Save the Date! Ministry Fair, February 24th-25th




Fiscal Year Cheer


We've had an eventful and successful close to the calendar year 2017. We finished the remodeling of the rectory to allow for more staff offices and provide room for the expanding classes in the church. The remodeling was done on time, under budget, and high quality! No longer do the staff have to share a seat or take turns at a desk. There's also a great meeting space for Father Frank in the rectory without the risk of interrupting the education program.

Beginning this calendar year 2018, we are undergoing a Renew My Church review. More information to follow in the next several weeks when the review begins. Fortunately, our finances are doing very well, thanks to all the parishioners.

Monthly Sunday Collections increased 5% from fiscal 2016 to fiscal 2017. As our Fiscal Year 2017 (July 2016 – June 2017) has ended, we are doing better than we were last fiscal year (July 2015 – June 2016). Our Sunday collections totaled \$592,596, a 5% increase from 2016 and a 17% increase from 2015. Our Sunday Collections cover nearly 75% of St. Teresa's operating expenses.

Thank you to the parishioners of St. Teresa. Without your continued help, we would not be on a path to a more stable financial position.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017,628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017/18 monthly averages are: January, 489/644; February, 570; March, 640; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.

The Stories of La Posada

"I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me." - Matthew 25:35

St. Teresa is partnering with La Posada Providencia for our Border Ministry. Located in the lower Rio Grande Valley, La Posada provides shelter for immigrants and asylum seekers waiting for their cases to be adjudicated before the U.S. Immigration Court. Living its mission to "welcome the stranger," La Posada has welcomed more than 9,000 "strangers" since 1989. In this weekly column, the refugees and volunteers from La Posada share their stories with the community of St. Teresa of Avila parish.

Nono's Story (Cameroon)

I am originally from Cameroon. Cameroon is a country in Central Africa whose official languages are French and English. I left my country and my family in January 2017 because of problems I had with the dictatorial government. In my country, I was a trader and I was near the border of Nigeria and Cameroon. Sadly for me, I found myself in an English-speaking town in full demonstration for independence and the police arrested me, confusing me with the organizers of the strike. Thank God I escaped with the help of a police officer who got to know me after five days in prison. I had to go to neighboring Nigeria in order to take a flight to



Ecuador. And from Ecuador to Colombia by bus. Colombia to Panama walking through the forest for 6 days. I crossed Central America and Mexico by bus and walking for almost a month. I presented myself to US immigration at the border of Tijuana. I spent 6.5 months in detention in San Diego. And presently I am at *La Posada* in San Benito because I do not have any family under the American sun. I feel safe at *La Posada* and if God wills it, I will leave if I get a work permit because my case is still in court.

[Note: When Nono finally arrived at the border he said he was pleasantly surprised by how the immigration officials initially greeted him. He said that they gave him what felt like a genuine welcoming until they locked him in a windowless cell with three other immigrants. He was held here for four days before being handcuffed, shackled, and taken to Otay Mesa Detention Center in San Diego

where he was expected to prepare his asylum case without a lawyer or anyone else advocating on his behalf. When Nono's case was eventually heard by an immigration judge, he was granted withholding of removal. This allows Nono to live and work (once he gets a work permit) in the United States temporarily but not to apply for permanent residency or for citizenship. It is only asylum that can open the door to those benefits. Nearly 7 feet tall, Sr. Zita calls Nono "God's Step Ladder" anytime she needs him to grab something from the top shelf, to which he generously responds—"No problem, Sister"—to any of her requests.]

Treasures from Tradition

The Holy Father usually marks the solemn opening of the Lenten fast with a procession and Mass on Ash Wednes-

day evening. He walks from the Benedictine monastery, San Anselmo, down the Aventine hill to the Dominican monastery of Santa Sabina. This very old tradition was revived by Pope John XXIII in the late 1950s. Have you ever wondered who gives the pope his ashes? It's the cardinal who has been given the "title" of the church of Santa Sabina. The pope's homily at this Mass states his theme for Lent.

Santa Sabina dates from the fifth century, and is one of the most beautiful churches in Rome. One of the panels on its main doors features the Crucifixion, a scene not normally depicted in art until much later. In the year 1219 the pope gave the church to Saint Dominic for his new religious order, the "Order of Preachers," commonly called the Dominicans, and it remains their world headquarters to this day. That pope, Honorius III, was a member of the Savelli family, and this church was their personal family chapel. Sabina was a wealthy Roman lady who became a Christian and was martyred, and whose home became a place of prayer. Later, the church built on that spot was dedicated to her memory. —Rev. Jesus Christ calls us to constantly renew His Church. *Renew My Church* is the Archdiocese of Chicago's response to His call and our invitation for renewal.

Through a multitude of *Renew My Church* initiatives, the Archdiocese will re-commit our local Church to our gospel commission to make disciples, build vital communities of faith and inspire witness to bring the light and hope of Christ to a world in need.

Today, we face a trending crisis of faith. Fewer people than ever are connected with organized religion. Many who identify as Catholic do not attend weekly Mass. Overall, we see an increase in signs of a broken world. As a result of this crisis, we find ourselves with less people and financial resources for ministry. However, we are a strong and committed Church that will work together to overcome the challenges we face today and in the centuries to come.

One initiative of *Renew My Church* is focused on increasing the vitality of our local communities. 
During this session we will:


