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# Fiscal Year (07/01 - 06/30) Comparison to Date



- For the 2015 Fiscal Year, Sunday Offertory Collections are 3% above the budgeted collection amount. This results in a fiscal year to date deficit of \$266,152.
- For the 2015 fiscal year, the cost per family per week is \$37 as 430 families contribute to the Parish.
- Our goal is to fund all operations and expenses from the weekly collections, i.e. the goal is for the stripped bars to exceed the black bars in the chart above.
- St. Teresa's annual fundraisers assist in meeting funding gaps. It is the Finance Council's and Fr. Frank's goal to increase weekly giving to meet our ongoing expenses, and use the proceeds from fundraisers to fund special initiatives and outreach programs of the Parish.

## **Treasures from Our Tradition**

Nearly everywhere in the Roman world, citizens agreed on how to celebrate marriage. Consent of the man and woman

### is what made a marriage valid in the eyes of the law, and although there was a traditional ceremony, it was home-based and optional. The ceremony was for showing the social status of the families involved (the procession ideally detoured through crowds), and for reminding the woman of her legal transfer from her fa-

ther's control to her husband's. The "big moment" of the ceremony had nothing to do with vows, but with the bride's donning the yellow

veil with red highlights that was the daily wear of married women. A wedding feast included soothsayers and animal sacrifice to the new household's gods. Christians found that distasteful, of course, but since marriage was a family matter, they could edit things out. The church was comfortable with this, and sometimes recommended that the couple seek the advice of the bishop. His permission was only required for the marriage of a cleric, or for a marriage Rome didn't recognize, such as between a free woman and a slave. There was no blessing, no liturgy, no priest. Christians followed the customs of the day, but they knew that custom and relationships were transformed from within themselves by the fact of their baptism. Outwardly, Christians married exactly as their pagan neighbors, but they certainly invested the usual gestures with a dynamic sense of Christ's presence. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. # Pass It On

### "Why are you standing there looking at the sky?" (Acts 1:11)

The historic, bodily presence of Jesus has come to an end.

Those disciples who walked with him and talked with him and dined with him: those faithful ones who followed him and watched him heal the sick and cure the lepers and make the blind see and the deaf hear; those people who left family and jobs to listen to this son of a carpenter teach them to do such radical things as forgive 70 times seven. love even their enemies. feed the hungry, be servants to all those very same ones now stand sadly in today's first reading and look up to the sky as Jesus ascends into the heavens.

Now what do they do? They're in grief. They're overwhelmed with loss. They're overcome with a profound experience of abandonment and emptiness.

We've all experienced this feeling to one degree or another in our lives. All of us have lost something or someone that we treasured. Many times these losses have brought us to tears or anger. Some have even triggered behaviors on our part that we now wish we could take back.

That's where these people, the followers of Jesus, were on this day that we now celebrate as the feast of the Ascension.

But notice that the angels in the story, the messengers from God, don't let them stay stuck there. They jar them back into reality with a sin-

gle question: "Why are you standing there looking at the sky?"

Which, translated, means: There's no time to mope, no time to feel sorry for yourselves. There's a great message of good news to be preached and lived out. And, don't forget, Jesus made a startling promise: "You will receive a power from the Holy Spirit coming upon you. And you will be my witnesses ... to the ends of the earth." That same Spirit will be available whenever two or three are gathered in his name; whenever we read sacred scripture; whenever we celebrate the Eucharist; whenever we feed the hungry, house the homeless, visit and care for the sick.

You are not alone, Jesus told his disciples over and over again. That terrible feeling of abandonment, Jesus assured them, would be fully addressed.

And it was. In fact, that earliest community of people who dedicated themselves to the life and love of Jesus did just as the angels told them — and caught fire in the process, a fire lit by the Spirit. And the fire that came to consume them raged so brightly that within less than 200 years, most of the known world became aware of a group called "Christians." Just think, they did it without anything like Facebook or Twitter or even a printing press!

When you consider that there was no social media in those days, no TV or radio or anything other than a word-of-mouth means of spreading the message, it is truly remarkable how exciting and freeing the good news of great joy was to so many people. For over 2,000 years, in spite of sometimes very flawed and even shocking emissaries, this same message has been presented, and it is offered to you and me this very day: We are loved, not abandoned; we are cherished, not forgotten; we are treasured, not dismissed.

It all happened because our God is Love. As Maya Angelou put it: "Love recognizes no barriers. It jumps hurdles, leaps fences, penetrates walls to arrive at its destination full of hope."

Our job now is to pass it on.
