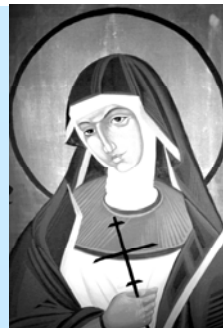

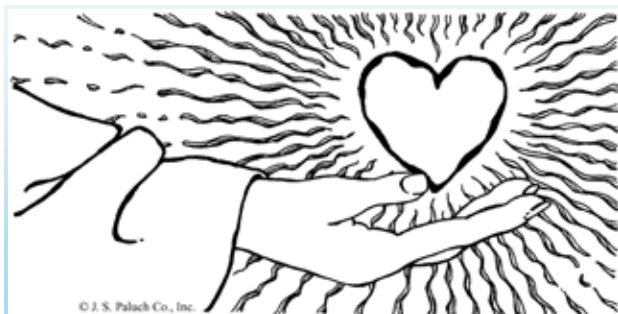

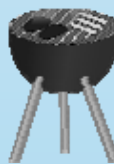
World's Smallest Block Party

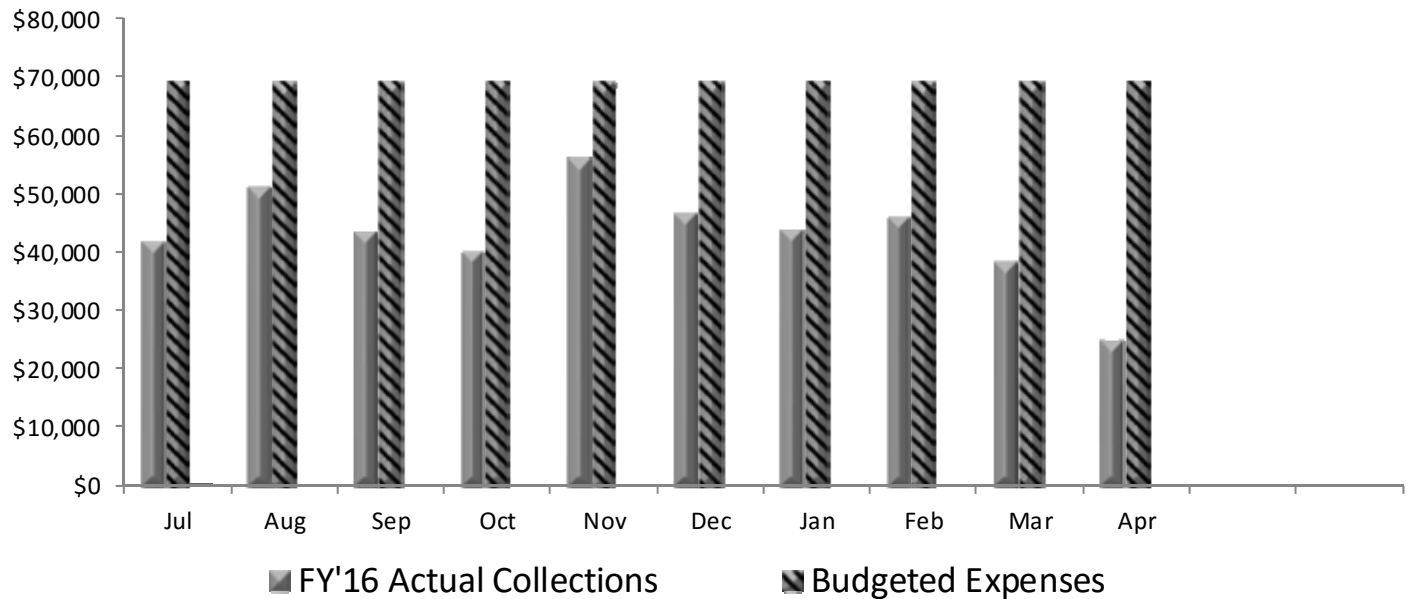

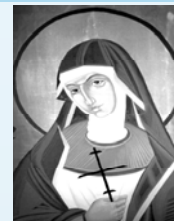

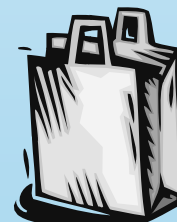

Treasures from Our Tradition

The French Revolution swept the church in France away in an astonishing way, stripping the nation of every possible vestige of the faith, not merely shuttering churches, but using them as staging areas for pagan raves and romps. While millions of faithful simply went underground and hung on for the ride, even the seven-day week was demolished along with the names of the months. What emerged from the chaos was the Napoleonic Code of 1792 governing church life, and therefore marriage law in France, French Canada, and elsewhere. The code makes civil marriage mandatory for all citizens.

