Save the date for Saturday, November 12th. Our annual fundraising bash returns with a twist – a new venue this year!


This event raises over \$150,000 each year and is critical for our parish and ministries. Stay tuned for info, or join the planning committee for access to the top-secret details.

Treasures from Our Tradition

Some say tomato—and some say tomahto—you know the old song. What do you say when you arrive at church and see a font prepared, a baby in the wings, the paschal candle burning? Well, maybe you will say that "we're having a baptism today," or maybe you say "we are having a christening." The proper term is baptism, since that is the name of the sacrament. But the persistent use of "christening" in our culture, probably from due to the influence of the Episcopal Church, is interesting.

Baptism, an ancient word, is from the Greek meaning to dip or to dunk. Christening is an Old English word that describes perfectly well that more than getting splashed with water, the person being baptized is being "Christ-ed." No matter what you call it, there's always water involved, and then an anointing with chrism—fragrant olive oil consecrated as a sign of Christ's presence—poured upon the brow as we say, "As Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet, and King, so may you live always as a member of his body, sharing everlasting life."

So, in being Christ-ed, you are conformed to his image, your life is expected to be a retelling of his life in miniature and you—even though you may be squirming or sleeping—are commissioned to be a priest, a prophet, a king. This means that you are called to be one who worships, you are called to speak the truth, you are called to shape the world and exercise right judgment. That is the deepest treasure of our tradition, and every time you gather to celebrate a baptism, you renew your vows precisely so that you can be more "Christ-ed." No matter what vocabulary you assign to the liturgy, the key is transformation of the human person in the community of the Body of Christ. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En muchos santuarios de latinoamerica y Europa se pueden encontrar diversas ofrendas que han dejado los fieles a través de los siglos. Entre estas ofrendas es de particular relieve el exvoto. Exvoto (una frase en latín que se traduce "del voto") es el regalo que se le presenta al santo o a la santa en reconocimiento del favor recibido. Esto también se llama "manda".

Los exvotos o mandas toman varias formas desde pequeñas medallas en forma de la parte del cuerpo que fue sanado hasta pinturas del milagro concedido. El exvoto más antiguo en América es de una pintura mandada a hacer por Hernán Cortés en honor de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe de Extremadura (España). Esta imagen reconocía el hecho de ser salvado del piquete de un alacrán mientras estaba en México. Lamentablemente esta pintura se extravió en el siglo XIX.

En realidad el santo o la santa no necesita el exvoto pero los creyentes sí. Estas mandas nos recuerdan el poder de la intercesión divina en la vida humana. También nos invitan al agradecimiento de los favores que Dios nos hace. — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

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Peace

The greeting of peace at Mass adds substance to a

message of today's readings: peace is relational. When we greet in peace the person near us at Mass, we share the touch of a handshake or embrace, sincere eye contact, and friendly words.

The scriptures speak of a similar peace. The first reading from Isaiah describes the peace of the holy city, Jerusalem, a place


of prosperity and comfort where the "LORD's power shall be known to his servants" (Isaiah 66:14c).

The Christian understanding of peace changes slightly. Paul writes of the "peace and mercy" on all who are created anew. Jesus describes a feeling of peace that will rest on those who accept his disciples and their message.

Lectionary Themes for July

In 1974, Avery Dulles, a convert to Catholicism and later a Jesuit priest, blessed the post-Vatican II church with his fine book *Models of the Church* (Doubleday, N.Y.).

As Dulles described it, he was offering five theologically based approaches meant to help believers understand themselves as church and in their relationship to the world. Those first five models are Institution, Mystical Communion, Sacrament, Herald and Servant. Later, Dulles suggested that all five models could be amalgamated into one supermodel, Community of Disciples.

Some 39 years later, another Jesuit, Pope Francis, suggested one more model whereby the church might realize its true purpose in the world. Francis was in an interview with Jesuit Fr. Anthony Spadaro. He asked Pope Francis, "What are your wishes for the Church of the coming years? What Church do you dream of?" (My Door Is Always Open, Bloomsbury, N.Y.: 2013). Pope Francis answered, "I see the Church as a field hospital after battle. ... What the Church needs most today is the ability to heal wounds and to warm the hearts of the faithful" (op. cit.). The pope also stressed the importance of mobility with regard to the church's efforts. "Instead of being just a Church that welcomes and receives by keeping the doors open, let us also be a Church that finds new roads, that is able to go outside itself. ... But that takes boldness and courage" (op. cit.).

Imagine that — a field hospital as a model for the church. Such medical units are meant to function in the midst of the fray of battle so that the wounded need not go far to find helpful and competent care. I am reminded of Doctors Without Borders and other such organizations that venture into some of the world's most dangerous trouble spots to offer their services. These give the church an example in courage and service, as do the sacred texts for this month, particularly the Gospels.

Jesus served as an itinerant minister, bringing his message and his healing gifts to as many people and places as he

could. He would have his disciples similarly give themselves over to others. On July 3, we will watch and listen as he sends forth the 72 to cure the sick and announce the imminence of the kingdom. Their lives, like his, were to be simple and unencumbered so they would be free to go where people needed them. Their joy and enthusiasm for the mission should inspire our eagerness to be the field hospital that brings healing and wholeness to others.

We see this model embodied in the person of the good and compassionate Samaritan (July 10) who washed, cleaned and raised up the man who was beaten and robbed. Pope Francis called this "pure Gospel." He added, "the ministers of the Gospel must be those who can warm the hearts of the people, who walk through the dark night with them, who know how to dialogue and to descend themselves into their people's night, into the darkness, but without losing themselves."

In the remainder of the Gospels for July, would-be disciples are formed by Jesus so that they will know how not to lose themselves. Through the beautiful narrative of Martha and Mary, Jesus taught

his disciples how to arrange their priorities and maintain a balance in their lives. All efforts at ministry must begin with sitting at the feet of Jesus and listening to him. This Mary did, much to Martha's consternation. But Jesus called Mary's choice "the better part" without which ministry can become tedious and overwhelming. It is not one or the other, prayer or service, but both in complementary balance.

On July 24, Jesus will teach his disciples to pray to one God as "Abba" and to open themselves to God and God's will. Jesus underscored the necessity of their constant trust in God, and urged them (and us) to pray for daily bread and ask God's forgiveness, all the while remembering that we owe that same blessing to one another. To illustrate the quality of their prayer, Jesus will offer a parable on persistence and follow that with the assurance that God — who knows our every need and desire — answers our prayers.

A final lesson this month (July 31) also comes in the form of a parable about greed and possessions. A rich man whose harvest was bountiful decided he would simply build bigger barns to ensure his wealth for years to come. That night he died, and since there are no pockets in a shroud, all was left behind. Instead of hoarding this world's wealth, he could have "stored up treasure in heaven" by using his considerable possessions to ease the plight of the hungry, the poor, the neglected and the lost.

Next month, Jesus will continue the formation of his disciples. We, for our part, are to listen attentively and allow ourselves to be transformed by him into worthy models of the church.
