

In 1967, a song written by a then unknown country singer named Bobbie Gentry made it all the way to the top of the hit song list — even outdoing the latest Beatles tune. The song was titled "Ode to Billie Joe" and generated eight Grammy nominations.


Known for its haunting Southern Gothic tale of the news that "Billie Joe McAllister jumped off the Tallahatchie Bridge," the song is not just about the tragedy of a suicide, but even more so about the indifference that a family who knew the victim demonstrates at their dinner table while hearing about this chilling event.

Listen in while they discuss it: The narrator's father says, "Well, -Billie Joe never had a lick o' sense, pass the biscuits please." The narrator's brother seems shocked for a moment, but then dismissively says, "I'll have another piece of apple pie." Mama is more concerned about the narrator's change of mood: "Child, what's happened to your appetite? I been cookin' all mornin' and you haven't touched a single bite."

Sadly, the reality is that our society in general could fit right in with this family.

Every year, 40,000 Americans die by suicide, one every 13 minutes. Homicides have fallen by half since 1991, but the suicide rate in America keeps climbing. It is now the second leading killer for those age 15-34. "And yet," one article reports, "Americans simply

shrug."

Our indifference shows up in the fact that states have moved away from inpatient treatment for the mentally ill. Consequently, our sickest patients now end up in jails and homeless shelters and emergency rooms. As Bobbie Gentry, the author of the above song, put it in an interview: There's unconscious cruelty afoot" in our society when it comes to dealing with severe depression and suicide.

According to one writer: "Here's the thing about depression: a human being can survive almost anything, as long as she sees the end in sight. But depression is so insidious it's impossible to ever see the end. The fog it creates is like living in a cage without a key."

Thankfully, in the midst of

all this sadness comes today's Gospel — a word that means "good news." It talks about a light that penetrates into the depth of our darkness. It talks about a God who "so loved the world that he sent his only Son." It talks about a hope so glorious — eternal life with God — that it can lift the human spirit and connect it to the Source of all life.


John's Gospel is all about the One sent by the Father precisely to reignite the fire of compassion within our hearts so that we can find the energy to believe again, to re-embrace life, to cast out the demons of darkness. And even more than all this, the good news is: It's not about what we have to do to earn this. Instead it's all about what God gratuitously does for us.

He sends his Son. He sends his Son so that we can see with our own eyes what St. Paul talks about in our second reading today when he describes our God as being "rich in mercy," when he describes you and me as being "brought to life in Christ" and when he tops it all off by calling each of us God's "handiwork."

May God give us the grace this Lent to rediscover the depths of God's love for each one of us, especially those immersed in the pain of depression, in the hope that we can create a sense of mission in our society to bring an end to the tragedies of any future Billie Joe McAllisters.

Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison to Date



- For the 2015 Fiscal Year, Sunday Offertory Collections are 10% below the budgeted collection amount. This results in a fiscal year to date deficit of \$298,064.
- For the 2015 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$37 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the stripped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.
- We recently learned that we exceeded our Annual Catholic Appeal contributions by \$3,946.97; this excess has been given back to St. Teresa Parish.



Treasures from Our Tradition

With the dissipation of the catechumenate's energy since almost everyone was born into the Church, Lent began to be seen more as a preparation to follow the Passion of Christ with devotion. In the city of Rome, creative spirits

settled on "stational churches" as a way of keeping the energy flowing. Everyone would be directed to a certain "station" each day, and the name of that church provided a theme for the liturgy. So, for example, on certain Saturdays in Lent, everything centered on the church of St. Vitale. Now, this poor fellow had been thrown into a hole and covered in stones at his martyrdom, so the readings recalled Joseph thrown down the well by his brothers, and the wicked servants killing the son of the owner of the vineyard.


Gradually, travelers to Rome noted the celebration and worked it into liturgical schedules back home. Eventually, calendars everywhere bore the curious footnote on a Lenten Saturday: "Station S. Vitale." This served the priority of getting ready to hear the Passion fairly well, but was hardly satisfactory for Lent's baptismal character. Now, at last, our liturgy is reorganized to serve the deepest level of our tradition exceedingly well. Lent, once again, is all about baptism. — Rev. James Field, Copyright @ J. S. Paluch Co.

Raised Up By The Messiah

Last week, when Jesus referred to the destruction of the temple, the account from today's first reading is what would have come to the minds of his listeners. But, as Jesus was speaking on a deeper level, so does today's first reading. In the first paragraph we hear that Israel had, in effect, "fallen" already through its



infidelity to the covenant. Lest we get too cozy, this account reminds us that God, though just, loving, and merciful, is capable of punishing sin when that sin is unrepentant. But we are also reminded that God, rich in mercy, anoints individuals to be vessels of salvation as well (in Hebrew, King Cyrus of Persia is called "messiah"). In the Gospel reading, we hear of another Messiah being "lifted up" for our salvation in one of the best-known passages from the New Testament. As Lent concludes and we enter Holy Week, we need to keep our gaze steadfast upon the cross of Christ, the Son of God who came into the world to raise us who had fallen. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Pero también nos recuerda que Dios, rico en misericordia, unge a individuos para que sean a su vez instrumentos de salvación (en hebreo al Rey Ciro de Persia se le denomina "mesías"). En la lectura del Evangelio, escuchamos de otro Mesías que debe ser "levantado" por nuestra salvación, en uno de los pasajes más conocidos del Nuevo Testamento. Al terminar la Cuaresma y entrar en la Semana Santa, debemos mantener nuestra mirada fija en la cruz de Cristo, el Hijo de Dios que vino al mundo para levantarnos a todos los que habíamos caído. Urgent: Food Pantry Needs Thursday Drivers



St. Teresa's Food Pantry is urgently and immediately seeking three (3) new volunteers to join the Thursday Food Pickup Team.

Every Thursday, a

volunteer driver picks up our food order from the Greater Chicago Food Depository (near Midway airport) using a cargo van rented from the Home Depot (1232 W North Ave). Additional volunteers meet the driver at church to help unload the delivery van and arrange food into the pantry.

The driver pickup task runs roughly 9:00-11:00am. Ideally, we are seeking people who can drive once every 4-6 weeks, but we have flexibility in the ministry (e.g., winters off; summers off). Drivers choose their pickup dates based on their schedule via VolunteerSpot. Please consider if this ministry is a good fit for you. It is crucial to St. Teresa's social justice ministries.

Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays in Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics 18 years old but not yet 59.



Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid food between meals is not permitted.

The Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

El ayuno es para ser observado el miér-

coles de ceniza por todos los católicos de 18 años, pero aún no 59. Los que están obligados por la presente puede tomar sólo una comida completa. Dos comidas más pequeñas se permiten si es necesario para mantener la fuerza de acuerdo a las necesidades de uno, pero comer alimentos sólidos entre comidas no está permitido.

El ayuno, así como la abstinencia Pascual, se prescriben para el Viernes Santo y alentó para el Sábado Santo.


