of prayer. Instead, a person, the person of Jesus Christ, becomes the center of our worship. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Para los judíos de los tiempos de Jesús, el Templo era identificado con la presencia de Dios y como el lugar santo en donde la verdadera adoración a Dios tenía lugar. Jesús tenía una percepción diferente. Jesús se identifica a sí mismo no con el Templo, sino como el templo. Al

throughout Spain, and began the reform of the male Carmelites.






Change in 2014 Greenery Sales




Winter Coats Urgently Needed For Homeless Adults and Children
