There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; February, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463/511; August, 510/509; September, 566/563; October, 628/652; November 622/569.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.



## Treasures From Tradition

Occasionally, someone raises a surprised complaint that while Christmas arrives on Santa's sleigh at the Macy's parade on Thanksgiving Day, the Church doesn't catch on too fast. They may even say that Advent is a newfangled idea. Not so. To trace its beginnings, we have to go back to the fourth or fifth century in France (then Gaul), when Epiphany was the favored day, next to Easter, for baptism. The old pagan structures of Rome were collapsing then, and many people sought to be baptized. Since adults always prepared for baptism by fasting, folks counted back a few weeks for a kind of retreat. Before too long, bishops were advising everyone to attend church frequently beginning on December 17. Soon, artists were imagining ways of expressing the Advent mystery, and in Italy this gave rise to beautiful mosaics of empty thrones awaiting the arrival of the Lord of all creation.

Advent as we know it develops on two separate tracks: the first having to do with our spiritual preparation for celebrating the Christmas feast, and the second having to do with the way this is organized and expressed in the liturgical readings and prayers every day of the season.

## Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe


Es más que justo empezar el tiempo litúrgico de Adviento con la Virgen María. Esta semana celebramos la Solemnidad de la Inmaculada Concepción de María. Esta es una fiesta especial para varios países latinoamericanos como Nicaragua, Panamá, Paraguay y los Estados Unidos que tienen como patrona nacional a la Madre de Jesús bajo este título.

Esta creencia tiene siglos de ser discutida por teólogos cristianos como Ambrosio, Agustín, Buenaventura y Tomás de Aquino, pero fue solo con la Constitución *Ineffabilis Deus* del Papa Pío IX en 1854 que pasó a ser doctrina oficial de la Iglesia. La enseñanza de la Inmaculada Concepción de la Madre de Jesús insiste que María nació y permaneció sin pecado. Según el teólogo franciscano Juan Duns Escoto, María fue salvada del pecado desde el vientre de su madre Ana. De esta manera Jesús pudo salvarla no después de

haber pecado como ha hecho con nosotros, sino antes de que ella hubiera pecado.

La Inmaculada Concepción se hizo en vista de la venida de Jesús quien nos puede hacer inmaculados gracias al perdón y la gracia que nos ofrece.

## The Promise of Justice

## La Promesa de Justicia

We are in fairly good company when we ask God for justice. Often enough we hear and agree with the lament of the people of Israel asking God why the wicked prosper. However, when we call out for justice, we usually want someone to get his or her comeuppance. God's justice is something other than this, of course. God's justice comprises a wonderful rightness between God and humankind.

Today, Jeremiah looks ahead to a time when a just one will sprout from the shorn-off stump of Jesse of the house and family of David. Life was not fair in Jeremiah's time. Israel's kings held the promise of God's fidelity, but it was difficult to see how God's promise could be realized through them.

Nevertheless, Jeremiah lifts his voice and announces that the Promised One will come. Luke's Gospel echoes that announcement, and Paul is filled with sturdy encouragement. And so Advent begins with a promise.

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Estamos en buena compañía cuando clamamos a Dios por justicia. Con frecuencia escuchamos y estamos de acuerdo con el pueblo de Israel que pregunta a Dios por qué el malo prospera. Sin embargo, cuando clamamos por justicia usualmente queremos que alguien reciba el castigo que se merece. Obviamente la justicia de Dios es más que eso. La justicia de Dios abarca una maravillosa rectitud entre Dios y la humanidad.

En la lectura de hoy Jeremías avizora un tiempo en el que un justo brotará del tronco de Jesé, de la casa y la familia de David. La vida no era justa en el tiempo de Jeremías. No obstante, Jeremías levanta la voz y anuncia que ya viene el Salvador prometido. El Evangelio de Lucas hace eco de ese anuncio, y Pablo se llena de un gran ánimo. De esta manera el Adviento comienza con una promesa.

## Seasons

Advent has a special feeling for me. It was the first week of Advent almost 30 years ago that my brother suffered a massive cerebral hemorrhage. He was just short of his 51st birthday. My brother lingered on life support for 30 days ... then joined our mother and countless others in the eternal reign of God.

That Advent of 1990 brought our family a long and sometimes excruciating ordeal. What was to come for my brother? Recovery? Prolonged disability? Death? How would his wife, his children, the rest of us face these prospects?

We were not prepared for what was unfolding. We were engulfed in medical problems, financial challenges, constant decisions, mixed-up feelings and an overcast of uncertainty.

The season of Advent that year was a season of waiting with no evident answers, struggling with unrelenting difficulties and hoping for a resolution when we did not know what that really might be.

Advent — if we pay attention — can be complex and has been like that for much of human history. It is easy for us to see Advent as a wreath with purple candles, familiar hymns of anticipation and, of course, shopping and preparations for Christmas. But Advent is a whole “season” of life, more than just these four weeks.

In the first reading, we find hopeful and exuberant words from the prophet Jeremiah. Jeremiah was prophesying about the advent of peace and stability for the Jewish people. They had been struggling in exile after the destruction of Jerusalem generations before. The people had become despondent of ever returning and having a temple again.

God calls Jeremiah to proclaim a message of hope. Theirs was a very long season of advent. Yet with mercy and hope proclaimed, they could endure until the eventual restoration of Jerusalem and the coming of the messiah.

In Luke’s Gospel, we find Jesus instructing the disciples to prepare themselves and those who come after for a further long season of advent. That time will precede the

return of Christ. As humankind heads toward the end of the ages, there will be catastrophic signs in the heavens and the seas. Nations will be in turmoil. Jesus says, “People will die of fright in anticipation of what is coming upon the world. For the powers of heaven will be shaken.”

Are we not living in that very season this Advent? What signs do we see in the heavens, on the earth and in the seas?

What signs do we see in nations? Or what signs do we see in relations among

peoples in the neighborhoods where we live as well as around the globe?

Jesus offers us hope. “When these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand.”

Finally, we consider the season of Advent in our own lives. Paul says it so well: “May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we have for you. [May that love] strengthen your hearts, to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus.”

Challenges, conflicts, decisions, uncertainties —these things and many others will be part of our season during this Advent. Giving every person selfless love may seem out of the realm of possibility at times.

But with the hope offered by Jeremiah and with the redemption brought by Jesus Christ, we can live in the strength of God in our own season of Advent, however long that may be. Jesus’ words to us are, “Be vigilant at all times and pray that you have the strength to escape the tribulations that are imminent and to stand before the Son of Man.”
