



We Are the Branches


Today's Gospel story of the vine and the vine grower is basic to our understanding of our lives as Christians. This story is so important that it is part of Jesus' farewell discourse at the Last Supper.

Jesus is instructing his disciples about their relationship with him and with his Father. Jesus is himself the vine; those who believe in him are the branches. The vine, the trunk, does not produce fruit. It is the branches, Jesus' followers, who bear the fruit. But the branches are only able to do that because of the life they receive from the vine: "Just as a branch cannot bear fruit [of good works] on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me" (John 15:4).

In the story there is also the vine grower: Jesus' Father. The vine grower ensures that the vine and branches produce the best fruit. This means that at times the vine must be pruned. With pruning, unproductive branches are removed so that the life and productive power of the vine can more successfully produce good fruit.

Now, you and I benefit from hearing and reflecting on this story of Jesus. There have been others who, without actually knowing the story of the vine and vine grower, came to understand its lessons of relationship to Christ from the experiences of their lives.

One of those persons we hear about today: Paul, the Pharisee-turned-disciple of Christ. Paul

came to know Jesus and his Father through a series of extraordinary experiences. In today's first reading, we encounter Paul, then called Saul, trying to become part of the community of disciples in Jerusalem.

Saul had undergone a conversion experience while traveling to Damascus. The strange thing about it was that at the time, Saul was on his rounds determined to destroy the church (Acts 9:2). "Saul considered nothing but violence and death for the disciples of the Lord" (Acts 9:1).

The Lord evidently saw in Saul a potential partner in the spread of the good news. But it required knocking Saul to the ground and taking away his sight to get his attention. That was the beginning of a lifetime of "pruning" for Saul. Saul would be pruned of his arro-


gance, his violence, his self-will and whatever stood between him and the message of Christ, which he was to preach by word and example.

At long last, Saul was pruned to the point that he bore the fruit of repentance and conversion to Christ. Saul became Paul, a disciple. But there was still more to be done. As we heard in today's first reading, Paul's pruning included mending fences with other disciples. He had to acknowledge his sins and faults and become one with the community of believers. Later on, Paul would also have to face rejection from many who would not accept the message he worked so hard to share with them.

Each one of us, too, is faced with pruning so that we can come to full and fruitful life in Christ. Like Paul, we may carry the dead wood of missed opportunities, barren branches of self-will and arrogance, or many other faults. These need to be stripped away so that we can bear good fruit for the reign of God.

If pruning sounds difficult, even harsh, we have the assurance that God is working in and through us. As St. John says, if we live in Christ and his words stay part of us, we can ask him for what we need and it will be done for us. And then, like Paul and the others, we will be faithful disciples, and God will be glorified in our bearing much fruit (John 15:7-8).

Treasures from Our Tradition

Over time, the crisis of last illness and the way the faithful met death changed. In earliest times, a sick-bed vigil was an occasion for the community to gather and strengthen the dying person with assurances of love. A thousand years ago, in part because of massive upheavals in society, a new emphasis on individual repentance captured the imagination of millions. Death was to be feared, because it was about judgment. The delights of heaven's banquet dimmed, since most people saw God's just judgment and inevitable punishment intervening. If a community gathered at all, it was not to express faith in the Resurrection, but to seek forgiveness for those who were powerless to help themselves. The dead couldn't improve their situation, but their loved ones, by expressing sorrow for sin, could. Better yet, the clergy could, if they intervened in a timely fashion, provide the absolution needed for everyone to relax. Ministry to the sick shifted away from a ministry of consolation toward a challenge to repent before it was too late.

As the sense grew that most people died with their work of repentance incomplete, the color black was reintroduced to funerals. It was the old pagan way of expressing despair. No wonder they call this time in history the "Dark Ages." Many layers have had to be peeled away to reveal the deepest, most positive expressions of our tradition of care for the dying. — Rev. Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe



Durante la Última Cena, Jesús dijo a sus apóstoles: "Yo soy la vid, ustedes son los sarmientos" (Juan 15:5). Jesús añade que los sarmientos (ramas) que permanecen en él, dan mucho fruto. Según la agricultura, la vid es una parra, es decir, una planta perenne de ramas frondosas. Una parte importante de la vid son las hojas. Es obvio que una vid tiene hojas, pero Jesús no las menciona, prefiere enfocarse en los sarmientos. Las partes de la vid son las raíces, tronco, sarmientos, hojas, flores y fruto. Según esta división Jesús sería el tronco, pero él dice ser la vid completa.

Esta es una imagen de la unidad que Jesús quiere entre sus seguidores. Recordemos que Jesús celebra la Última Cena con sus discípulos. La comunidad de discípulos unidos a Jesús formamos la vid. Los sarmientos o ramas conducen agua y minerales a las hojas, flores y frutos, y son útiles en tanto estén unidos a la vid. Lo mismo vale de los cristianos, discípulos de Jesús. Son ellos y ellas los que hacen presente y le dan vida a Jesús en el mundo de hoy.

Jesus uses the image as a warning to those who have begun to distance themselves from the way of the Lord. One of the ways this happens is when we love God and others “in word or speech” instead of “in deed and truth.” What does it mean for us to “remain in Christ”? In an extension of the metaphor, the Lord gives us an example. If we remain in him, we will bear much fruit. As the branches, we draw strength from Christ who is the vine.