In practice, when the faithful marry, they go first to the City Hall. There, the mayor performs the civil marriage, usually accompanied by a patriotic speech about the duties of the citizen, particularly in the rearing of children. Then, typically after a lunch, everyone goes off to change into more festive attire for the wedding liturgy, featuring consent, the exchange of rings, and the nuptial blessing. Sadly, only a minority of citizens today celebrate even the civil form of the rite, and a fraction of those continue on to the church. For those who do celebrate the liturgy of marriage, however, there is near certainty that the spouses are active worshipers, and that they will later present their children for baptism. — Rev. En 1954, el Papa Pió XII apoyó los derechos del obrero incluyendo a san José Obrero en el calendario cristiano. Esta fiesta celebra y recuerda la doctrina social de la Iglesia católica, una doctrina que insiste que: “El mensaje cristiano no aparta a las personas de la edificación del mundo, ni les lleva a despreocuparse del bien de sus semejantes, sino que les impone esta colaboración como un deber” (*Gaudiam et Spes* 34).

Es justo conmemorar a san José como obrero en el día mundial del trabajo, porque este santo varón nos recuerda que al trabajar uno colabora con Dios en la creación continua del mundo y de la humanidad. 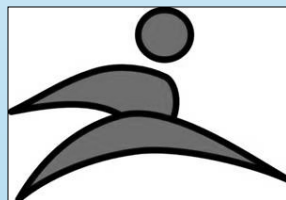
St. Teresa Running Club

See This Love

Today's readings show us Easter faith spreading rapidly into the gentile world as Paul and Barnabas preach and establish communities across Asia Minor. They revealed the risen Christ in their words and example. What seemed like defeat when Jesus was crucified is now proclaimed as victory over sin and death. A new life in Christ is now being offered in baptism, a life free of fear and full of purpose. Converts became members of the body of Christ, animated by his Spirit and empowered to live as he had lived. Wherever the apostles went, the good news of God's unconditional mercy gave people an exhilarating sense of liberation from past sins and called them to share in the joyful work of redeeming history itself.

Even when the young church encountered persecution, as described in the Book of Revelation, they already knew the end of the story. God had come to earth in Jesus, revealing history as a love story. The risen Christ was the divine bridegroom claiming his bride, the spotless church, representing all of humanity. A new heaven and a new earth were being revealed in the nuptials of God and creation.

Yet this transformation from the old to the new creation was not evident to everyone. What the skeptical world did see were people embracing daily life and its trials with courage and confidence. "See how they love one another" was the church's greatest appeal to outsiders. Even when they were martyred,

in the famous words of Tertullian, "their blood became the seed of conversion."

As the church grew, its saints and scholars contributed greatly to moral and ethical thought, law and social development. But its real contribution and the foundation of the church has always been the example of love. As Pope Francis has said of evangelization, new members don't come by being proselytized but by attraction. The Gospel is always centered in love. When love becomes visible between people in community, it reveals the underlying glory of God's presence. Others see this love and say, "I want that." That is what glory looks like.

In today's Gospel, as Jesus prepares his disciples for his departure, he makes visible the love he has always shared with his Abba. This is the source of his life, and he

wants them to experience it with him and among themselves. They will show the world that he really came from God and is in God by loving one another as he loved them. He is passing his own glory into them.

The disciples' faith in Jesus would have to endure his death by crucifixion and the dark interval of his absence before they came to understand the resurrection. John's Gospel more than any other shows the crucible of suffering that prepared Mary, Peter and the other disciples to understand Jesus' death as an act of love. His lifting up on the cross was the final sign that revealed God's unconditional love for a sinful world, a love so absolute that it rejected rejection itself and befriended enemies. In St. Paul's words, "Christ died for us while we were still sinners" (Rom 5:8) — a love so great it is able to draw all things to Jesus. This is the measure of Christian love: not just loving those who love us, but loving our enemies so deeply that we make them our friends.

Such love is only possible because of the resurrection. Only if we are secure in the promise of eternity will we risk giving ourselves away for love. This is perfect union with Jesus, who did precisely that so we might have eternal life.
