

## Watch and Pray

The early church lived during a critical transition from expecting the imminent return of Jesus to a more long-haul understanding of God's plan in history. Today's Gospel describes the church as a household keeping watch for its master's return. Members are to be alert but also busy doing their assigned tasks. Paul's early letters caution against idleness or passivity. Jesus will hold everyone accountable, so stay awake and at your posts, for the Lord might come at any moment.

As it became clear that a delayed parousia meant the mission of Jesus had become the life of the church for generations to come, the call to stay alert did not diminish. Watchfulness went to the heart of Christian faith. We are to pray always, to watch for signs of the Lord's presence and activity in the world. The work of redemption is not a single culminating harvest at the end of time, but the gradual work of sowing God's word and cultivating communities of virtue, peacemaking and reconciliation in the name of Jesus.

Advent reminds us that we are household servants who keep the lamps trimmed and the fires burning as a way of life, with a spirituality of mindfulness and vigilance. Parents who leave a light on in the hall for a son or daughter coming in late know the anxious edge of watchfulness. Anyone who has lost a loved one or must live with protracted crisis knows the

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burden of longing for resolution. We learn to pray without ceasing when we want something with all our hearts. Seniors find their vocation to worry the lost sheep home as they count the watches of the night, fingering their beads, sitting up in their restless beds. This is Advent faith.

What makes Advent joyful is that at the end of our watchfulness is good news, a birth announcement, new life and fresh hope for a tired, anxious world. Jesus' birth 2,000 years ago revealed that God is with us, is one of us. The Incarnation is a continuous process of transformation, of new creation within the shell of the old. We are part of the divine plan. We watch and pray so as to be ready at all times to welcome God's grace in our lives, for ourselves and for one another.


Advent spirituality can see in the dark, can find hope when mere optimism is not enough, interprets breakdown as breakthrough and hears bad news as a chance to show compassion, to accompany others as they search for God in suffering.

Advent people demonstrate that patience and faith are better than anger and cynicism in times of trouble. One leads to wisdom, the other to burnout. They say: Wait and see what God can make out of a bad situation, how love over time turns hearts of stone into hearts of flesh, how even a small light can overcome the darkest night.

The Christmas story we celebrate with colored lights and pageantry forgets the original terror of an out-of-town couple at the 11th hour desperate to find a place to give birth to their firstborn. This story is full of the sound of hoofbeats and the clatter of swords, the murder of children, the flight into Egypt, a life of rejection and misunderstanding.

Watch and pray. Don't fall asleep. God may appear at any time. Blessings flow during the odd hours, the unexpected moments when "nothing" happens or we are distracted by false lights and empty promises, fixated and bored in shadow and shallow, in the blur of stimulation for its own sake. Advent signals us to be ready. Something wonderful is about to happen.

## Treasures from Our Tradition

Each of the seven sacraments, like other aspects of the Church's pastoral plan, is an attempt to be faithful to the image of Christ we discover in the Gospels. Anointing of the sick is rooted in Jesus' saving deeds of healing and even rescue from death. What is your favorite encounter of Jesus with a sick person? Often, it seems that Jesus would go at once to the person in a crowd who was in the most pain, in the deepest need. A man born blind, Peter's mother-in-law, a woman afflicted by years of uncontrollable hemorrhages, a little Roman girl beloved by her soldier father, a crippled man lowered from the rafters, and even a man who lost his ear to a swinging sword in the garden of agony. This list reads like an admissions chart in an emergency room, and perhaps that is the point. The whole human experience from childhood to old age, from sudden catastrophic illness to chronic debilitating conditions, is represented by those for whom Jesus has such great compassion. This we can name a treasure of tradition with a capital "T." We are a people of compassion for our sick, who reach out in tenderness to listen, to keep vigil, to strengthen, to touch with reverence, and to anoint with precious oil. — Rev. 

Parte de esa Tradición fue escrita en la Sagrada Escritura (Biblia) pero no toda. Como nos lo dice Juan el Evangelista "Hay además otras muchas cosas que hizo Jesús. ## Watch!

“Watch!” This word occurs three times in today’s Gospel passage. Moreover, it is placed at significant points: the beginning, the center, and the end. Though this is technically a parable, it is quite short (four verses). The threefold repetition of “watch” leaves no doubt as to what the story is about.

We often think of Advent as a time of waiting, but it truly is a season of watchfulness, a very active form of waiting for the coming Day of the Lord. It is that day, more than Christmas day, that the Christian community faithfully expects, using all of our gifts and talents for this purpose, as Paul reminds us in the Letter to the Corinthians. When we use these gifts in faithful watching and expectation, we become like the servants of the parable, set to their tasks, not waiting around idly, but engaged in the master’s work until his return. May our Advent be a time when we return or rededicate our lives and our communities to this work—the active and diligent faithfulness that the Lord will expect to find. Copyright © J. S. ## ¡Velen!

“¡Velen!” Esta palabra ocurre dos veces en el Evangelio de hoy, situada en puntos estratégicos: al principio, y en el centro. Aunque técnicamente sea una parábola, el texto es bastante breve (cuatro versículos). La doble repetición de “velen” no deja lugar a duda de lo que trata este relato.

A menudo pensamos en Adviento como un tiempo de espera, pero en realidad es un tiempo de vigilancia, una forma muy activa de esperar la llegada del Día del Señor. Ese es el Día, más que el día de Navidad, anticipado fielmente por la comunidad cristiana, ya que usa todos sus talentos y dones para este fin, como nos lo recuerda Pablo en la carta a los corintios. Cuando usamos estos dones en fiel espera y anticipación, nos hacemos como los sirvientes de la parábola, entregados a sus tareas, no esperando como vagos, sino encargados de la labor del maestro hasta su regreso. Que nuestro Adviento sea un tiempo en que reencaminamos o rededicamos nuestra vida y nuestra comunidad a esta labor, la fidelidad activa y diligente que el Señor espera encontrar. Copyright © J. S. 



Once the cement sub-floor is made level and epoxy applied, the Terrazzo flooring material can be mixed and trowled onto the cement sub-floor and into the medallions (inset). Terrazzo looks like rough white cement at this stage. The Terrazzo will then be grinded, sanded, and buffed to a shine.


