Avila in Action


Stewardship is rooted in the idea that all we have is a gift from God, and with grace we gratefully give back to God from what we have been given.

In 2016, the Stewardship Committee along with the Finance Council made a prayerful decision to dedicate 6% of Sunday collections to giving, and to seek input from the parish on how the funds are distributed. 
This week, we'll focus on our Operational Expenses, which help keep the lights on, the church cool, and St. Teresa's employees from living a monastic way of life.

- The majority of our expenses are for the salaries and benefits for our employees.
- We have significant administrative expenses that include insurance, hospitality, utilities, supplies, and furniture.
- We pay assessments to the Archdiocese of Chicago and Priests Retirement and Mutual Aid Association (PRMAA).
- We make occasional minor repairs to our buildings to maintain them properly. These are for minor repairs that would be made at any typical property.
- Lastly, our social outreach ministries are a core and celebrated expense because this is our mission! In 2016, we started "Avila in Action" where we contribute a 6% of our weekly contributions to causes that are important to our parishioners. For last year, the total contribution to Avila in Action was \$30,000.

We'd like to dedicate this finance bulletin to Dave Hilko, a parishioner who passed away recently. It was Dave's idea to report St. Teresa's finances in a more transparent fashion. In fact, the majority of this text was drafted by him just before he passed away.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's 2016 October Count averaged 550 people at weekend Masses. The 2017 monthly averages are: January, 489; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.



Treasures from Tradition

Today, the languages of the whole world arise to God in a Pentecost of praise. In some American dioceses, the Mass is offered every Sunday in more than thirty different languages, including the silent praise of American Sign Language. Fifty years ago, the landscape of liturgy was very different. It was grounded firmly in Latin, which is to the present day still the official language of the Roman Rite. Very few people were fluent in Latin, even though in those days Latin was far more widely studied in school. Nevertheless, almost every Catholic was competent in the responses and chants of Latin since it is not difficult to pronounce. The clergy were normally minimally competent in Latin, since much of seminary education was conducted in that language.

When the Second Vatican Council was convened, all of the debate and daily work of the council was to be in Latin. In the first session in 1962, Boston's Cardinal Richard Cushing continually complained about it, and threatened not to return in 1963 if something wasn't done. He convinced the fathers when he rose to speak in fairly fluent Latin in an unforgettable Boston twang. The next year, he returned, but with a simultaneous translation system funded by the people of Boston. The ordinary everyday language of the people, the vernacular, had arrived at the Vatican via Boston! — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.



Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

El día 9 de junio del año 1597, falleció el jesuita José de Anchieta proveniente de las Islas Canarias, España. Este santo “apóstol de Brasil” fue beatificado en 1980 gracias a sus grandes esfuerzos humanitarios, literarios y evangelizadores en Brasil. Llegó a Brasil en 1553 donde aprendió Tupí, el idioma de los nativos. Enseñaba a los indígenas, evangelizándolos con la doctrina cristiana y educándolos en historia, filosofía y medicina.


Eventualmente fundó el colegio jesuita de São Paulo de Piratininga donde tuvo la audacia de educar, junto a los hijos de los nativos, los hijos de los portugueses. Para este esfuerzo escribió muchos libros y manuales, cosa que le mereció ser el primer escritor en Brasil.

Además de ser un escritor prolífico, este misionero dedicó su vida a predicar el Evangelio en Brasil, país que cruzó a pie, fundando pueblos y escuelas para los indígenas cristianos. Estos le llamaban el “santo volador” por la velocidad con que caminaba. Su celo por el Evangelio lo motivaba a seguir caminando. Como dice el profeta Isaías: “Que hermosos son los pies del que trae buena nuevas” (Isaías 52:7). — Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Gluz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

Send Out Your Spirit

Last week we heard that, following the Ascension, the disciples, Mary, and other followers of the Lord retreated to the upper room in prayer. This week we hear that, while praying in that room, the Holy Spirit comes upon them. Jesus' post-Resurrection promise, recounted in today's Gospel, is fulfilled: the power of the Holy Spirit comes upon Jesus' followers. Saint Paul tells us that all of us, in some way, are given gifts of the Holy Spirit, gifts that can be used to spread the Good News. Today is one of the Church's greatest festivals. Let us carry the refrain of the responsorial psalm with us throughout the coming week: "Lord, send out your Spirit, and renew the face of the earth!" (Psalm 104:30).

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

Pentecost Sunday

“On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked...” (John 20:19). Pentecost is the feast of locked doors — that are suddenly blown open!

It’s the feast of isolation, fear, suspicion, betrayal, abandonment, and near despair — all dismissed by a resurrected Jesus whose first spoken words are “Peace be with you.”

No recriminations. No finger pointing. No blaming. Only words of forgiveness. Pentecost is the feast that reminds us of those early disciples who wanted to do nothing else but sneak away, go into hiding, and wallow in their guilt and shame.

Yet, to our surprise, the Spirit of second chances breaks down the door and, with a love so vast, the ugliest kind of guilt and humiliation is instantly wiped away. The Spirit of new life rushes in like a great wind and embraces each one of them with a sense of peace so profound that the doors of their souls fly open and a smoldering fire lights their hearts.

Then, an even greater surprise takes place: Jesus chooses them — the very ones who abandoned and betrayed him — to be the wounded, forgiven healers that are to preach the good news of God’s gracious love and mercy. The very ones who handed him over now become the same ones who will begin a new community — a community eventually consisting of people like you and

me.

Pentecost, the feast of locked doors, becomes a feast of confrontation, of challenge. It doesn’t just let us sit back and be amazed at its amazing imagery of fire and wind and blown-open doors. It demands that each of us search our own soul to answer the challenge of deep self-exploration: Where are the locked doors in our lives? Where do I find our own selves isolated in fear, living behind emotionally sealed doors, hanging on to anger and refusing to come out of hiding?

Pentecost is not just something miraculous and stupendous that happened some 2,000 years

ago. It’s an event that needs to happen in each of our lives — now!

In the book, *Naked and You Clothed Me*, Fr. William Bausch tells the story of a 41-year-old man named Tom who was dying of AIDS.

His parents lived in so much shame because of this that they literally locked him in an upstairs bedroom so that no one could see him. The priest then tells how when he was finally allowed to go up to his room and visit with him, he bent over to kiss Tom on the forehead and then took his hand in his own. The emaciated, bed-ridden man whispered to the priest with tears streaming down his face, ‘No one touches me anymore.’... His father remained behind a closed door — until Tom died. At the wake, he finally broke down and opened the closed door of his soul, and wept with shame over his neglect and abandonment.

Locked doors were blown open. Pentecost promises us that the Holy Spirit can be released in each of us: the Spirit of fire that can burn away our meanness, the Spirit of wind that can sweep away our desire for revenge; the Spirit of blown open doors that can usher us into an inner peace that can transform our hearts of hate.

It is for these reasons that we pray together as a Pentecost community: “Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, and we shall renew the face of the earth.”
