



Treasures from Our Tradition

This week, our celebration of Advent makes a transition in ritual and texts. Beginning December 18, the countdown of

nine days (a novena) to Christmas sees a heightened sense of expectation, and also a turning from the call of the Baptist in the wilderness to the events leading up to Jesus' birth. In ancient Spain, December 18 was once celebrated as the "Feast of the Expectancy," and customs grew up to heighten readiness in the homes.

Some customs arise from monastic life and practice and spill over into our parish life. Beginning tonight, those who pray Vespers will sing in the opening phrase a beautiful title of Christ. These titles belong to a collection of opening phrases called the "O Antiphons" after the awe-inspired "O" sung on the first note. There's a playful code in the titles: O Wisdom, O Lord, O Flower of Jesse, O Key of David, O Dawn, O Ruler, O Emmanuel. When you take their Latin names—*Sapientia*, *Adonai*, *Radix*, and so on—the titles form an acrostic when you read them backwards: "ERO CRAS." In Latin, that is translated as "I will be there tomorrow!" It's as if Christ were answering the prayers of the waiting people in the words of the prayers themselves. —Rev. > Desde el siglo VII la oración oficial de la Iglesia clama el retorno de Cristo con las exclamaciones llamadas las "Antífonas Oh". Estas llaman a Jesús pidiéndole que venga bajo los títulos de Emmanuel, Sabiduría celestial, Señor de gran poder, Vara de Isaí, Llave de

David, Alba de la luz, y Deseo y Rey de gentes, y algunos más. Estos refranes se usan aún todavía hoy durante los días 17 al 23 de diciembre, y unidas en un acróstico latino forman las palabras *ero cras* (estaré mañana), como respuesta a la petición cristiana. Eventualmente en el siglo X o XI estas antífonas fueron unidas en el canto gregoriano Veni, veni Emmanuel (Oh ven, oh ven Emmanuel).

Celebrate

This Sunday, God rejoices and sings because of us. We

read in Zephaniah today that God "will sing joyfully because of you, / as one sings at festivals" (Zephaniah 3:18). We know plenty about singing at festivals. Already our ears are ringing with the songs and carols that anticipate the Christmas season.


Paul reminds us of the source of our own double re-

joicing: God is the mighty savior who is in our midst (in Zephaniah's words). Because this is so, says Paul, we can rejoice and be at ease. We don't have to worry, for God's peace will stand guard over our hearts and minds.

A medieval carol depicts Christmas as "my dancing day" and urges us to enter into the dance. Why all the merrymaking? Because "the Lord is near," as Paul reminds us (Philippians 4:5). He then points to another reason for the dancing: the dawn of the promise of peace, the peace beyond all understanding, that is now within our grasp. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.


The Holy Door

In the 19th century, families in Europe began counting the days to Christmas by making chalk marks on their doors. Then some families in Germany began to make special calendars marking the days from December 1 to Christmas Eve. These calendars had a little door for each day. Family members would open a door and reveal a scripture passage or picture or perhaps a candy. Such Advent calendars are still popular.

There is something about opening doors that is deeply meaningful to us human beings. Going through some doors brings us into a welcoming place. Some doors bring years ago. us into the presence of someone we love. We enter some doors with longing and anticipation. There are also times that we may be fearful of what we will find on the other side of a door.

Doors carry a certain power, even a mystical meaning to them. Such is the "Holy Door" of St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican. That special door is only opened for year-long jubilee celebrations called Holy Years. The Holy Door is normally bricked up, but now it is open so that pilgrims can pass through it.

This past Tuesday, Pope Francis opened the Holy Door at St. Peter's to begin the Jubilee Year of Mercy. Francis said this Holy Year will focus on the topic of mercy, one of the most important themes of scripture. This will be only the 29th Holy Year in the church since the tradition started more than 700





We will pass through that door and remind ourselves of how much mercy we have received from God and others, and we will be challenged to show mercy to every person who comes across our path.

Pope Francis says he wants this church of 1.2 billion members to be more merciful and less rigid toward sinners. He said the Jubilee would be an occasion for all members — and for the church itself – to rediscover the need to be forgiving and generous. He said, "The church is the home that accepts everyone and refuses no one ... the greater the sin, the greater the love that the church should show toward those who [repent]" (March 13, 2015).

According to the Vatican website, a Holy Year should be a time of reconciliation with adversaries and an occasion to promote solidarity, hope and justice in the world. This Holy Year, we celebrate God's limitless mercy. That mercy flows through the sacraments and through all the baptized as well.

In the Gospel of this third

Sunday of Advent, John the Baptist is asked by the people what they should do to prepare for the coming of the Messiah. John's response starts out with what we have come to call "corporal works of mercy." "Let the person with two coats give to the person who has none. The person who has food should do the same." In other words, show mercy to those in need — without conditions

Still others asked John what they should do to prepare for the Messiah. John's response was that they should not take advantage of others; treat others honestly and with respect; be satisfied with what they are given. Mercy is a component of these behaviors, for in them we treat others equally and without judgment.

This Advent is the perfect time for every parish and ministry to establish its own Holy Door of Mercy for the Jubilee Year. We will pass through that door and remind ourselves of how much mercy we have received from God and others. and we will be challenged to show mercy to every person who comes across our path. Families and individuals can also designate a door of mercy in their homes. Then, with the Prophet Zephaniah, we will "shout for joy" and "exult with all [our] heart."
