

# Public People

On the day he was baptized, Jesus went down into that muddy Jordan River a private person. He came up out of the water ready to begin his life of ministry. He came up a public person.

When we think of public people, we might first think of folks who are on television or whose names are in the headlines — leaders of nations, CEOs, actors, sports heroes; or, too often, those accused of crimes and other notorious figures. On a local level, maybe we think of the mayor, business leaders, perhaps pastors and teachers and coaches.

Part of what goes with being a public person is accountability and, in many cases, leadership, whether elected, appointed, ordained or otherwise recognized. And sometimes leadership, like notoriety, is transitory; it's just taking responsibility when one sees a task that needs doing, a niche that needs filling.

But notice: The event that marked the beginning of Jesus' public life was baptism.

We baptized are public people. We baptized are acknowledged members of a community, and we are called to play our part, to take responsibility for the good of all. We cannot point our fingers and whine and complain and accuse "them." There is no "them" among the baptized, only "us" and "we." And together we are called to take responsibility for the work of the community and for each other, even and especially for our leaders. Leaders are like the point in a flying flock of geese. To bear the headwind, they must have the support of the flock. And sometimes they must exchange positions, resting for a while on the

efforts of others.

It seems that we are experiencing a crisis of leadership. It is nearly impossible for anyone with "a past" to run for public office. The degree of scrutiny exposes peccadilloes, but doesn't allow for lessons learned, for conversion. In our schools there are fewer teachers who want to assume the responsibilities of a principal because no one wants to be the target of every unhappy parent or teacher. And in our church, it seems there are not enough people who are willing to serve as pastors.

When there is a crisis of leadership, perhaps we need to look at what we are asking of our leaders. We demand of them something that we do not demand of ourselves — a greater degree of morality, transparency, even nobility. But do we demand too much while supporting too little?

And are we recognizing those


called to leadership, a call manifested by their God-given skills and passions? Sometimes leaders are recognized by the people who know and willingly follow them, but not by the organization they serve. Consider an "outsider" who has risen through the ranks of a family business, but can go no further because he is not family. Or consider the talent and dedication of some members of the church who cannot assume a leadership position because they are women, or married to one.

All leadership is service, and service requires humility. To serve the people of God as Christ served, to be a servant leader, we must have a degree of humility that demands discipline and self-sacrifice.

As our bishop preached at the recent installation of our pastor, leaders must be willing to die for their people. Few are required to die a physical death, but to be effective, each leader, indeed each public person, is required to die to self. And this is what baptism is — the entrance into a community of faith with the promise to act and speak as the Christ within demands.

## Treasures from Our Tradition

In the 1560s, the Council of Trent attempted to standardize the widely variant customs for the pastoral care of the sick and dying. We had inherited a practice called "extreme unction," from the Latin words mean-

ing anointing at the point of death. The deeper tradition, however, is about the prayer of faith that will heal and restore the sick person, and is straight from the Letter of James. The Fathers went back to the beginning, and while not discarding the "extreme unction" name, made a plea for the proper use of this sacrament. As soon as a person is in danger of death from sickness or old age, they reasoned, the time for the sacrament had already arrived.

As a result of this desire, the next ritual text for anointing contained an innovation: a rite for visiting the sick that included readings from scripture, psalms, and prayers. Old customs fade slowly, however, and the quality of pastoral care languished for centuries while people delayed the celebration of a consoling and effective sacrament, sometimes missing the opportunity completely. A priest ministering to a dying and unconscious patient alone in a room has never been the desire of the Church. Our tradition is far too rich for this sacrament to be celebrated in such a diminished and ungenerous manner. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.


## Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

# The Waters of Baptism

When new sod is put in, it needs constant saturation

with water. Landscapers say that this "knits" the sod to the soil. The same when a branch is grafted onto a tree: the poultice that joins them at the splice must be kept wet at all times. Water is the stuff that binds the very cells of our bodies together. No wonder religions throughout all times and cultures have used it so prominently. When Jesus stepped into the Jordan for baptism, he "knit" himself to what had come before him. By going to the Jordan, he made himself one with the peo-

ple of Israel who had crossed it into their Promised Land. With John the Baptist, Christ wove himself into the prophetic tradition that heralded the coming reign of God. He had become fully human in the waters of Mary's womb, and by partaking in the rite of the baptism of repentance, Jesus identified himself with our sinful, frail humanity. It is through the waters of baptism that Christ continues to graft new members onto his Body, the Church; through these waters we are cleansed from sin and filled with the promise of grace, given our destiny for eternal life. 
