


Welcoming Weekend

Treasures from Our Tradition

How did the church dealt with "daily sins" in the first five centuries? As devout and observant as they were, our early

fathers and mothers in faith could not have been all that different from us. Maybe they looked the other way when the grocer threw an extra fig in the shopping basket, or had a wandering eye for the widow next door, or had a taste for too much ale, or didn't let the truth get in the way of a good story. First of all, there was the Eucharist. The words are familiar: "This is the cup of my blood, poured out for the forgiveness of sin." Especially by participating in Communion from the cup, forgiveness was achieved. Eucharist

was, and remains, the sacrament of reconciliation *par excellence*, the sign and source of unity with Christ.

There were other helps along the way: "fraternal" correction, or the course corrections we offer one another in love, prayer, fasting, works of mercy. St. Augustine listed endurance of suffering, forgiveness of insults, and added the praying of the Lord's Prayer in the liturgy. He felt that the public praying of the Our Father on Sunday and its daily use in private prayer was an essential remedy and the reason why everyone was not a candidate for canonical penance. Inherited from Augustine's practice, the Lord's Prayer in our Communion Rite still has the same purpose, preparing us for receiving and becoming the Body of Christ. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. Discipleship and Wealth

Sometimes we get the idea that having material wealth is a bad thing. We may convince ourselves that it is the poor who are favored. In today's readings, we discover that material wealth alone does not keep us from discipleship. We will see that there are other gifts more important than material wealth, but even so, it is how we use our gifts that matters most.

Today's scriptures point to the value of the gifts of wisdom, trusting in God, and letting our actions reflect the love of God from within. It is not gold that causes us to fall, but rather the desire for gold above all other things. From the readings in Wisdom and Hebrews, we find the source of God's gifts in our lives. Wisdom is more valuable than worldly posses-

Real Treasure

The man went away sad, for he had many possessions. (Mark 10:22)

When I was a kid, my brother and I were riding our bikes from home to a place that repaired electric trains. I had my Lionel train engine in a sack hanging from my handlebar. Somewhere along the route, something happened, and my brother and I collided with a bang. My train engine fell out of the bag and crashed to the ground. It hit so hard that I felt right away that it could not be repaired.

I screamed at my brother. He had made us crash, I said. I cried and carried on something awful. I just knew that I had lost the one thing in the world that I really wanted. That Lionel engine was everything to me. I would not give up that engine for anything!

As in today's Gospel, if Jesus had said to me at that time in my life, "Give that electric train engine away so that someone else can have it," I would have been like that man whose "face fell" when Jesus said, "Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor ... then come, follow me." I couldn't do it!

There are certain things in life that get hold of us. They possess us, rather than us possessing them. Our happiness, success or whatever depends on a certain thing or things: objects, money, power, prestige. We cannot see our way forward without this or that. It seems impossible. We will take any

means to keep hold of whatever it is that possesses us.

Pope Francis is challenging us to learn from this Gospel story of the rich young man. If there are some things that I just cannot do without, at any cost, then I will never be able to see the person who has to do without everything, and who needs my companionship and help. My clinging on to some thing at any cost blinds me to everything and everyone else around me. I am fixated on what is mine, what I must protect, what I think I cannot do without. My only mission is to keep what I see as mine.

After my brother and I managed to get back on our bikes, and I had the Lionel engine in one hand, we rode the rest of the way to the repair shop.

We did not speak a word after we started riding again. I was mad at my brother and upset that I had lost the use of my one prized possession.

We entered the repair shop and I told the man why I had brought the engine to begin with and how it had smashed to the ground on the way there. I expected he would take one look and tell us to go home. Instead, he realigned some things, applied electricity, replaced a wire ... and put the engine on a track to run.

I could not believe the sense of relief I felt. How happy that made me. How sad I was for the way I had behaved toward my brother. The feeling that rolled over me as we rode our bikes home was: I have my engine back and running, but it doesn't seem the same anymore. If that engine can upset me so much and really mess up my relationship with my brother by the way I behaved, something's wrong. I can live without that engine. I can't live without peace in my heart and I cannot live without being okay with my brother.

Wisdom, in childhood terms, came to me that day. As an adult, I can more easily let go of what might possess me so that I can follow the way of Jesus and have real treasure in the reign of God now and in the future.
